FOTF Must Haves	FOTF no-no's
Before walking out the door, make sure you have the following items:	
 Outfit Clutch Millinery Shoes Grooming: pay attention to hair styling and make up A positive attitude 	 Extremely short/Mini dresses Strapless tops/dresses Shoe string straps on tops Shorts/playsuits Exposed mid-rifts Visible underwear Costume (unless a themed category) Inappropriate cleavage Skin tight/ill-fitting clothing Sportswear Overly casual footwear e.g. flat sandals/thongs/flip flops/jandals Copying outfits of other competitors Asking a designer or milliner to copy the work of another designer/milliner

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• Please contact individual race clubs/event organisers for their specific FOTF requirements (if any) prior to an event as they may differ or have various requirements i.e. theme, hem length etc

- Despite popular belief, gloves are only an optional item of women's FOTF wear. Please check with individual race clubs or event organisers to see if they have specific requirements.
- For ideas of current race wear trends and to view winners' photos, visit FOTF dedicated Facebook or Instagram pages, such as 'It's All About The Sash'
- The acronym 'FOTF' used within this guide refers to 'Fashions on the Field', which is the term given most of the best dressed competitions within Australia. These competitions are also known as, but not limited to be known as FITF (Fashions in the Field), Best Dressed, Ladies Day Competition and Style Stakes in other parts of the globe. These competitions are predominately held (but not limited to) events held at race tracks, harness racing, polo, state/county shows/fairs and more.
- This guide reflects dressing standards at traditional FOTF events. For guides on dressing for relaxed race wear events, please contact the event organisers as requirements often vary. A quick overview as follows:

Relaxed Racewear Tips

- Consider wedges, high heeled espadrilles or block high heels
- Move away from structured clutch bags and consider something more casual e.g. basket bags, straw bag, casual leather bag, pouch, wicker, cotton, cross body bags, mini bags etc
- Popular outfit looks include:
 - Floaty sundresses
 - Culottes
 - Palazzo pants
 - Maxi skirts
 - Jumpsuits
 - Less structured/formal dresses e.g. floral, prints etc
- Strap & shoulder coverings not as strict as traditional FOTF formats
- Hem length can have more variety e.g. maxi length
- Millinery to be less formal e.g. boaters, sun/straw hats, floral, giant brims, less structured styles
