Trinity Lutheran Church has made a commitment to inclusivity in our community. We value bringing everyone together to play creating unity.

ADA requirements are not enough; being inclusive and diverse for all is more important. It's not just about people with disabilities, it's about everyone enjoying and sharing the benefits of play: physical, sensory, and social. Inclusive playgrounds go beyond regular guidelines, they facilitate engagement between children. An accessible playground means that a child who uses a wheelchair can get into it. If it is inclusive, then the play activities have been selected and laid out so that someone in a chair can engage with people of different abilities while they play. This will be a place where a senior citizen and a grandchild can play together... creating unity!

Trinity was founded in 1985 in Monument, CO. Originally, it was surrounded by farmland, years ago the farmer sold off that land. Now, the church and its land sit among five home developments. The nearest park is almost two miles away, over a freeway, without sidewalks on a busy state highway. Given that our church has acres of land not being used, we aspired to build an accessible playground suitable for all abilities. The closest ADA-compliant park—which has the appropriate surfacing, ADA swing, swing along seat, and a digging device—is over 13 miles away. A park similar to the Phase 2 proposal is over 30 miles away. We are committed to do more, with a merry-go-round for wheelchairs and a teeter totter where people with trunk mobility can sit, lie down, hang out in the tunnel, and more.



PHASE 1 COMPLETED & FULLY FUNDED SUMMER 2022

Trinity raised over \$50,000 internally for the project.

Due to the general lack of parks in the area, neighborhood kids were using the church parking lot to ride bikes and scooters and play. The church once had a playground, but we had to tear it down because the aging equipment was becoming a safety hazard. Now the community has access to a brand new park which includes an exercise and walking path that is wheelchair, stroller and walker friendly for people of all ages. The 55+ community nearby has access to a safe walking area.

The community is already enjoying this open-to-the-public park with a swing set, tire swing, ADA swing, toddler swing, spring toy and large climbing structure. The official ribbon-cutting happened on August 27th 2022.













PHASE 2 SUMMER 2023

The church intends to create a community park that is inclusive for everyone.


According to the ADA, an accessible playground must contain an accessible path from the parking lot to the edge of the play area, plus appropriate surfacing. Additionally, a person needs to be able to access the equipment once they are in the play area by transferring out of their mobility device or directly accessing a play structure in their mobility device. We will provide ADA-compliant ramps and surfacing, accessible swings, wheelchair accessible merry-go-round, U-Bounce, unity teeter totter, rocking cozy cocoon and sensory equipment. The nature of this project requires supplemental funds.

According to the 2020 Census, 50,000 people live in the Tri-Lakes area. Trinity Community Park will serve 3,000-5,000 people in the disabled community with access to a park that meets their needs. Statistics show that 12% of the US population have a severe disability that affects at least one function of daily living.

Monument needs a fully ADA-inclusive and compliant playground. The closest inclusive accessible public playground is over 30 miles away. ADA guidelines can be limiting, but this park will be inclusive giving kids of all abilities a place to play with those of developmental disabilities such as autism, cognitive, sensory, physical and other disabilities.

We have identified a substantial demand for a fully accessible inclusive playground in Northern El Paso County.

Phase 1 is now open to the public, we are seeking support for Phase 2. We are committed to this crucial project in our community and for all children of today and tomorrow. We are requesting your partnership in realizing our inclusivity and safety goals.

Making Phase 2 a reality in summer of 2023 creates a close, safe, inclusive play area for our children, adults and their families. Together we can build a park that is inclusive, diverse and unite everyone to play together.

More than 50,000 people in Northern El Paso County live in close proximity to the park. The pandemic has taught us how crucial it is for kids to have a safe, healthy outdoor facility to play. 

The memorial proceeds we received at his death were used to build the original playground at Trinity in 1993. 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Monument church breaks ground on accessible community park

MONUMENT • When a church's outdated playground required replacing, parishioners realized that unused church property could fill a bigger need.

Trinity Lutheran Church held a groundbreaking ceremony March 9 at 17750 Knollwood Drive, where an accessible playground comprised of a swing set, toddler swing and climbing structures will be installed.

An accessible playground allows children, with or without disabilities, to be able to use various playground equipment. Also, it invites parents, caregivers and siblings with disabilities into the play area to supervise children or participate in the fun.

The lack of an accessible playground in the Tri-Lakes region inspired the project. Also, the church parking lot, surrounded by housing with no nearby playground or outdoor recreational space, had evolved into a hangout for skateboarders and neighborhood kids.

Parishioner Tamara Schwarz learned that the closest universally accessible public playground is more than 10 miles from Monument. "The pandemic has taught us how important it is for kids to have a safe, healthy outdoor facility," Schwarz said in a press release.
