credit cards, how high your interest rate will be, and how much your payments will be. A high credit score is best for obtaining loans with a good interest rate.

A Credit Score is credit

a number, typically between 300 - 850, that represents your worthiness. It is based on several factors including payment history, the amount of debt you owe, and how long

### Program Helps Jackson Police Identify People with Communication Difficulties

partment is reminding the community of a program that helps missing communication difficulties. The

Take Me Home Program is designed to assist officers in the identification of people with Autism, Alzheimer's disease, dementia, Down syndrome, or any other condition that makes it difficult to communicate.

Jackson police encourage caregivers of people with limited speech abilities to sign up for the program on the City website by visiting cityofjackson.org/985/ Take-Me-Home. This website section features a form where caretakers submit an individual's information such people with as name, address, description, condition, and emergency contact. A current photo of the person is also required. All of the information provided will be used by officers to care for someone with communication difficulties if they are encountered by police or if an active search is underway.

Police Chief Elmer Hitt says JPD launched the Take Me Home Program in 2020 and has seen dozens of local families participate. "The program is free to sign up and the information vou provide is confidential." Chief Hitt said. "Enrolling in this program will assist our officers in caring for your loved one during their time of need. We also hope this will give families and caregivers some peace of mind if someone goes missing."

The program is only open to City of Jackson residents. Non-city residents should contact their local law enforcement to inquire about a similar service.

here. The availability date is when the dog becomes JCAS property; however, any necessary medical procedures may cause a slight delay in the adoption process. A mandatory meet & greet with your dog is essential. A cat room walk-through is available to test reactions. Dogs will be placed with approved applicants, and the adoption fee

is \$150 for medium/large dogs and \$250 for puppies/ small dogs, which includes vaccinations, microchip, and sterilization.

#### **Buffy & Ginger**

Buffy and Ginger were surrendered to the animal shelter after their owner passed away. These two are great buddies and



would love to stay together.

Ginger is a vibrant orange, four-year-old cat with a big personality. He's outgoing, talkative, and loves to hang out by your feet. Buffy, also 4 years old, has a lighter orange coat with white markings. He's affectionate but a bit more reserved, enjoying quiet attention.

Both boys are large cats, weighing 16 and 18

pounds. Since they've been declawed on their front paws, they're looking for an indoor-only home where they can stay safe and comfortable. Stop by and meet them today at the Jackson County Animal Shelter, 3370 Spring Arbor Rd., Jackson, Michigan. Cat adoption fees are \$60 for one cat, \$80 for two, which

will include applicable tests, vaccines and spay/neutering. Any necessary medical procedures may slightly postpone an adoption. While visiting the shelter is

## The Importance of Spaying and Neutering: A Vital Step for Pet Health and Population Control

As February marks National Spay and Neuter Month, Cascades Humane Society is dedicated to spreading awareness about the crucial role spaying and neutering play in the health and well-being of our beloved pets. To commemorate this important month, CHS will be hosting a Free Spay and Neuter Day on February 28th, where Dr. Sarah Patrias and her skilled team, including Krista Collins, Christina Miller, and Danielle Villegas, Director of Shelter Operations, will perform 28 free surgeries. Half of these procedures will be dedicated to feral cats in an effort to control the stray population, while the remaining surgeries will be granted to pet owners who have demonstrated financial need through an application process.

#### Why Spaying and **Neutering Matters**

Spaying (for female animals) and neutering (for males) offer numerous benefits for both individual pets and the community at large. Here's why this procedure is essential:

Reducing Overpopulation and Homelessness

The most significant reason to spay and neuter pets is to prevent unwanted litters, which contributes to the overwhelming number of homeless animals in shelters. Every year, approximately 6.3 million companion animals enter U.S.

animal shelters, with 3.1 million being dogs and 3.2 million being cats. Tragically, 920,000 shelter animals are euthanized annually, cluding 390,000 dogs and 530,000 cats. preventing unintended breeding, we can reduce the

number of animals that end up abandoned or euthanized.

Health Benefits for Pets

Spaying and neutering can greatly improve a pet's overall health and longevity. Here's how:

 Lower Cancer Risks: Spaying eliminates the risk of ovarian and uterine cancer in females, while neutering prevents testicular cancer in males.

 Reduced Risk of Infection: Spayed females are protected from life-threatening uterine infections like pyometra, which can be fatal if untreated.

• Decreased Aggressive Behaviors: Neutered males are often less aggressive, less likely to roam, and less prone to marking territory

with urine spraying.

· Eliminates Heat Cycles: Spayed females won't experience heat cycles, which can be stressful for both the pet and the owner.

Curbing Problematic Behaviors

Neutered males are generally less prone to roaming, which reduces the risk of being hit by cars or getting into fights with other animals. Additionally, spaying and neutering can help prevent unwanted behaviors like excessive barking, howling, or mounting.

Reducing Costs for Pet **Owners** and the Community

Unplanned litters can

be costly for pet owners, and the expense of caring

> for stray and abandoned animals places a financial burden on shelters and taxpayers. It is estimated that local governments spend over \$2 billion annually on stray animal control and sheltering. By preventing overpopulation,

communities save money and resources that can be redirected toward other critical animal welfare programs.

