Boy, was I delighted with her return visit ten years later when she cooked delicious strawberry jam and made fresh scones in front of our very eyes to share with us, Mmm!

It's been a lot of fun choosing speakers over the 7 years that I've been organising the Society's annual programme of talks. Sometimes, of course, there have been panic stations when a speaker cannot attend, we've certainly experienced that quite a lot of late! Luckily, we have been very fortunate with obliging folk coming to our rescue and surprising us with unexpected topics. On the 2020 membership card, on a whim, I added the phrase that the 'Programme may be subject to change', gosh, was that ever prophetic.

I try to visit other garden Society meetings to hear various speakers for inspiration and gauge their suitability. I also communicate with speaker finders from other Garden Societies, and we share information on our proposed programme of talks for the next year.

However, I probably won't stick to having a theme each year as I feel this could be somewhat limiting, after all, variety is the spice of life.

#### **Growing Garlic**

#### 'Plant on the shortest day and harvest on the longest'

Garlic likes full sun and well drained soil which is slightly alkaline and has had good compost mulched in. Plant to suit the bulb type, either autumn, winter or spring. Garlic should be kept away from peas, beans, parsley and sage as it inhibits their growth. Plant 2 inches deep and keep well watered and weeded.

Harvest hard-necks when leaves change colour and soft-neck when leaves lie prostrate. Dry in the sun for 3-4 weeks or in glasshouse or conservatory.

# Winners of NGS Nation's Favourite Gardens 2021 in Devon.

**Burrow Farm- Public Garden Winner**, which we visited with DGS on a very hot summers day in July 2018. This was after Mary Benger had come to give us a talk about how she had gone about transforming an old Roman clay quarry into her garden at the dairy farm. The garden has grown from that first project of 4 acres in the 80's and is now 13 acres. I can remember cooling off by dangling my feet in their swimming pool surrounded by perfumed roses and finding shade under the trees in the wildflower meadow. The Anniversary Garden was planted with naturalistic perennials and grasses in 2010 to celebrate Mary and John's 50 years at the farm, there is also a terrace and courtyard area with Cafe.

Little Ash Bungalow—SW Regional Winner. I visited this on a rainy day in June 2020 and found an oasis created out of a paddock. Helen Brown the owner has a passion for plants, as I wandered around, I saw purple-leaved plants such as Physocarpus and Cercis and may small trees. Close to the house are more tender plants such as salvias, hedychium and delicate alpines in a raised bed. Tropical Beschornaria Septentrionalis (photo) was magnificent in full bloom. The garden then slopes towards the River Otter, where a natural stream helps Alders to grow successfully with arisaema, podophyllum, primulas

and trillium thriving underneath in the damp conditions. On the way back to the house, the mini meadow areas were full of wildflowers such as bird's foot trefoil, wild carrot, orchids and yellow rattle, attracting bees and butterflies. June Cassidy
