

Figs

Back in the first half of the 20th century figs were grown widely across the area, as Rupert Hart-Davis reminiscences in his book on Figs in 1954. He writes of seeing figs grown in many of the gardens and the fruiterers were all selling them at a good price, so much so that he could buy as many as he wanted and take them down to the beach and enter the happy state of being fig-sated.

Figs are easy to grow, as they are undemanding and hardy, they grow best in pots up against a south or east facing wall. They can be grown in the ground, however they need their roots restricted by lining the hole with paving slabs or rubble.

The best soil is loamy, well drained and fertile, fig trees need watering frequently in the first year, until their root systems are established, after this they are drought tolerant and only need watering in hot, dry weather.

Once the fruits have appeared feed weekly with a liquid fertilizer, and they will benefit from an annual mulch of well rotted compost.

Winters in Dawlish are generally mild, however if we do get a particularly cold snap then some protection with fleece or similar is advisable, especially for young trees.

You should prune twice a year, removing weak and dead branches in winter and trimming them lightly into shape in the summer. You should avoid pruning them in the spring as they will 'bleed' sap and weaken the tree.

Figs are harvested in late summer towards autumn. They are ready when the fruit is soft and the neck of the fruit starts to wilt and hang down. Figs bruise easily so handle as little as possible. Once picked figs do not ripen any further, it is good to leave some of the stem on the fruit when you pick them as this makes them last longer.

Varieties—Brown Turkey is good for beginners and Little Miss Figgy is good for small spaces as it just grows 1.2m x1.2m.

Look out for the Spring Plant Sale, there are always locally grown fig trees for sale.

Figs are a good fruit to enter into the Summer Show with. The judges are looking for large fully ripe fruits of good colour with bloom and stalks intact, a slight split does not mark them down as it's to be expected in ripe fruit.

Helping out and Joining In

The society has a committee of 10 members, with five key roles, Chair, Treasurer, Secretary, Summer Show Secretary and Programme Organiser. Currently the committee and officers are very happy to continue with their roles, however it is not a young committee and they feel it would be healthy to have some younger members of the society to start shadowing roles. We are looking for individuals who would take up assistance roles, for the key roles of Treasurer and Show Secretary in the first instance. This does not mean joining the committee, but being involved at key events. Please contact our Chair, June or talk to any committee member at the January meeting to discuss opportunities.

The committee have produced role descriptions for the officers and a general one for the committee, which will be available to read at the January Meeting and at the AGM.