#### Free Spay and Neuter Day at CHS

On February 28, Cascades Humane Society will take direct action by offering 28 free spay and neuter procedures. This event will not only help curb overpopulation but also ensure that pet owners who might not otherwise afford the surgery can provide their animals with essential healthcare.

Cascades Humane Society is committed to making a difference, and through initiatives like this, we continue to advocate for responsible pet ownership.



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### College & Career Access Center, February Scholarships

### Jackson Community Foundation Scholarships

Description: One application gives you access to 30+ different scholarships. Eligibility requirements vary from minimum GPA, area of study, new graduate or returning learner, financial need, etc.

Deadline: February 12, 2025 at 5:00 p.m.

### Community Leaders Scholarship

Description: To help students who are seeking a career in public service and who have an interest in helping others in their communities, we have created the Spencer & Associates Community Leaders Scholarship. Through this program, we provide financial assistance to college students who have demonstrated an interest in serving their communities and who are pursuing careers in criminal justice, law enforcement, or other legal fields.

Eligibility:

- Applicant must be from a household with an annual family income of \$100,000 or less.
- Applicant must have a demonstrated interest in service to their community, with a history of volunteer work or other forms of community involvement.
- Applicant must be enrolled in or planning to enter a program in the fields of criminal justice or law enforcement, or they must be enrolled in or planning to attend law school.
- Applicant must be at least 17 years old on the date they submit their application.
- Applicant must be a U.S. citizen or Lawful Permanent Resident.

Award: \$1,000 Deadline: February 10, 2025

#### Michigan Education Association (MEA) Scholarship

Description: The Michigan Education Association is an organization dedicated to the principles of public education, advancement of quality education, and security of the rights of education employees. There are approximately 120,000 members of MEA, who are public K-12 teachers and education support

professionals; higher education faculty and educational support personnel; employees of intermediate school districts; and **MEA-Retired** members. Throughout its long history, MEA has remained committed to quality education and retains a prominent leadership position as a strong advocate for public education. As one means of demonstrating its commitment to public education, the MEA has established and offers the MEA Scholarship.

Eligibility:

- Dependent of MEA member or MEA-Retired member in good standing.
- Graduate of a Michigan public high school or private high school that has an MEA bargaining unit. (Diploma must be received in the year of application.)
- · Will attend or is curan undergradurently ate student of a Michigan community/junior public college, four-year degreegranting institution, or vocational training institution that grants a degree, certification or license. Those attending the following private institutions ONLY are also eligible: Baker College-Flint/Owosso; University of Detroit-Mercy; Adrian College; Finlandia University; and Albion College. (The aforementioned private institutions are existing local MEA affiliates.)
- Note: Children of MEA officers, fund trustees, and MEA staff are not eligible. (A child of an MEA, MESSA or MEA-FS staff person is eligible if the other parent is an MEA member in good standing).

The scholarship will not be awarded for the purpose of working on a postbaccalaureate degree.

2025 Hispanic Scholarship Fund

Description: Are you a Hispanic student planning on enrolling full-time in a four-year university or graduate school for the upcoming school year? If so, consider applying to the Hispanic Scholarship Fund! Every year, the Hispanic Scholarship Fund selects ~10,000 outstanding students as HSF Scholars

from a broad and talented pool of applicants. HSF Scholars have access to a full range of invaluable Scholar Support Services, including career services, mentorship, leadership development, knowledge building, and wellness training. HSF awards more than \$30 million in Scholarships annually and, depending upon available funds, HSF Scholars may also be eligible to receive a scholarship, which range from \$500-\$5,000 and are awarded directly to students. Keep on reading to learn more!

Eligibility:

- Must be of Hispanic heritage.
- U.S. citizen, permanent legal resident, or DACA.
- Minimum of 3.0 GPA on a 4.0 scale (or equivalent) for high school students; minimum of 2.5 GPA on a 4.0 scale (or equivalent) for college and graduate students.
- Plan to enroll full-time in an accredited, public or

not-for-profit, four-year university, or graduate school, in the US, for the 2025-2026 academic year.

• Submit the FAFSA or state-based financial aid forms (if applicable).

Award: ranges from \$500 to \$5,000

*Deadline:* February 15, 2025

#### Vegetarian Resource Group Scholarships

Description: Applicants will be judged on having shown compassion, courage, and a strong commitment to promoting a peaceful world through a vegetarian diet/lifestyle. Winners of the scholarships give permission to release their names to the media. Applications and essays become property of The Vegetarian Resource Group. Students must submit an essay, a copy of their transcripts for the last two years of high school, a minimum of three recommendations of which at least one recommendation

must come from a teacher, and documentation regarding their passion and promotion of vegetarianism (such as published articles, photos, and newspaper stories). Finalists may be asked for more information.


Eligibility:

- Entries may only be sent by students graduating from high school in Spring 2025.
- Students must demonstrate an active role and a strong commitment in promoting a vegetarian/vegan diet and lifestyle (vegetarians do not eat meat, fish, or fowl).
- Students must attend a college or university in the U.S.

Award: One award of \$10,000 and six awards of \$5,000
