

The music continues with the International Music Festival, which is happening July 12-14. The music festival will feature a diverse range of music acts performing at the Michigan Theatre of Jackson.

don't know everyone reading this, your likes and dislikes, or how you take your coffee (or if

you even like coffee!). But I can guarantee that all of you would agree with this statement: everyone deserves to build the foundation for a strong, healthy future for themselves and their families — no matter where they live or how much money they earn.

It mirrors the American Dream:

"A national ethos of the United States, the set of ideals in which freedom includes the opportunity for prosperity and success, as well as an upward social mobility for the family and children, achieved through hard work in a society with few barriers."

Every family deserves the chance to thrive.

I'm excited to share with you a new national advocacy campaign Habitat for Humanity is launching this month that will help us make the cost of home something we can all af-

At Habitat for Humanity, our shared vision is a world where everyone has a decent place to live.

Habitat for Humanity began in 1976 as a grassroots effort on a community farm in southern Georgia. Since then, we have grown to become a leading global nonprofit working in local communities across all 50 states in the U.S. and in more than 70 countries.

Families and individuals in need of a hand up partner with Habitat for Humanity to build or improve a place they can call home. Habitat homeowners help build their own homes alongside volunteers and pay an affordable mortgage. Affordable homeownership frees families and fosters the skills and confidence they need to invest in themselves and their communities. The outcomes can be long-lasting and life chang-

Through financial support, volunteering or adding a voice to support affordable housing, everyone can help families achieve the strength, stability and self-reliance they need to build better lives for themselves.

At our Habitat affiliate here in Jackson we are building new homes in the City of Jackson with the goal of providing self-reliance through stable housing for 15 families in the next 5 years, and performing critical home repairs for as many as 12-15 elderly people, veterans, and single moms each year who own their homes but don't Driven by this vision, have the means to finance these repairs on their own.

The reality is that families all across the United States are paying too high a price to cover the cost of their home. Rents and homeownership costs are skyrocketing, while wages are not keeping pace. Families are struggling to make ends meet. Everywhere you look-cities, suburbs, rural areas—the stability that home should bring remains out of reach for too many.

1 in 6 families don't have the personal and economic stability that safe, decent and affordable housing provides.

We can't meet need through building alone. We can't reach our vision of a world where everyone has a decent place to live without addressing the underlying policies and systems that hinder access to hous-

When the cost of home is your family's future, the cost is too high. And when the cost of home is any family's future, that's something none of us can afford.

That's why Habitat for Humanity is working to ensure that no family has to pay more than half of their paycheck to cover the cost of home.

At Habitat we know the complexities related to home costs. We also know the struggle, stress and pain of far too many families in our community. We know that those with the fewest resources are forced to make the hardest choices. And, we know that, working together, we can do something about it on a grander scale.

This is why Habitat is launching our first national advocacy campaign this month called Cost of Home.

Through the campaign Habitat will look to engage housing advocates, Habitat homeowners, volunteers and supporters, and federal, state and local policymakers to advance access to safe, decent and affordable homes.

While there is no silver bullet to solving the nation's home affordability challenge, we have identified four core subthemes and underlying policy issues that the Cost of Home campaign explains are critical to help families achieve home affordability.

- 1. Increasing supply and preservation of affordable homes
- 2. Optimizing land use for affordable housing
- 3. Equitably increasing access to credit
- 4. And finally: ensuring access to communities of opportunity

On June 10, the Jackson YMCA kicks off a summer experience that is camp also features new experiences: much more than just camp.

At YMCA Summer Day Camp, held June 10-August 16, kids will swim, run, play and explore in an environment that helps them learn and grow. Megan stressed that campers are in good hands with the summer camp counselors, who are all CPR and First Aid certified. "Our well-trained staff serves as positive role models," she said. "They will help our campers gain confidence as they are exposed to new challenging and fun experiences in an atmosphere that fosters fairness, teamwork, and cooperation."

Along with trips to favorite destinations such as Michigan's Adventure

and Cedar Point and activities like swimming, rock wall and gym games,

- Campers will spend time at the Shop Rat Foundation for a hands on learning experience with various equipment, welding and more, June 24-28
- Offered for ages 5-9, STEM camp includes all kinds of experiments and glow-in-the-dark slime, July 1-5.

Joining the Youth Development staff this year is Michael Calderone, who comes to the Y from Jackson High School. He said he's looking forward to bringing his experience in coaching to summer camp sports. Michael also leads the youth sports programs held throughout the school year.

This month I would like to introduce our newest animal friend, Roxie the blue and gold macaw. She is the biggest bird we have and is learning to interact with visitors from a distance. She is 18 years old and may live up to 70 years, although a more common lifespan is 30 -35.

Blue and gold macaws (Ara ararauna) come from South America, specifically Eastern Panama through Columbia, Ecuador, and Brazil, as well as Mexico. There are introduced flocks in Puerto Rico and Florida. They live in rainforests, es-

pecially near swamps and rivers. Blue and golds are not considered threatened due to their large geographic range, but habitat destruction and capture for the pet trade are still a problem. In the wild their predators are eagles, falcons, and humans. They nest high in trees to avoid predation.

Blue and gold macaws grow to about 35 inches long and have a wingspan of up to 45 inches. They weigh 2 to 3 pounds as adults. They are very colorful and have a partially naked face that will blush pink when it is excited. They are good talkers and can learn up to 20 words.

Blue and gold macaws are great pets, but they are very loud. They can be very destructive chewers and need a large cage. This is probably not a good choice for a first time bird owner. Their long lifespan also means that long range planning is vital.
