Treasures Report from AGM

I reported at the AGM that our annual funds are stable and have for the last few years shown a trading surplus. However, our expenditure is double our income when we look at the average of the last 5 years. The reason for our apparant stability is our reliance of the sales at our spring plant sale. Without this we would be in serious deficit every year.

It is not a sensible way to proceed, and with rising costs both for speakers and the hire of the hall, we need to increase our income from other areas. Mindful that our membership has been £6 since 2003, the committee put to the members at the AGM a break down of our finances with the proposal to increase our membership to £10 from 2024, along with guests meeting entry rising to £3.

The members at the AGM voted unanimously for this proposal.

The society will continue to run as a 'not for profit organisation', and will continue to hold plant sales.
