

ties to walk, roll, and stroll through parks! The City of Jackson Parks and Recreation Department is partnering with AARP to organize the new Walk, Roll, and Stroll Jackson program, which is a free 6-event summer series

that's open to all ages and abilities.

The program takes place on the first and third Tuesdays of May, June, and July. Registration begins at 6:30 p.m., with the events starting at 7:00 p.m. Participants will go on a 3-mile non-competitive route through parks. Events on the first Tuesday of the month (May 3, June 7, July 5) are held at Ella Sharp Park, and the events

on the third Tuesday of the month (May 17, June 21, July 19) are held at the Cascades Park.



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May is National Water Safety Month: Keeping Safety Top of Mind

As temperatures rise this spring, kids want to cool off, whether that is in home pools, ponds, lakes, rivers, streams, or oceans. And that means the risk of drowning is as prevalent as ever. For National Water Safety Month this May, the Jackson YMCA is encouraging parents and caregivers to reinforce the importance of water safety skills with the whole family.

"As 'America's Swim Instructor,' the Jackson YMCA typically teaches more than 800 children invaluable water safety and swimming skills each year. The past two years, due to COVID-19 precautions, we saw that number dip and want to remind parents and caregivers that it's more important than ever to keep water safety top of mind as families start their summers," said Megan Hunt, the Executive Program Director for the Jackson YMCA.

As part of National Water Safety Month, the Jackson YMCA is encour-

aging parents to play an active role in promoting water safety by offering free Safety Around Water classes May 20-22. Open to ages 5-12, the classes give kids a variety of water safety skills, including boating skills. Although the one-hour classes are free, parents must preregister at JacksonYMCA. org, in person, or by calling 517.782.0537.


In addition, the Jackson YMCA is providing five tips to ensure a safe and enjoyable swimming experience for all.

- 1. Never swim alone or without a water watcher. When children are swimming, make sure they are actively supervised at all times. Teach your children that they should only swim in locations where a lifeguard is on duty, or where a responsible adult agrees to watch the children in the water without distractions.
- 2. Supervise your children whenever they're in or near water. Whether it's bath time or taking a dip in a pool or lake, make sure your children are within arm's reach at all times.

breath-holding activities. Children should not hold their breath for a prolonged amount of time while swimming, as this can cause drowning and has several other severe physical side

- 4. Wear a life jacket: Inexperienced or non-swimmers should wear a Coast Guard-approved life jacket.
- 5. Don't jump in the water to save a friend who is struggling in deep water. If a child finds their friend in the water unexpectedly, their natural reaction may be to jump in the water to try to save them. Even if a child is a great swimmer, a panicked person will overpower them, pulling the rescuer underwater. The Y's Safety Around Water program teaches the "reach, throw, don't go" concept of using a long object to reach for them and pull them to safety. By using this technique, children can help their friends without compromising their safety.

Availability date is when the dog becomes JCAS property; any necessary medical procedures may delay an adoption. A meet & greet with your dog is mandatory, and a cat room walk-through is available to test reaction. Dogs will go to approved applicants; the adoption fee is \$150 for medium/large dogs and \$250 for puppies/ small dogs, including vaccinations, microchips, and sterilization.

She is a door greeter, the first one to say hello and the last one to miss a chance for attention. Meet the Elongated Tortoise at Imagine Planet

Our newest animal friend is an elongated tortoise (Indotestudo elongata). The elongated tortoise is a medium-sized species found in Southeast Asia and parts of the Indian Subcontinent. Although its geographic range is large, it is endangered in the wild due to capture for the food trade. While the pet trade was initially an issue (most are bred in captivity now), it pales in comparison to the inroads made in the population from use as food in Asia.

The elongated tortoise, sometimes called the vellow tortoise because of its shell coloration, is a personable and curious medium-sized tortoise. It is found across a vast natural range that spans Nepal, Bangladesh, India, Myanmar, Laos, Thailand, Cambodia. Vietnam. western Malaysia, and southern China. Elongated tortoises live in warm, tropical forests, and they seem to shun direct sunlight and rarely bask. They spend a great deal of time in the leaf litter and buried in piles of leaves or at the bases of large tropical plants. A long enclosure that offers a warm, humid area and a dry area will allow this species to find the right spot for its needs throughout the day and through the seasons.

The differences between the elongated tortoise and Little Rock, our sulcata tortoise, show the importance of research to provide the best care. While Little Rock is a desert tortoise, the elongated is a forest tortoise and needs to have humidity. While Little Rock eats mainly timothy hay with some spring greens and occasional fruit treats, our new friend will need lots of fresh greens, with no spinach, daily fruits and vegetables, and an occasional source of protein, which in our space is easily provided by crickets. The most significant difference is that, while the sulcata reaches 100 pounds and up to 100 years old, the elongated grows to 12-14 inches and only 7 pounds and can live to 50 years old. Come meet our new friend and give us suggestions for a name!

Remember, you can bring up to 10 specimens of rocks, minerals, or fossils to Imagine Planet, and I will teach you how to tell what they are. Also, keep an eye out for the Artemis rocket launch to the moon! Lots going on in science right now!



2022 CURE - Cancer Support Scholarship: Youth Education Assistance for Cancer Survivors

Eligibility:

- The scholarship is designated for students who were diagnosed with cancer and whose disease and related treatments place significant financial burden on them and their families.
- Scholarship recipients must furnish a letter of confirmation by a licensed physician as proof of their cancer diagnosis. Please note that this documentation will be required following the award notification and should not be submitted with the application.
- Applicant must be a US citizen residing in the USA.
- The recipient must demonstrate academic achievement through evidence of working to one's potential and be accepted for admission at an institution of higher education, e.g., college, community college, university or vocational school. All grades must be substantiated by official documentation.
- Applications must include a one-page essay regarding your diagnosis and the challenges that you and your family faced due to cancer and cancer-related treatments. Include information regarding your goals and future ambitions. Provide an official school transcript and three (3) letters of recommendation from non-family members. All listed submission materials and application information must be included for the application to be reviewed.

Jane Austen Society of North America (JASNA) Essay Contest

Eligibility:

The contest is open to students world-wide in three divisions:

- High School: students and home-schooled students enrolled at the high school level during the contest year.
- College/University: students enrolled in at least six credit hours of course work at a junior college, college, or university during the contest year.
- Graduate School: students enrolled during the contest year in at least three credit hours of graduate course work at a college or university leading to an advanced degree.

*Membership in JASNA is not required to enter the contest.
