



diately think of versatility," says Marisa. "I can crunch on whole almonds as a snack, make a creamy almond butter-based dip or sip on a frosty almond milk smoothie."

2. They're handy

Almonds are a pantry staple. Marisa shares she likes to keep a jar on her desk or office shelf for an easy and nourishing snack whenever she needs one. Some of Marisa's favorite pairings include almonds with chocolate, fresh peaches or cheeses. "I snack anytime I'm hungry - between meals or simply when I want a little pick-me-up during the day," she explains.

3. Help keep your energy levels going

There's nothing like those summer nights. Many look forward to those evening outings; however, many find there's not enough energy for them. Considering this, you need to consume

foods that not only fuel you up, but also make you feel good. "Just one ounce of almonds has 6 grams of power-packed protein, 4 grams of fiber, 13 grams of unsaturated fat and only 1g of saturated fat," shares Marisa.

4. They fit your schedule Finding a wellness routine that fits within your schedule can be tricky at first. "On busy weeks, having a few meals and snacks ready to go are my saving grace," Marisa shared. "I think it's most important to listen to your body and find an eating routine that matches your energy needs. Whether you eat at a usual breakfast hour or if your first meal is a bit

later, it's a personal choice."

The following is a general B/L/D plan Marisa likes to incorporate into her daily routine:

Breakfast: Greek yogurt or oats with seasonal fruit, almond butter and maple syrup to top it off.

Lunch: Veggie-packed omelet with fresh fruit.

Snack: "I love watching almond milk swirl through the tea as I make my iced chai lattes. It's pleasantly spicy, cool and creamy - the perfect summer sip!" Marisa exclaims.

Dinner: A roasted vegetable flatbread or fish tacos accompanied with beans and rice.

5. They're rich in antioxidant vitamin E

Vitamin E is an antioxidant that helps protect cells from damage, boost the body's immune system and widen blood vessels to keep blood from clotting within them. That said, almonds include 50% of your daily value of vitamin E! "I love a snack that does double-duty," says Marisa. In addition to the 6g of protein, good fats and fiber, a recent study looked at almonds and wrinkles - beauty from the inside out.

That means time spent at the lake, picnics, park visits, and hitting the trails for a little hiking. Jackson County is fortunate to have a wide variety of trails and I encourage you to visit several this summer. This month, I am narrowing it down to my per-

sonal favorite: the Falling Waters Trail.

Having lived just off the trail for years, I can share from personal experience what an amazing place it is. This trail is paved so it is ideal for a walk, bike ride, or stroller usage. With an expansive width, you do not have to

stroller or pulling a wagon. It's 10.5 miles long and has many access points along the way. From Jackson County's website:

"The Falling Waters Trail has Native American History-The earliest recorded inhabitants of the Falling Waters Trails were the Pottawatomie natives, who had major encampments near the trail, as well as burial sites and council grounds. The name, Falling Waters Trail, honors the Pottawatomie pets village of the "Kitch-ti'ki-pi" or Big Springs. Jackson County is headwaters to four Michigan rivers and the Land of Falling Waters was the Native American name for this area."

Jackson YMCA Completes Schematic Design and Adjusts Build Timeline

The Jackson YMCA has finalized the design and released updated renderings of the exterior of the planned new downtown facility. The Y's architect/ engineers Bergmann PC completed design work on a roughly 75,000-square-foot new facility.

The Y is in the final phase of a campaign to raise funds for a healthy living campus in the heart of downtown. The YMCA, celebrating its 125th year of service in Jackson, has raised more than \$22 million in pledges and contributions.

"The new two-story YMCA will feature contemporary multipurpose rooms for youth and adult programs, improved accessibility throughout the facility with elevator access to all program areas, and a dedicated youth learning lab space," said CEO Shawna Tello. "Working in collaboration with partners like Big Brothers Big Sisters, the Y will be able to meet the needs of a broader crosssection of our community as well as the high expectations of members, partners and program participants."

Bergmann's design of the new facility, overseen by the YMCA's volunteer-led Building and Design Committee and Y staff, will allow the YMCA to offer:

- Licensed after-school
- · Science and mathrelated activities in the new STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Math)
- Youth, middle school, teen, and adult program-



ming, along with community rentals in the multi-purpose and intergenerational rooms.

