





# The Cotton Patch Evidence - How it All Began

It was 1942, and our country was finding its footing in the 2nd world war. And Clarence Jordan was finding his

path to following his heart. His heart wanted to follow Jesus' teachings; Clarence believed the New Testament taught to love everyone and that violence is never the answer. He wanted nothing to do with war and killing people. He wanted to live in a self-sufficient community where families shared everything: money, food, childcare, crop-tending, household needs...

Clarence was a southern Baptist minister and a missionary. He was a scholar and a speaker. He was also a farmer. The two things he did to earn a living were speaking and farming. He spoke to Christian groups (mostly Baptist) all over the country.

In 1942, Clarence followed his vision to create a community where families could live, work, worship and play together. He and his wife, Florence, and

friends Martin and Mabel England raised money and purchased land outside of Americus, Georgia. The land became a small farm community, and they named it Koinonia. The name literally means, "Christian fellowship or communion, with God or, more commonly, with fellow Christians." Over the next 20 years, Koinonia developed and evolved. They farmed and created a business selling things they grew on the land, and they lived "...following the example of the first Christian communities as described in the Acts of the Apostles." (https://www.koinoniafarm. org/brief-history/).

When Koinonia needed extra help on the farm, and finances allowed, they hired workers and paid a fair living wage, regardless of color or religious beliefs. They also invited anyone who wanted to join them in their community to become members, also regardless of color. As you can imagine, in southern Georgia in the 1940s and 50s, they encountered great resistance to their unconditional love and acceptance of all people. The people who lived at Koinonia survived through serious threats of violence, shootings, bombings, and KKKstyle boycotts and attempts to force them to leave. The Jordans stood firm in their beliefs, accepted all who wanted to come, and didn't lift a hand to physically defend themselves.

In the 1960s, things began to change, as life does over time, and Clarence started searching for a new purpose for Koinonia. The world's needs were changing. Different kinds of issues were showing up, the biggest of which was housing.

Around this time, Millard Fuller came on the scene. Millard was a 'serial entrepreneur' and had made millions. His money and his drive to always be earning more caused issues in his marriage. He and his wife Linda decided to sell their businesses and find something to give their money to. Millard heard Clarence speak and decided to visit him at Koinonia. From there. an idea was born and a relationship grew. In order to address the growing need for housing, they started a ministry they called Fund for Humanity in 1968.

Clarence died suddenly in 1969 while he was in his "writing shack" at Koinonia. He had been working for years on writing a translation of the bible that he believed would help people understand it from today's point of view. He called his translation, "The Cotton"



Patch Version".

The housing ministry evolved into what is now known as Habitat for Humanity and moved its operations into a building in Americus. Koinonia continues to carry on Clarence's legacy. They grow and sell produce, pecans, grass-fed beef, and other livestock. You can read more about them and purchase their products at www.koinonia. com. Habitat for Humanity International (HFHI) is now headquartered in downtown Atlanta, GA. Their previous Americus headquarters currently serves to house their affiliate services division. Here in Jackson, MI, Greater Jackson Habitat for Humanity, founded in 1989, is a local affiliate of HFHI. We've

built 59 houses to-date in Jackson county and are on course to serve the Jackson area for many years to come. You can learn more about what Jackson's Habitat for Humanity is up to on their website: www.jacksonhabitat.org, and on Facebook.



# Madagascar Hissing Cockroaches

This month we will be learning about one of the smaller animal ambassadors we have at Imagine Planetthe Madagascar Hissing Cockroach colony. These popular invertebrate pets are commonly seen in movies and TV shows, because they look scary and dangerous but really aren't.

There are over 4,000 species of roaches spread all around the globe, and lots more still unknown to science. In Michigan there are only a couple of dozen species, and about half of them are invaders that came along with European settlers. All cockroaches have three body parts, the head, thorax, and abdomen and have six legs. Their heads point down and are covered

with a shield. Many have eggs in their body in a strucwings. Cockroaches have incomplete metamorphosis, meaning the immature roaches look pretty much like the adult.

Gromphadorhina portentosa, the Madagascar Hissing Cockroach, is only found on the island of Madagascar, a large island off the coast of Africa. They are primarily found in the tropical lowland rainforest in the dry litter on the forest floor. Hissers eat decaying plant material, dead animals, and smaller insects and play an important part in recycling nutrients in the ecosystem. . These cockroaches are one of largest species of cockroach in world. They grow to 2 to 4 inches long,. These roaches do not have wings and can live up to 5 years.

The females carry their

ture called an ootheca. Fifteen to forty eggs hatch while in the female's body and she pushes the whole structure out. There are several good videos on Youtube of this phenomenon. The nymphs molt 6 times before reaching adulthood, which takes 6 to 7 months. When the roach has just molted its skin it appears white, which darkens as the exoskeleton hardens. Both males and females reach sexual maturity at 7 months old. Males grow larger than females. Both sexes have hornlike projections on their head shield. The males' horns are bigger than the females'.

Hissina Madagascar Cockroaches hiss through

breathing spiracles found on their abdomens. The loudest hiss is made to scare off predators. There is a mite which is a common parasite of the hisser which can be seen on the roach's body when disturbed. Four to six are found at the base of the cockroach's leg and the mites share their host's food. Neither the mites nor the cockroaches pose any threat to humans.

Madagascar Hissing Cockroaches make great pets. They can climb smooth surfaces, so a tight lid is important on their enclosure. We use Vaseline around the top of our tank. If they escape, they will not become pests like the German cockroach. They do not bite or fly and



can become accustomed to handling. If they are warm, they can move quite quickly. Our roach colony is now a breeding, self-sustaining colony, something we are very excited about and proud of.

# Visiting Neurosurgeon from Australia Observes Robotic Spine Surgeries

Jackson, Michigan— Henry Ford Allegiance Health (HFAH) and neurosurgeon Amritraj Loganathan, MD, are earning international recognition in the field of robotic spine surgery. On Thursday, February 7, Dr. David Oehme, a neurosurgeon from Melbourne, Australia, came to Jackson for the purpose of observing Dr. Loganathan perform spine surgery with the Excelcius GPSTM Surgical System.

Designed to increase safety for patients and accuracy for their surgeons, the innovative system enables neurosurgeons to perform minimally invasive spine surgery that typically results in a shorter hospital stay and faster recovery time for patients. HFAH is the first in Michigan to offer patients the advantages of this robotic surgical system.


