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Jackson Firefighters Launch Car Seat Inspection Program to Keep Local Kids Safe

wanting to ensure their children travel safely can take advantage of a new program from the Jack-

son Fire Department (JFD). Firefighters have launched the Car Seat Inspection Program, which will have crews checking car seats monthly for the rest of 2022.

The inspections are free, and no prior sign-up is needed. Jackson families are welcome to visit the Central Fire Station, 518 N. Jackson St., for the checks during the following days and times:

p.m.

• Monday, Dec. 12, 1-3

Firefighters request parents or guardians bring their children and car seats to the inspection. Crews will look to make sure the car seat is in proper working order, fastened to the vehicle correctly, and is a safe fit for the child. A limited number of car seat replacements are available for free if firefighters find a seat is un-

JFD is launching this program after the successful completion of car seat inspection training and a special event this summer that saw dozens of local families come to the fire station for inspections. This effort from Jackson firefighters is currently the only certified Car Seat Inspection Program in

• Thursday, Nov. 10, 1-3 Jackson County, and the first time JFD has offered a program like this.

Firefighter Matt Jabkiewicz says crews plan to continue the once-a-month inspections in 2023 with a permanent program. "A lot of parents may be surprised to learn that their child's car seat is not installed properly or could be dangerous in a crash," Jabkiewicz said. "This is a simple thing we can do to make sure children are as safe as they can be while on the road."

The Jackson Fire Department Central Fire Station is located at 518 N. Jackson St. Contact the fire department with questions about this program by calling 517-788-4150. A 2023 car seat inspection schedule will be released at the end of this year by the City of Jackson.



Preparing Young Children for the Holidays

Holidays are an exciting time for families, but at the same time, they can be quite stressful. Changes in schedules, routines, and increased social demands create uncertainty for young children as they do not always know what to expect. With preparation and understanding, many of the challenges young children face can be avoided. Here are a few suggestions to help your family through the Holiday season.

1) Begin conversations that will spark interest in upcoming events. Look at pictures of your family celebrating past holidays. As you prepare for the holidays, giving your child a sense of control is essential. Make sure to include them in the planning process as much as possible. For example, allow them to help decorate the house or help plan the menu for a meal. Prior to an event, explain to your child where you are going, what you will be doing, and who will be involved. The more they are interested in and understand situations, the less uncertainty there will be.

2) Create and establish your own traditions. Be mindful that some situations may trigger anxiety and meltdowns in young children, and be prepared to remove your child from the situation if they become overwhelmed. Traditions that can be established with young children include cookie decorating, building a gingerbread house, shopping for decorations or presents, or visiting Santa. You can carve out time to teach children about your traditions or lessons, such as the joy of gift-giving.

3) Provide concrete, hands-on opportunities to cross off the days until the event. Create a visual countdown for your child as the holidays get closer. It is easier for young children to understand how far away an event is if they can visualize it. For example, cross off days on a calendar or create a paper chain and take off one loop daily.

Most of all, understand that holidays and celebrations create a lot of energy and are exciting times. Remember to focus on the joy and see the holidays through the eyes of a child.

The League of Women Voters (which also has men in its membership) is a nonpartisan, political organization. Its mission is to encourage informed and active participation in government, which is necessary to maintain our democracy.

Forms of engagement include increasing our understanding of major public policy issues. These may include taxation, voting rights, education, health care, basic human needs, economic and social problems that affect the general welfare, civil rights, use of our natural resources and protection of the environment, and relations with other countries.

Our studies of the issues rest on our principles that support fairness and equity to promote the overall health and strength of our country. For more than a century, this organization has helped people understand the issues that

have faced.

After an in-depth study on an issue, we come to a consensus across the nation, state, or community depending on the subject. After research and agreement, we can adopt a position and then are ready to speak to people in government to advocate for actions we see as needed.

Advocacy is one arm of the League of Women Voters, and education is another. In an election year, we hold forums at the local level for the public to hear from candidates from all parties, allowing them to present themselves to the voters and for the public to ask questions and evaluate the candidates they have seen and heard. We also provide printed information the candidates have provided in answer to our questions.

The League of Women Voters never supports or opposes candidates for office or political parties. We are non-partisan, but we work with elected officials of

citizens in our democracy any party on the issues that are important to us at any given time. So, we often support or oppose legislation depending on our collective position.

League membership is open to citizens (of any gender) 16 years or older. All League members are automatically members at the local, state, and national

Financial Literacy as a Foundation for a Better Life

Locally and nationally, people are dealing with the weight of financial insecurity. 29% of Americans say they do not have enough savings to cover just one month's expenses. The rise in inflation, coupled with flat wage increases, has caused more and more people to fall into this category than ever before. This insecurity is made worse by a lack of a solid foundation of financial education.

There is an urgent need to daily basis. better prepare the next generation to have confidence and knowledge in their financial decision-making.