Many program spaces in the new facility will be named in recognition of the major donors that are supporting their development and delivery. Assigned naming rights within the new facility include the Consumers Energy Foundation/Aquatics Center; Dawn Foods Corporate Giving/Gymnasium; Richmond Brothers Inc./Y Main Street; Henry Ford Allegiance Health/ Wellness Center; American 1 Credit Union/Lobby & Welcome Area; TRUE Community Credit Union/Teen & Intergenerational Room and County National Bank/Outdoor Play Area.

The Y's Building and Design team continues to work with Bergmann and Gro Development Inc., a leader in design and development of YMCAs, to develop the branding, fit and finish of the new facility. The Y's Capital Campaign committee's efforts to identify philanthropist, funders and local foundations willing to support the YMCA and invest in its potential are ongoing.

Following completion of schematic design, YMCA members of the Building

Co., the project's construction manager. Senior Project Manager Jeff Havranek said COVID-19 and the global pandemic have impacted and continue to affect availability and prices of commercial construction materials, supplies and la-

"The lead time for structural components, in particular steel joists and metal decking, have extended from what was about 12-16 weeks up to what is now 40plus weeks," said Havranek, noting the rise in steel, lumber and drywall prices due to the current shortage in materials. Havranek added requisite materials ranging from structural and roofing materials, drywall and more would not be available in time to begin construction during this calendar year.

In response to the construction industry market conditions, the Y has adjusted its construction timeline. Based on the expected closure of the fundraising gap and resolution of supply chain issues, Granger is expected to begin site work in the first half of 2022, with construction typically between 12-16 running months.

"The YMCA is proud of campaign leadership and and grateful for the tremendous progress we've enand Design Committee met joyed in the past year. While we made major strides in


said Tello.

New Community Gardens Bringing Fresh Produce to Jackson City Neighborhoods

It's a small patch of



land that's about to Jackson. "We hope this garden will get folks excited

about some fresh produce," said Payge Lindow, Farm Manager for Grow Jackson. Over the summer, this 1/4 acre at the Martin Luther King Jr. Recreation Center will be transformed into a community garden to feed local families.

It's an effort from Grow Jackson, a new non-profit created by Jacob Inosencio. "Our mission is to end food insecurity and hunger in Jackson though increased access to fresh food," Inosencio said. Earlier this spring, the group started work on shaping community gardens at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Downtown Jackson and the MLK Center on Jackson's south side. Grow Jackson's founder and board president says when he approached the City about a garden project, they offered land at the recreation center. "The City is helping us with irrigation for the garden and future programming through the MLK Center," Inosencio said.

A wide variety of produce is set to grow in the

MLK garden over the sum- when they need it," Parker mer. "We want this to be a one-stop shop for people to get produce, such as kale, broccoli, tomatoes, peppers, onions, berries, make a big and lettuce greens, along difference with corn, beans, squash, and herbs," Lindow said. The garden is also supported by Consumers Energy and Henry Ford Allegiance Health. Once fruits and vegetables are ready for harvesting, Grow Jackson is planning on opening a farm stand at the MLK Center, where produce will be offered at low costs and to families using food assistance programs. "We have a commitment to helping Jackson's neighborhoods, so what we grow here is for the community," Inosencio

They estimate the garden has the potential to feed around 60 families a week. With only two grocery stores in the City Limits, Grow Jackson is mindful of the challenges some residents face getting healthy food. "A lack of fresh food in low-income areas is not because of a lack of desire, it comes from systemic issues. We are trying to be intentional in fighting that problem," Inosencio said.

MLK Center Director Antonio Parker says he is enjoying watching the garden sprout up. "This is an awesome thing for Jackson. I am looking forward to seeing our neighbors come here to get fresh produce

Those interested in donating or volunteering with Grow Jackson can visit their website, growjackson. org. They are also active on Facebook and Instagram. Once Grow Jackson sees the fruits of their labor in the gardens, they hope to help Jackson residents start their own urban farms. "When you have that control over what you're putting in your body or feeding your kids, that's a huge thing for mental health and to empower the community," Lindow said.



Amphibians include a marbled salamander,




axolotls, and a White's tree frog. As for invertebrates, we have a tarantula and Madagascar Hissing Cockroaches. We have numerous fish as well.
