

Active Living in Jackson: Recreation Program **Keeps Seniors on the Move**

residents Kathy and sell were looking for ways stay active, they didn't have to look far.

"The program is definitely approachable and affordable. Everyone really enjoys it," said Kathy Fausell. The couple are familiar faces at the Parks and Recreation Department's Active Living Program, which the Boos Recreation Center. "It's great to spend time together and get exercise," Kathy said.

Active Living provides recreation activities for residents over 50 years old. Program Coordinator Julie Weisbrod says that when she started leading senior programs in 2021, there were around 400 members. "There's nearly 1,000 people enrolled now. The program is growing, and the word is getting out," Weisbrod said. Weisbrod says the Senior Program name change to Active Living combats perceptions about older adults. "We want the name to be uplifting. Some people believe that because you're a certain age, you're no longer relevant. The program em-

relevant and keep learning new things," Weisbrod said.

Active Living offers exercise classes, group activities, monthly luncheons, Mike Fau- and travel opportunities, taking participants on the day, overnight, and extended trips. Recent outings include visiting Nashville, Tenn., a play in Metro Detroit, and Kewadin Casinos in Michigan's Upper Peninsula. "We've been on a few of the trips, which were lovely. It's so much fun to climb on a bus and go somewhere. And you don't have to drive," said Mike Fausell.

"We try to bring in more active opportunities, and if they like it, they can continue on their own," Weisbrod said. Getting out of the house and mingling with others is a big part of the program. Beware of Scams this Holiday Season

Fraudsters often use the busyness of the holiday season to take advantage of consumers, hoping they will ignore the warning signs of a scam. Below are a few of the most common scams that consumers can fall victim to.

Scam #1: Imposter **Scams**

An imposter scam occurs when a fraudster pretends to be someone you trust, like your financial institution, using phone calls (vishing), text messages (smishing), or emails (phishing) to convince you to send them money or share personal information. The messages pressure you to act now or something bad will happen.

TIP: Always stop and verify before taking action. If something feels off, hang up or don't reply to the text or email. Contact the person or organization directly to make sure the information is legitimate. Never log into any of your accounts through a link - always go directly to the website or use your financial institution's secure app.

Scam #2: Too Good to **Be True Discounts**

items on platforms like Facebook Marketplace at a significant discount that require payment through apps such as Zelle, Venmo, Paypal, or Cash App. Once you send the money to the fraudster - it's gone.

TIP: Only use these payment methods with people you know and trust.

Check the site for signs of a scam and research the company through the Better Business Bureau, or a simple Google search for reviews.

Scam #3: Travel and **Airfare Scams**

Many people will shop for cheap airline tickets over the holiday season, leading fraudsters to target travelers with schemes ranging from bogus flight-booking websites to fraudulent flight cancellation emails and sudden price increases.

Warning signs of an airline scam:

- · A website or marketplace seller is offering airline tickets at a significant discount. Fake travel agencies advertise huge deals to try and get you to suspend your suspicions.
 - You're contacted and

> TIP: Purchase airline tickets directly from the airline (or through reputable third-party sellers that offer customer service). If you receive any messages about your trip, contact the airline

But the whole thing is a scam, and any money, information, or gifts you send go straight to the scammers.

Warning signs of a fake online store:

- · You're offered multiple aifts in return for sending money or presents to a stranger.
 - · You're asked for personal information in order to enter the exchange. Scammers can use this to steal your identity or target you with more scams.

TIP: Secret Santa exchanges can be a lot of fun, but make sure that you're join-

ing a group with people that you know and trust.

In these scams, you're asked to provide your name and address, along with the contact information of a few friends. Then, you're asked to send money or small gifts to a stranger on the list. In return, you'll receive mul-

Scam #5: Holiday Gift **Card Scams**

Never pay for goods, services, fees, fines, or taxes with gift cards. Fraudsters will impersonate vour bank, government agencies, or other authoritative people and demand payment in gift cards. If you buy gift cards in a store, make sure they haven't been tampered with, that the package is intact and not torn, and that the pin is still hidden. The barcode should have a

TIP: Get a receipt so that you can verify the purchase if your card is lost or stolen, and only purchase gift cards from reputable retailers. If you're buying online, check the store's URL to see if it's secure, and whenever possible, purchase gift cards from the actual retailer or company.