Junior Achievement is working to be a part of the solution by employing a pathways approach to teaching financial literacy to young people. "Knowledge in budgeting, savings, credit and debt, interest rates, and financial risk is critical for their future success."

We are excited about the recent Michigan legislation updating the high school curriculum to include a financial literacy course starting in 8th grade in 2023. Especially

since 80 percent of American adults wish they had a financial literacy course in school. And a recent survey indicates that 88% of adults support requiring personal finance education in high school (CNBC, April 27, 2022).

There is proof nationally that Junior Achievement programs are working:

• 68% of JA Alumni between the ages of 18 and 29 say that they are financially independent of their parents, compared to the national average of 34% of Americans in the same age range.

 82% of JA Alumni agree they have a solid financial footing.

 84% of JA Alumni agree that their JA experience helped with their financial literacy.

Jackson District Library's 35th Annual Storyfest Celebration Kicks Off November 2nd

Beginning Wednesday, Nov. 2, the Jackson District Library will kick off the largest annual storytelling festival in the state of Michigan - Jackson Storyfest.

The three-day festival, in its 35th year, will feature some of the most talented and renowned storytellers from across the United States and culminate in a finale showcase performance in downtown Jackson.

"The fact that Storyfest is in its 35th year speaks to how many people this festival has impacted, from students to adults, since the late 1980s," JDL Director Sara Tackett said. "We are excited once again to partner with local organizations and professional storytellers to bring a unique storytelling experience to the Jackson-area community.'

In 1988, Jackson Storyfest came to life after Laurie LaZebnik visited the National Storytelling Festival in Jonesborough, Tennessee. LaZebnik returned to Jackson with a vision and a plan and, together with a group of volunteers, created a festival that has withstood the test of time.

"The festival started with pop-up sites around downtown Jackson, before growing into schools busing thousands of students to buildings in the downtown area, to finally the current model, where Storytellers go to Jackson County schools," Tackett said. "Through donations from a number of local organizations and individuals and grants from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Michigan Arts and Culture Council, we've been able to grow year after year."

This year, the fun begins with Larry Casteberry hosting a free performance at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 2, at Vista Grande Villa, 2251 Springport Road, in Jackson. Attendees should RSVP for this performance by calling 517-905-1317 by 5 p.m. Monday, Oct. 31.

School performances begin Nov. 3, when storytellers share their storytelling talents in-person with area students in Pre-K to 8th-grade classrooms across Jackson County. Nationally-known storytellers, including Jenifer Strauss, Adam Mellema, Castleberry, LaRon Williams, and Jeff Dovle, will travel to local schools to spin their tales for students to enjoy and remember.

The Storyfest Showcase is set for 7 p.m. Friday, Nov. 4, at the Jackson Symphony Orchestra's Weatherwax Hall, located at 215 W. Michigan Ave. in downtown Jackson. This year's showcase includes performances by Strauss and Mellema and is free and open to the public.

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

Jackson District Library Director, Sara Tackett, Announces Retirement

This month, Jackson District Library Director Sara Tackett announced her intention to retire after serving in various roles at JDL for the last 24 years. Her last day will be December 16.

Tackett started her employment at JDL as the youth services coordinator in 1998 after working for nine years as a children's librarian at the Hunterdon County Library in Flemington, New Jersey. She served as JDL's assistant

director from 2012 to 2016 and began her stint as director in March 2016.

Tackett led the district library through initiatives at several branches - including the Brooklyn Branch renovation, restoring bookmobile services to all of Jackson County, and the recent relocation and renovation of the Spring Arbor Branch, among others. In 2016, Tackett led the library in a successful millage campaign that resulted in a passing vote in every municipality in Jackson County.

Navigating the coronavirus pandemic was one of the biggest challenges she faced as director, Tackett said, but ultimately highlighted library staff and their dedication and tenacity.

"I will miss the staff at the library the most," Tackett expressed. "Over the years, their hard work and creativity have led to the library being seen as an important asset to the community. All of us working together to continue to provide library services for the last two years speaks to everyone's dedication to Jackson

County."

Collection Service Manager, Lorraine Butchart, served as JDL's interim director in 1998 and was responsible for hiring Tackett. Butchart said the first task Tackett was given was to "get librarians out from behind the desk and into the community," a task Butchart says Tackett took to heart.

Tackett currently serves on the Business and Professional Women's Club of Jackson, the Community Action Agency Board of Directors, the Jackson Collaborative Network, the Human Services Collaborating Alliance, the Henry Ford Allegiance Health Institutional Review Board, and the Rotary Club of Jackson, among others.

"Under Sara's leadership, JDL has an outstanding reputation among library staff statewide," Butchart said. "She leaves JDL in better condition than when she walked in the door."

Tackett said she plans to travel and spend time with her husband Mike and their family in retirement. The couple plans to stay in Jackson.

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



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
