
Gina



Jackson Launches 100 Homes Program to Provide New Housing for Residents

One hundred new homes
will be taking shape on va-



cant lots a c r o s s the City of Jackson in the coming years, providing affordable housing for residents

and rebuilding neighborhoods. The 100 Homes Program is now launching from the City of Jackson Community Development Department after seven months of planning. The program intends to construct 100 single-family houses on vacant lots for qualifying homebuyers, along with providing down-payment assistance.

Seeing a need for more single-family housing in Jackson, the City Council allocated \$2.5 million in American Rescue Plan funds to the newly created 100 Homes Program in March 2023. The initiative is using vacant City-owned residential lots for the new home construction. There are three plans buyers can choose from, which are a mix of one and two-story houses with up to three bedrooms and one and a half baths. All home prices will be capped at \$175,000 to make them affordable for residents. There are income requirements to qualify for the program. The homes will be built in established neighborhoods all over the

City of Jackson, bringing residents closer to essential services like businesses, education, parks, and health care.

The City of Jackson is offering \$25,000 in down payment assistance. Some buyers may also obtain an additional \$10,000 in down payment assistance from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA). The 100 Homes section of the City website, cityofjackson.org, guides participants through the application process. Prospective buyers will work with a mortgage lender of their choice to buy the property. After a participant is pre-approved for a mortgage, construction will begin. Home selection and location will be determined in collaboration with builders and buy-

City Grant Coordinator Cory Mays is leading the 100 Homes Program. Mays says the program is already attracting lots of interest. "We've seen around 90 potential buyers apply through the soft opening of this program, so it's encouraging to see people excited to take advantage of this ground-breaking housing effort," Mays said.

City Manager Jonathan Greene thanks City officials and staff for launching this monumental program. "It's important for the City to be a leader in the community for providing affordable housing for our residents," Greene said. "Using American Rescue Plan funds, this

program shows that we're using our available resources to improve the community. The 100 Homes Program will further strengthen our neighborhoods by filling in empty spaces and bringing new residents to Jackson."

Construction on the 100 Homes is expected to start in late 2023 and take place through 2026. Housing efforts from the City are furthering a housing boom in Jackson. So far, in 2023, private developers have bought 12 vacant lots for new home construction. Half of those lots are seeing new home construction, with several already completed and occupied by new residents.



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Career Center's 35th Student-Built Home Hits the Real Estate Market

It has served as a classroom of sorts for dozens of Jackson County students. and now it's ready for its permanent residents. The 35th home built by students in the Jackson Area Career Center's Construction Trades program is officially for sale.

The four-bedroom. three-and-a-half-bath home is located at 1156 Lexington Boulevard in the desirable Three Forty Farms subdivision in Jackson. Its features include a dual-sided fireplace, lofts in the bedrooms, stainless steel appliances, and a finished lower level with a full kitchen and full bath. The asking price is \$508,500, which is the average of the two independent appraisals that were completed on September 20, 2023.

More than 100 students from area high schools worked on the home over the last six years. This build was longer than a typical site house build due to the pandemic and the challenges that followed. While working on the home, students learn about framing, cement work, roofing, windows, installing doors and drywall, painting, tiling, electrical, putting in hardwood floors and cabinets, and other elements of house construction. The

build is already underway just up the street from this one, with another empty lot across the street waiting in the wings.

"This program has provided so many opportunities for our students, whether they go into the construction trades or not," said Construction Trades instructor Gary Wrozek. "Through the construction of this house, students now have the knowledge to take with them throughout their lives - whether they do it on their own, work for someone else, own a home, and hire someone to do it - they know what the end result is supposed to be. Plus, they get the satisfaction of seeing what they've created with their own hands - that's the greatest part about it," said Wrozek.

An open house for potential buyers and former students and families is set for Friday, October 27, from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. The process to purchase this home is a bit different because it is owned by the Jackson County Intermediate School District. Interested buyers have to submit a bid by November 15, 2023, which will then be considered by the JCISD Board of Education at its November 21, 2023 meeting.

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Imagine Planet: Slow and Steady Wins the Race

Unfortunately, we missed the opportunity to witness the annular eclipse here in Michigan. However, there's another chance coming up with the total solar eclipse scheduled for April 2024. This month, on November 18th, from 12 to 5, we're hosting our next theme day focused

on Space Exploration. Join us for a variety of interactive activities provided by NASA and the NISE Network (National Informal STEM Education Network). I'm particularly excited about one activity that delves into how astronauts recycle oxygen in space.

It's been a while since I have discussed an animal here, so I've decided to showcase our tortoises. Currently, we have six tortoises, representing five different species. In the broadest sense, a tortoise is a type of turtle that primarily inhabits land. The term "tortoise" is typically reserved for members of the Testudinidae family, excluding our Eastern Box Turtle. Like the box turtle and other terrestrial turtles, tortoises have a high-domed shell, with the pancake tortoise being an exception. The hind legs of a tortoise resemble those of an elephant.

Tortoises are exclusively terrestrial and can be found on all continents except Australia and Antarctica. They also inhabit various islands, though many island populations and species have become extinct due to human occupation. There are at least 15 genera of living tortoises, with approximately 49 species, ranging in size from 10 to 15 cm (4 to 6 inches) in shell length to giant island tortoises with shells over 1 meter (3.3 feet) long. Tortoises inhabit a range of environments, from deserts to wet tropical forests. Most tortoises are herbivores and consume foliage, flowers, and

fruits, though some species in moist forest habitats are more opportunistic and may consume animal matter.

Our current tortoises are Rockette and Sandy, both of which are Sulcata tortoises. Sandy is quite small, while Rockette is growing rapidly. The Sulcata tortoise ranks as the third largest tortoise globally and can reach up to 200

pounds, although they usually spend most of their lives in the 100-pound range. Their lifespan in captivity is still uncertain as they haven't been raised from birth with proper care for a significant duration, but estimates range from 70 to 100 years. The average lifespan is somewhat lower due to many young ones perishing from inadequate care, skewing the numbers. While they breed easily in captivity, we do not recommend them as pets, especially for first-time tortoise owners, as they can grow quite

large quickly, and in Michigan, it's challenging to house them outdoors year-round. They are often the most affordable tortoise to purchase. It's worth noting that they are also skilled diggers and, when large enough, can penetrate drywall and even the foundations of a house. I personally had a hole in my bathroom for a significant period, courtesy of a Sulcata.

For those looking for alternative pet tortoise options, some of our other animal ambassadors are available. Ivan, the Russian tortoise, will reach a size of 1 to 2 pounds and can live for more than 20 years. Herman, the Hermann's tortoise, and Ember, our red-footed tortoise, are also reasonable choices, with sizes up to 11 inches and lifespans of around 20 years. We also have Elongated Man (thanks for the name, Onyx), an Elongated tortoise, which requires a higher level of humidity than the others and will grow to about 7 pounds, with a potential lifespan of 40 years.

Owning a tortoise as a pet represents a long-term commitment. While there are many commercial tortoise foods available, each species has unique dietary requirements, with some needing more fruit than others, which should be provided sparingly. You'll quickly learn how to obtain cost-effective romaine lettuce or kale. We, for instance, buy our

timothy hay by the bale. The most critical advice I can offer is to conduct thorough research and avoid making impulsive purchases or adoptions. When done correctly, having a tortoise as a pet can be a rewarding experience.





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
