# **Jackson Plans New Community Kitchen & Job Training Center**

Jackson residents looking to start a food business or gain experience in the



food industry have new opportunities coming their way. At their Tuesday, March 22 meeting, the Jackson City Council voted to allocate \$2.5 million in American Rescue Plan (ARP) funds to a community kitchen and

job training center at the City's Masonic Temple building.

Plans call for renovating the ground and first floors of the 4-story historic building at 145 W. Cortland St. Once completed, the community kitchen will be available for residents needing a space to start and operate a small food-based business. The kitchen will also be used as a job training center to prepare residents for careers in the food industry.

City administration says a non-profit organization will be started to operate the kitchen and training center. The former Masonic Temple facility was bought by the City in 2017. Since then, extensive renovations have taken place to get it ready for future development. The adjoining Vermeulen's Furniture building on W. Cortland was sold by the City in 2020 and redeveloped as the new home of the Jackson School of the

Mayor Daniel Mahoney says this is an exciting opportunity for Jackson. "The development and investment to build the community kitchens is more than just an investment into the Masonic Temple, it is also an investment into the development of existing and aspiring food businesses in the City of Jackson," Mayor Mahoney said.

There is no timeline for when construction will start at the building. The City of Jackson received \$31 million in ARP funds in July 2021. Since then, more than \$10 million has been allocated to gun violence reduction efforts, public safety improvements, affordable housing initiatives, and infrastructure overhauls. # The Importance of Reading to Your Child

It's undeniable that a child's reading skills are essential to their success in school, work, and life in general. And it is very possible to help ensure your child's success by reading to them starting at a very early age. Continue reading to learn more about the top benefits of reading to children and how reading can support them in the future. The following are 4 Benefits:

- Supported cognitive development
- Improved language skills
- Preparation for academic success
- Developing a special bond with your child

### Supporting Cognitive Development

Reading to young children is proven to improve cognitive skills and help along the process of cognitive development. Cognitive development is the emergence of the ability to think and understand; it's "the construction of thought processes, including remembering, problem-solving, and decision-making, childhood through adolescence to adulthood" (HealthofChildren.com). It refers to how a person perceives and thinks about his or her world through areas such as information processing, intelligence, reasoning, language development, attention span, and memory. When you begin reading aloud to your child, it provides them with background knowledge of their young world, which helps them make sense of what they see, hear, and read. Introducing reading into your

young child's life prompts conversations and helps them to make sense of their own lives, especially at a young age.

### Improving Language Skills

Reading daily to young children, starting in infancy, can help with language acquisition, communication skills, social skills, and literacy skills. This is because reading to your children in the earliest months stimulates the part of the brain that allows them to understand the meaning of language and helps build key language, literacy, and social skills. These cognitive skills and critical thinking skills are especially important when you consider that, according to the American Academy of Pediatrics, more than one in three American children start kindergarten without the skills they need to learn to read. About two-thirds of children can't read proficiently by the end of the third grade.

### Preparing for Academic Success

Early reading with your child is a true one-on-one opportunity for children to communicate with their parents and parents to communicate with their children. It allows children to grow their vocabulary skills with exposure to new words and listening skills they develop from hearing someone read to them that become vital to their academic success. Studies have shown that "the more words that are in a child's language world, the more words they will learn, and the stronger their language skills are when they reach kindergarten, the more prepared they are to be able to read, and the better they read, the more likely they will graduate from high school" (PBS.org). Numerous studies have shown that students who are exposed to reading before preschool are more likely to do well when they reach their period of formal education. According to a study completed by the University of Michigan, there are five early reading skills that are essential for development. They are:

- 1. Phonemic awareness Being able to hear, identify, and play with individual sounds in spoken words.
- 2. Phonics Being able to connect the letters of written language with the sounds of spoken language.
- 3. Vocabulary The words kids need to know to communicate effectively.
- 4. Reading comprehension Being able to understand and get meaning from what has been read.
- 5. Fluency (oral reading) Being able to read text accurately and quickly.


While children will encounter these literacy skills and language development once they reach elementary school and beyond, you can help jumpstart their reading success by reading to them during infancy and their early toddler years.

### Developing a Special Bond with your Child


It goes without saying that reading to your young child on a regular basis can help you forge a stronger relationship with them. When it comes to children, one of the most important things

vou can do to positively influence their development is spend time with them. Reading to your children provides a great opportunity to set up a regular, shared event where you can look forward to spending time together. With shared reading, your child will trust and expect that you will be there for them. The importance of trust to small children cannot be overstated. Reading a favorite book to your children not only helps you bond with them, but also gives your children a sense of intimacy and wellbeing. This feeling of intimacy helps your child feel close to you, and the feel-

ings of love and attention encourage positive growth and development. Reading aloud together and having a shared activity gives you and your child something to talk about, which, in turn, supports the development of reading and writing skills (per the vocabulary and reading comprehension areas of development mentioned above). And down the road, reading together can be used to discuss real-life experiences and issues. A children's book can provide springboards to meaningful discussions about many different topics, further developing a child's critical thinking skills.





