

> The atmosphere wasn't quite what I expected. The interior still reflects its previous life as a Mediterranean restaurant. However.


If you're looking for a quiet, out-of-the-way spot to enjoy good food at great prices, give Max's House of Pancakes a try.

At 36 pounds with a low-maintenance coat, he is the perfect blend of compact and carefree. He loves walks and seems to be working hard on his house-training. When it is time to leave his kennel, his whole body wingles with ex-

whole body wiggles with excitement. Vinnie is neutered and ready for his forever home. Dog adoptions reguire an application, which you can find online. The availability date is when the dog becomes JCAS property; however, any necessary medical procedures may cause a slight delay in the adoption process. A meet and greet with your dog is mandatory. A cat room walk-through is available to test reactions. Dogs will be

placed with approved applicants, and the adoption fee is \$150 for medium/large dogs and \$250 for puppies/small dogs, which includes vaccinations, microchip, and sterilization.

#### Cinnamon & Peaches

These big orange beauties are Cinnamon and Peaches. They were sur-



rendered when their owner faced health issues, and they have relied on each other ever since. Because they came in together and are true best buddies, they hope to be adopted as a pair. Both are declawed on all four feet. Cinnamon is the darker orange, 14 years old, about 12 pounds, with a fluffy coat that gives him a bit of a Maine Coon look. Peaches is 8 years old, around 15 pounds, and has a beautiful buff-colored long

coat. Quiet, friendly, and mellow, they get along well with other cats and enjoy relaxing together. Cinnamon and Peaches are looking for a calm indoor home where they can stay side by side. Stop by and meet them today at the Jackson County Animal Shelter, 3370 Spring Arbor Rd., Jackson, Michigan. Cat adoption fees are

\$60 for one cat, \$80 for two, which will include applicable tests, vaccines and spay/neutering. Any necessary medical procedures may slightly postpone

## Pig Butchering Scams on the Rise

While the term may sound unsettling, "pig butchering" is considered an artform in the eyes of a fraudster. These scammers methodically manipulate their victims, taking time to "fatten them up" emotionally and financially before the final "slaughter"—when they take as much money as possible and disappear.

These scams often begin when a victim receives an "accidental" text or message from the fraudster. However, these contacts are rarely accidental. Scam-

mers typically purchase phone numbers obtained through data breaches and send out mass messages, hoping someone takes the bait. Even a simple reply like "wrong number" can open the door for the scammer to strike up a conversation



As pig butchering scams have become more prevalent, certain patterns have emerged:

- "Accidental" contact: Fraudsters frequently pretend they reached out by mistake. While initial contact often occurs via text, it can also happen through social media DMs, dating sites, or other digital platforms.
- Crypto or investment hook: Once a conversation begins, the fraudster gradually introduces a fake investment opportunity—often involving cryptocurrency, gold trading, or forex (foreign exchange) markets. These so-called investments are complete fabrications; any money sent goes directly to the scammer.
  - Extended communication: After

building trust, the scammer pushes for continued investments. They may share fake charts, forged screenshots showing unrealistically high returns, or even allow small "withdrawals" to convince the victim that their money is growing. Victims are often directed to apps that mimic legitimate financial platforms like Robinhood or Coinbase.

Group manipulation: Some scammers add victims to fake group chats filled with others discussing investmentsthese are usually controlled entirely by the scammer, either through fake profiles or other accomplices.

> Pig butchering scammers are relentless. Even after a victim has exhausted their savings, the scammer may pressure them to borrow money or take out loans for further "investments."

> Eventually, the scam comes to an end. Once


the fraudster determines the victim has no more funds, or begins to suspect the deception, they abruptly cut off all communication.

The most effective way to protect yourself from pig butchering scams is to treat any unexpected or seemingly accidental contact with caution. A general rule of thumb: Don't respond to unsolicited messages from strangers, whether they come via text, WhatsApp, Telegram, social media, or dating apps. As generative AI becomes more sophisticated, even "wrong number" phone calls or video chats can be part of these elaborate schemes.

## Jackson Community Foundation Scholarships

Your application gives you access to 30+ different scholarships. Eligibility requirements vary from minimum GPA, area of study, new graduate or returning learner, financial need, etc. If you meet the eligibility requirements for any of our scholarships, you will automatically be added to that scholarship's pool of candidates (with the exception of the Bernice Barabash Sports Scholarship - see below) saving your time searching which scholarship you should apply for.

Details: Eastern Michigan's Presidential Scholarships are awarded competitively using the application process detailed below. Qualified students apply to receive our largest academic award. In addition to completing the application process, interested prospective students will need to meet the following criteria:

 Be officially admitted to EMU as a traditional incoming Freshman for Fall 2026

- Applicants must have at least a 3.5\*\* cumulative GPA and 25 composite ACT or 1200 SAT
- Complete application information (detailed below) by December 15, 2025.
- Students must register for the Presidential Scholarship by December 15, 2025.
   \* Registration will become

available in August 2026.

Once registered, you will receive an email with our

required supplemental application.

Award: Full Ride (valued at approximately \$73,600 over four years)