Scam #6: Fake Charity **Scams**

Scammers take advantage of your generosity during the holiday season and create fake charities, Go-FundMe campaigns, and other charitable activities. Charity scams can often be incredibly hard to spot - until you've lost money or given up sensitive information. Scammers often create "lookalike" charities that use variations of trusted names to fool you and will often try to pressure you into donating by using hard-sell tactics that can be threatening.

TIP: Always check the URL and charity name before donating. You can also check the legitimacy of the charity by using Wise Giving Alliance, Charity Navigator, and for any GoFund-Me campaigns look for the group organizer prior to donating.

Jackson Interfaith Shelter (JIS) is excited to announce the launch of its capital campaign to build a dedicated family shelter. The new facility aims to provide a safe, supportive environment for families experiencing homelessness in Jackson.

With the support of generous donors, this initiative will expand JIS's services,

offering increased capacity, privacy, and essential resources for families. The shelter will include private



rooms, communal spaces, and access to comprehensive programs, allowing families to regain stability and independence.

College & Career Access Center, December Scholarships

Science Ambassador Scholarship

Description: To apply, film a three-minute educational video of yourself explaining a STEM topic you're passionate about. To apply, you must be a high school senior or an undergraduate college student. Your video should be:

- A mini–lecture, not a personal statement. Pretend you're a lecturer speaking to a class. Teach us something.
- Clear, creative, accurate, and a demonstration of your passion for the subject. We value novel, memorable approaches to topics. Your video doesn't need to be fancy or high-tech. Production value is not a factor.
- Three minutes or less in length. Videos longer than this will not be considered. No exceptions!
- About any STEM topic, not necessarily your field of study. Pick a topic that excites and fascinates you. We don't need to hear about the latest thing in science news (unless that's your jam).
- Scientifically accurate. We encourage you to cite the sources used to research your topic. Ideally, this would be in a slide or frame at the end of your video. You can use any citation format you'd like.
- Uploaded to YouTube and marked 'public.' No exceptions!

Eligibility:

- Open to women in science, technology, engineering or math.
- Must attend college (or plan to attend college) in the United States or a United States Territory.
- Only open to undergraduate students and high school seniors.
- All fields within science, technology, engineering, and math are eligible.

Award: \$20,000

Deadline: December 16, 2024

Foreclosure.com Scholarship Program

Requirements: Essay of a minimum of 800 words to a maximum of 2,000

Essay Topic: The real estate market slowdown and its effect on foreclosures There is much speculation on how the current foreclosure market will evolve due to a variety of factors such as:

- Rising inflation costs.
- Rising mortgage rates and higher monthly mort-

gage payments.

- The expiration of COV-ID related forbearance and mortgage protection programs.
- Discuss how these factors will change the foreclosure market in the coming year

Many are predicting more foreclosure homes come on the market due to these factors, but there is some debate on how fast these properties may become available. Will rising inflation rates along with higher monthly mortgage payments see this happen gradually as the year progresses? Or will the expiration of the COVID protection programs be funneling a larger number of properties into the foreclosure market more quickly?

Award: Up to \$4,000 Deadline: December 15, 2024

Description: The BURG-ER KING McLAMORE Foundation is a U.S. based 501(c)(3) public nonprofit that believes without education you limit your potential to be your own way. It is our mission to create brighter futures by empowering individuals and feeding potential through education and emergency relief.

Eligibility:

- Be living in the United States, Canada or Puerto Rico
- Be graduating high school seniors (U.S. and Puerto Rico), graduating from grade 12 (Canada) or graduating from home school education in the U.S., Puerto Rico or Canada
- Have a cumulative high school grade point average of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale, or the equivalent
- Plan to enroll full-time, without interruption, for the entire 2022-23 academic year at an accredited two-or four-year college, university or vocational-technical school in the U.S., Canada or Puerto Rico

Award: \$1,000 - \$60,000 Deadline: December 16,

Equitable Excellence Scholarship

Description: Equitable Foundation has established the Equitable Excellence Scholarship Program to assist high school seniors who are planning to continue their education at a two- or

four-year college in the United States by Fall 2025.