# The "Curly-Haired" Tarantula

Happy Spring, everyone! Our animal ambassadors are feeling the spring weather, and we are looking forward to being out and about this summer. First, we will be at the Jackson County Science Fest at Columbia Central High School on Saturday, April 9th, from 12 -3 pm. Then on April 16th, we will be at the YPOP (Young People of Purpose) event at 11 for the gardens. On April 23rd, we will be at the Annual Earth Day Celebration in the Park. The event will be held on Saturday, April 23rd, from 1 pm to 4 pm at the Cascades (Sparks Park Foundation County Park). Southside Festival Series is also kicking off on April 23rd, and while we can't be there this time (I haven't figured out how to be in two places at once), we are planning on being there on May 21st at Elnora Moorman Plaza. Be sure to watch our Facebook page for up-to-date information on happenings in Jackson.

I did some shopping at the MGMS Rock and Mineral Show in March and the new additions include a cockroach in amber, a bee fossil, and a fossil sperm whale tooth, among others. Come and check out our minerals and fossils and bring in up to ten specimens from your own collection to learn how to identify minerals and rocks. Non-tumbled and non-polished stones are best.

This month, our featured animal is our new curly-haired tarantula, Tliltocatl albopilosus. The species' native range is Nicaragua and Cos-

ta Rica, and they are primarily terrestrial, opportunistically burrowing spiders. The curly-haired tarantula is found in tropical scrubland, either around the base of large trees, near rivers, or in patches of cleared rainforest.

This tarantula is covered in long bristles that have a characteristic curl to them, giving them a unique look, which is why they are nicknamed "curly-haired" tarantulas.

The curly-haired tarantula is a plump-bodied spider, covered with dark brown to black bristles that start light in coloration as a juvenile and darken as the tarantula ages. It has a golden-bronze sheen due to longer gold bristles that cover the whole body, which are particu-

larly dense on the hind legs. In captivity, both male and female specimens have grown to have a leg span of just over 6 inches; however, males live a shorter life at only 5 years in captivity opposed to females reportedly living up to 20 years. Males are often a lighter bronze color than females.

Primarily a nocturnal, opportunistic ambusher, the curly-haired tarantula preys on insects and small vertebrates. An area


on the end of each leg is sensitive to smell, taste, and vibration, and is used to detect prey. The tarantula holds its prey with its pedipalps (front limbs) and injects it with venom delivered via two hollow fangs. This venom has a double purpose, paralyzing the prey, as well as beginning digestion. Once the venom has acted, the tarantula is able to suck up the proteins and fats of its prey, leaving just a small ball of undigested body parts. This usually docile tarantula will kick hairs off the abdomen with its hind legs when threatened, which causes blindness if they hit the eyes of a predator and can also cause a rash on the skin. Its bite is similar to a bee sting but can be dangerous if someone has

an allergic reaction.

As a pet, this species is quiet and docile, but is easily frightened, so handling should be kept at a minimum. We are letting our new friend adjust to the change in environment and will respect what is best for the animal. This species also requires a temperature between 75 and 85 degrees and 65 to 70 percent humidity, making our back room perfect for our new friend. Hopefully, it is a female and will be with us for a long time.

## **Exercising Post-COVID**

cise post-Covid, or after any illness or injury can be a tricky balance. When, where, and

how much to do as you start are all factors. However, there are a few guidelines to consider when deciding to return to your fitness program.

#### **Case By Case Basis**

Exercise is never one size fits all. The best advice will always be to check in with your doctor or health care professional before beginning any fitness program. Jordan Metzl, a sports medicine physician at the Sports Medicine Institute at the Hospital for Special Surgery in New York, had the following recommendation: "there's not a one-sizefits-all [solution], and every person that gets exposed to this has a different reaction, and their body fights it differently." This is excellent information to remember when getting back to your fitness routine. There are also more specific guidelines published by the American College of Cardiology's Sports & Exercise Cardiology Council that might be helpful to go over with your health care professional. Consider visiting your local provider or calling the office for a recommendation.

Husain, M.D., and Deann Crawford, RN, Henry Ford Allegiance Perioperative Services, have been honored with the Michigan Health & Hospital Association (MHA) Keystone Center Speak-up! Award. Due to their alertness and quick action, a serious surgical error was avoided.

The Henry Ford Allegiance Health surgical team was preparing a patient for a procedure to remove the right kidney. Following safety protocol, Nurse Crawford asked the patient to state which procedure was about to be done. The patient answered that the left kidney was being removed. Because this contradicted the related paperwork, Nurse Crawford immediately halted the process. Dr. Husain, the anesthesiologist, reviewed the patient's x-rays. which showed a mass on the patient's left kidney. She reported the error to the surgeon, and the surgeon corrected the patient's charting and marked the left side for surgery.

"Always asking the patient to identify the proce-Anesthesiologist Zeena dure they are about to have is a crucial safety measure. In this case, it alerted us to look further, even though all our records seemed to be in order. The safety protocols we have in place for every surgery help avoid human error," said Dr. Husain.

Launched in March 2016, the MHA Keystone Center Speak-up! Award recognizes individuals and teams within MHA Keystone Center Patient Safety Organization hospitals who speak up to prevent potential harm to patients or other staff members.

This award recognizes the importance of speaking up in the best interest of our patients," Nurse Crawford said. "I am honored to receive it and grateful to Henry Ford Allegiance Health for empowering all team members to voice our safety concerns."
