

Availability date is when the dog becomes JCAS property; any necessary medical procedures may delay an adoption. A meet & greet with your dog is mandatory. A cat room walk-through is available to test reaction. Dogs will go to approved applicants; the adoption fee is \$150 medium/large dogs, \$250 puppies/small dogs which includes vaccinations, microchip, and sterilization.

Charm is dressed in her best tuxedo, ready to celebrate a new home. She was a stray who is 4 years old, mostly black in color with white markings. Guess Who: It's Severus Snake

One of the original snakes at Imagine Planet is Severus Snake, our corn snake (Pantherophis guttatus). He was donated when he was 10 years old and thanks to proper care then and now, he is 15 years old and still doing great.

Corn snakes are native to the southeastern United States and are most closely related to king and milk snakes. They are not found in Michigan in the wild. They get their name from being found around grain and corn cribs, not because they eat corn! Like all snakes, they are carnivores, and in the corn snake's case, they consume the rodents that eat the corn. For this reason, they are considered a beneficial snake for humans. They are a species of least concern.

In the wild, they usually live around six to eight years, but in captivity are more likely to live between 16 and 20 years old, and can live to an age of 23 years or more.

Wild corn snakes prefer habitats such as overgrown fields, forest openings, trees, palmetto flatwoods, and abandoned or seldom-used buildings and farms, from sea level to as high as 6,000 feet.

Corn snakes are a great beginner snake. They are constrictors, not venomous, grow to from 3 to 5 feet long, are hardy, and are generally docile and curious. They are fairly easy to breed; however snakes sold as pets should be captive bred as they lay eggs, but do not care for them.

Adults need at least a 20 gallon aguarium, although bigger is better. They are escape artists and special care needs to be taken to prevent this, like cage clips. They can even climb trees, right up the bark!

Corn snakes have been selectively bred for color, pattern, and scale shape variations. Color types or "morphs" include blood red, candy cane, blizzard, butter, and sunglow. Pattern morphs include the striking stripe pattern. Some of these snakes have even been bred to have no scales! Severus is an amelanistic morph, meaning there is no black on his body. He is orange with red blotches and red eyes.

If this has sparked interest in corn snakes for you, there are many sources for more information. Corn snakes are readily available at pet stores or shows and most range between \$50



and \$100, depending on how rare the morph is. Use the money you save on the animal and get the best cage setup you can get. In the meantime, come visit Severus here at Imagine Planet or at the Learning Fair July 8th and 9th.

A Habitat in the City: Habitat for Humanity Making an Impact in Jackson Neighborhoods

While many see a boarded up, blighted house on



Jackson's Napoletano sees potential. "This house means ev-

erything for my family. Better living, more space, and new opportunities," Napoletano said. The future first-time homeowner and her five children attended a groundbreaking event in May to celebrate the start of construction on their new home.

This fresh start for a Jackson family is made possible by Greater Jackson Habitat for Humanity. The local organization bought the home on Hibbard Avenue from the City of Jackson for a rehabilitation project. Habitat is looking forward to transforming the property from an eyesore back into a family home. "Building inside the City Limits is where we see the biggest need, and where we see the biggest opportunity," said Wendy Clow, Executive Director of Greater Jackson Habitat for Humanity.

With rising construction costs in mind, Clow says rehabs of existing houses means they can make projects more affordable. "It's a way for families with modest household incomes to afford modest-priced houses," Clow said.

Another strategy to keep construction costs down is buying vacant lots owned by the City. In April, Habitat also broke ground on De-Land Pointe, a residential development that will bring six single family homes to a neighborhood south of Downtown Jackson. Located on one City block bound by Franklin, Mechanic and Mason streets, future residents of these homes will be close to all that Jackson has to offer. Clow says connectivity is another benefit to doing projects in the City. "When we put families in houses, it's important that they are in neighborhoods where they have access to the things they need," Clow said.

The DeLand Pointe project is the result of a collaboration between Habitat, the

Community Action Agency, and City of Jackson. City Manager Jonathan Greene says he's inspired to see a community collaboration to make lives better for lonorthwest cal families. "Rebuilding side, Sara Jackson is going to take the teamwork of our residents, community partners, and City government. It's exciting to see these efforts underway and to consider what we can do in the future," Greene said.

> Construction on the De-Land Pointe project will take place in the coming years, with full completion expected

in 2023. Napoletano is looking forward to moving into her home by the end of the

year. "It's in a quiet neighborhood with other families, plus I am close to a lot of the

places I need to go. I thank Habitat for this opportunity," Napoletano said.

Fighting Lead Exposure with Nutrition

When lead is consumed, research shows it can cause learning and behavior problems. As it accumulates, it can cause lasting problems with growth and development. Infants and children are at a higher risk because they absorb lead more quickly than adults, in addition to being more likely to put non-food items that might contain lead in their mouth.

Eat a Healthy Diet to Help Decrease Lead Absorption

Follow the 2015 Dietary Guidelines to include a variety of vegetables, fruits, whole grains, protein foods and dairy products. When there is healthy food in the body, it is more difficult for lead to be absorbed. Make sure your diet is rich in important nutrients such as calcium, iron and vitamin C.

Calcium keeps your bones strong and the lead out. Calcium-rich foods include:

• Milk and milk products, such as yogurt and cheese

- Green leafy vegetables, including kale and turnip, mustard and collard greens
- Calcium-fortified foods, such as orange juice, soy milk and tofu



• Canned salmon and sardines Iron also blocks lead from being absorbed. Try these iron-rich foods:

- Lean red meats
- · Iron-fortified cereal, bread and pasta

- · Dried fruit, such as raisins and prunes
- Beans and lentils

Vitamin C helps the body absorb iron better, but also may help with getting rid of lead. Foods rich in vitamin C include:

- Citrus fruits, such as oranges and grapefruit
- Other fruits such as kiwi, strawberries and melon
- Tomatoes
- Potatoes
- Peppers

STEM Activities go Virtual Over Summer Break to Keep Kids Engaged with Learning


