## Vaccinating Jackson:

#### City's MLK Center joins COVID-19 vaccination effort

It's a shot in the arm many Jackson residents, like Deborah Davis, have been waiting for. it. I'm impressed with the operation

here." Davis said after getting her COVID-19 vaccination at the Martin Luther King Jr. Recreation Center. Davis and dozens of other Jackson residents received shots on March 4 for Henry Ford Allegiance Health's first vaccine distribution event at the City-operated recreation center.

City officials say locating a vaccination site at the MLK Center, which is located in the heart of Jackson's south side neighborhood, increases vaccine access to Jackson's African American and low-income residents. According to data from Johns Hopkins University, black Americans are infected with COVID-19 at nearly three times the rate of white Americans. The data also shows black Americans are twice as likely to die from the virus. These numbers are ex-

plained by African Americans being more likely to have preexisting health conditions that make them more vulnerable, less likely to have health insurance, and more likely to have jobs that do not accommodate remote work.

Paula Autry, President and "It's a relief to get CEO of Henry Ford Allegiance Health, thanks the City and other local health providers for this collaboration. "Together, we can have a greater reach to ensure more of our most vulnerable neighbors are vaccinated against COVID-19. With every person vaccinated, we are another step closer to better protection and greater freedom for all of us." Autry said.

> Jackson resident Ricky Hurst also got his COVID-19 vaccination at the first distribution event. He says offering vaccines at the center will encourage people to get vaccinated. "I think some people might be afraid to get the shot, but the more we show African Americans like me getting it, I believe more people in the community will be at ease," Hurst said.

MLK Center Director Antonio Parker says he's thankful for this partnership with the health system.

"Seeing our neighbors come into the center to get vaccinated is a very powerful thing. The City is happy to provide this space for these front line workers to help Jackson beat the virus," Parker said.


COVID-19 vaccines will be available every Thurs-

day from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the center to those who are eligible to receive vaccinations according to the latest State of Michigan guidelines. Residents wanting to get vaccinated at the MLK Center can sign up through their health care provider. If they are an Allegiance Health patient, they can use the Henry Ford MyChart online platform. Community organizations, such as churches, can also be a reference for some residents. Walk-ins at the MLK Center vaccination site are welcome, provided you meet the current State qualifications. The MLK Center is located at 1107 Adrian St. and is reached by calling 517-788-4067.

# 2021 ALICE Report Shows Many Households in Jackson County Still Struggling To Achieve Financial Stability

Many individuals and families in Jackson County are still struggling to keep up financially, according to the latest statistics from the Michigan Association of United Ways.

The 2021 ALICE Report, released today, shows 38% of Jackson County's 61,403 households don't earn enough to exceed the ALICE threshold—the income needed to be financially stable.

That's a slight improvement over the 2019 report, which showed 42% of local households didn't meet the ALICE threshold. However, the new data also shows that while Jackson County ALICE households declined to 25% (vs. 29% in the 2019 report), the number of county households in poverty rose to 16% (vs. 13% in the 2019 report).

ALICE stands for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed. ALICE represents the growing number of households in communities nationwide that do not earn enough to afford household necessities.

The new numbers show there's much more work to do in Jackson County, according to Ken Toll, President & CEO of United Way of Jackson County.


"Our community depends on ALICE, yet ALICE is the most likely

to struggle during tough economic times," said Toll. "ALICE is most likely to be stuck in a low-paying iob, unable to generate the dollars needed to study or do workplace training to earn better pay. ALICE is most likely to fall into poverty when a car breaks, or a child gets sick, or a water heater fails.

"ALICE works hard, and ALICE deserves better. ALICE deserves a more equitable shot at the American dream. Because when ALICE succeeds, our whole community succeeds," he added.

Toll applauded MAUW, local United Ways and the Consumers Energy Foundation, which helped underwrite the latest report.

During the current fiscal year, UWJC is investing \$480,000 in 24 programs and initiatives to help individuals and families build pathways to financial stability. ## National Ferret Day – April 2

Did you know that a group of ferrets is called a business? Well, Imagine Planet's business has grown to 5! We still have Red and Blue (our neurologically impaired boy) and added Wesley and Buttercup as babies, donated by my daughter, Christina. Wesley was very small at the pet store and was at our house for special care. Sure enough, he and his companion won our hearts and they got along great with Red and even Blue. Then just recently we added Buddy to our group. If only we could harness their energy we wouldn't have an electric bill!

