## **Westcliff Primary Academy Sensory Garden and Community Garden**

On a warm sunny day in August, three of us volunteers turned up at what will be the newly transformed Garden and Community Space at Westcliff Primary Academy. Ali Fletcher, the co-ordinator, met us and handed us a paintbrush each and two large cans of Cuprinol green fence paint, so we just got stuck in. Shirley started at one end, Jenny and I took on the slope and door. Isn't it just amazing where the time goes when you're having fun and chatting away.

Other volunteers were thinning the trees to let more light into the area where raised beds will be placed, even carving one stump into a mushroom shape!

Ali provided hot and cold drinks and luckily we had some shade from the Monkey Puzzle tree.

Our allotted time was soon used up but we couldn't

leave with a few planks still unpainted, so we finished the whole fence to Ali's and our satisfaction. This is just the start of a much bigger project that Ali is co-ordinating. There are lots of opportunities for volunteering - whatever time you have free, or whatever skills you have, Ali will have a job for you. If you are handy with a paintbrush, fancy planting up pots or growing on seeds, pruning the fruit trees, working with wood, or turning old pallets into a seating area your help will be great appreciated by the children and wider community.

# Now is the time to save seeds—and plant bi-annuals for flowers next summer.

As flowers and fruit start to go over they will be setting seeds, so now is a great time to collect them. Some of them such as tomatoes, poppies and beans can be collected and stored in an envelope in a cool dry place. Others such as hollyhock and foxgloves can be sown now and grown on over winter for planting out in spring. If you would like some free seeds to try for yourself come down to see us at the Big Green Event on the 18th, Roger and others there will be happy to talk you through saving, storing and sowing. Or come to the meeting in January to swap seeds or to learn how to bring on your own plants.

The newsletter is now quarterly, so the next one will be out in early December, if you have any copy for it, can you let us have it by the meeting in November.

# The Queens Green Canopy

The Queen's Green Canopy (QGC) is a tree planting initiative created to mark the Platinum Jubilee in 2022. Everyone across the UK is



being invited to plant trees from October 2021, when the tree planting season begins, through to the end of the Jubilee year in 2022.

It is hoped it will create a network of individual trees, avenues, copses and whole woodlands in honour of The Queen's service and the legacy she has built, and with every tree planted bringing benefits for people, wildlife and climate, now and for the future.

Any trees planted from October 2021 to the end of the jubilee year in 2022 can be part of the QGC. Tree planting season is October to March – this is when roots are dormant and new trees will have the best chance of flourishing.

The Woodland Trust has bundles of trees free for local organisations or individual trees for people to buy, all Trust trees are reared in the UK, so are disease free.