Ferrets are members of the order Carnivora and are not related to rodents, aside from both being mammals. Rodents are the favorite prey of the weasel family in the wild, but domestic ferrets do not need to eat them. Domestic ferrets are their own subspe-

cies of the European polecat, Mustela putorius furo. They have been domesticated for 2500 years. This domestication has resulted in an animal with very different behaviors than the polecat.

The ferret is curious, friendly, and full of energy. I like to think of them as kittens that don't grow up. They are long and skinny and can get into very small spaces, which made them perfect for hunting rodents. They are capable of killing small pets such as rodents, rabbits, and birds, although they generally don't eat them, and can injure larger prey animals. This is a leftover prey drive from their polecat ancestors. Caution should be used when they are interacting with prey Don't let your animals. guinea pig and ferrets out at the same time and secure cages. They generally get along great with dogs and cats.

Ferrets are often sold at 6-8 weeks old, already neutered or spayed and descented. It is important for pet jills (females) to be spayed as they can get an infection if they are not bred. Ferrets require regular vet visits and vaccinations. Their lifespan is from 6-10 years in captivity. They are not capable of surviving in the wild.

Many good commercial ferret foods are available. Like a cat, they are obligate carnivores and can only digest meat. Kitten food is a close second to a good ferret food. They need to have access to food at all times as they have high metabolisms. This also means that they poop a lot. They can be litter trained, but when they have to go, they have to go. If they are out of their cage, you will probably find little piles around.

Some people let their ferrets have free roam of the house. I have done this in the past with personal ferrets, until a horrible accident involving a dryer took the life of one of my babies.



Ferrets are also very good at finding the holes in your house and going outside. This can be very dangerous. At Imagine Planet our ferrets get 2 hours of supervised playtime each day, and sleep the rest. Only then do the other animals, like Bun Bun the rabbit and the small birds, get to come

Owning a ferret is a huge responsibility. They depend on their humans for everything and can get into a lot of mischief. Their cages need to be cleaned often. When the cages are clean, the ferrets themselves are quite clean and

don't smell much. They do not need baths unless they have gotten into something.

Ferrets can be a great addition to your family, as long as you are prepared to give them time and attention and are able to afford good food and vet care. When they get older, that care can involve surgeries and shots for some of the common ailments they get. Many ferrets end up being rehomed and we definitely want to reduce that. There is nothing quite like the sight of ferrets playing though. Come make an appointment to visit our "business" of ferrets!

We are confident that the future of the Annual Fairy Festival will benefit both our families and our effectiveness as an organization that aims to bring affordable arts education to Jackson County.

We do want to emphasize, however, that all Fairy Festival attendees will need a confirmed reservation prior to the event; we will not be permitting any "walk-on" attendees. 

The Jackson YMCA is opening its downtown facility to the community on Saturday, April 24 – and all are welcome to join the fun!


From 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on that Saturday, the Y will be offering fun activities and specials for kids and adults. All events are free of charge. Activities include:

BBBS will occupy approximately 1,000 square feet in the new facility, enabling Bigs (adult mentors) and Littles to utilize the YMCA gym, play equipment, community space and more for shared activities.

Many of the young peo-

ple currently mentored by BBBS adults also participate in the YMCA's summer day camp, afterschool program and holiday activities. Working more closely with BBBS will allow the Y to reach more kids and families by tailor programs and creating opportunities to meet the needs of Littles and their Bigs.

Both organizations have been serving their communities for a combination of over 175 years. The Jackson YMCA celebrated its 125th birthday on March 4, 2021. The Y mark the event with membership specials, tours, and the sale of promotional shirts. Proceeds from the celebration event will benefit the YMCA's Strong Kids Strong Communities annual campaign.

Jackson YMCA CEO Shawna Tello echoed Hollow's sentiments that the expanded partnership will assist both organizations to amplify their community impact. "Adult mentors have been able to bring Littles to the YMCA free of charge for years. This partnership has enabled them to enjoy time together and make memories in a safe, welcoming environment," Tello said.
