

The Science of Fall Colors

October in Michigan is a time of awe-inspiring beauty, as the trees don their vibrant autumn colors. But what creates these stunning hues and what determines their brilliance in a given year? Thanks to the US Forest Service, we have a wealth of information to share about this natural spectacle.

First, what are the chemicals or compounds that make the color? The recognizable green hue of leaves is thanks to chlorophyll, which is necessary for photosynthesis. Photosynthesis makes ttree'se's food from the sunlight. Anthocyanin gives us the bright reds, purples, and blues in our plants. Most anthocyanins are produced in the autumn in response to bright light and excess plant sugars within leaf cells. Carotenoids produce yellow, orange, and brown colors and are always present in the leaves. These colors are overwhelmed by the greens as long as the leaves are producing food.

Certain colors are characteristic of particular species:

- Oaks: red, brown, or russet
- Hickories: golden bronze
- Aspen and yellow-poplar: golden yellow
 - Dogwood: purplish red

 Sourwood and black tupelo: crimson

The color of maple leaves differs species by species:

- Red maple: brilliant scarlet
- Sugar maple: orangered
- Black maple: glowing yellow
- Striped maple: almost colorless

Some leaves of some species, such as the elms, simply shrivel up and fall, exhibiting little color other than drab brown.

The timing of these changes varies by species and is influenced by the length of the night and intensity of the light. The amount and brilliance of the colors that develop in any particular autumn season are related to weather conditions that occur before and during the time the chlorophyll in the leaves is dwindling. While the timing is not affected by weather, the amount of color is. Temperature and moisture are the main influences.

A succession of warm, sunny days and cool, crisp but not freezing nights seems to bring about the most spectacular color displays. During these days, lots of sugars are produced in the leaf, but the cool nights and the gradual closing of veins going into the leaf prevent these sugars from moving out. These conditions — lots of sugar

and light – spur the production of the brilliant anthocyanin pigments, which tint reds, purples, and crimson. Because carotenoids are always present in leaves, the yellow and gold colors remain relatively constant from year to year.

The amount of moisture in the soil also affects autumn colors. Like the weather, soil moisture varies greatly from year to year. The countless combinations of these two highly variable factors ensure that no two autumns can be exactly alike. A late spring or a severe summer drought can delay the onset of fall color by a few weeks. A warm period during fall will also lower the intensity of autumn colors. A warm, wet spring, favorable summer weather, and warm, sunny fall days with cool nights should produce the most brilliant autumn colors.

What does that mean for us here in Jackson this vear? According to WIX, "This year, there has been kind of a mix of extreme heat and extreme rain, and unfortunately, those two facts make it a little bit duller. As far as the colors go, it's not going to be as vibrant as it was last year." This news might be disappointing, but let's hope for the best with the rest of the fall weather. In the meantime, let's appreciate the colors of the sumac and look forward to














South Central Michigan Virtual Welcomes Kristopher O'Leary as New Assistant Principal



Association for Iron & Steel Technology - Steel **Intern Scholarships**

Description: The AIST Foundation offers up to Fifty (50) Steel Intern Scholarships valued at US\$7,500 per year each, including the Premier Intern Scholarship valued at US\$12,000 per year. These scholarships require a commitment to a paid summer internship at a North American steel producing company or steel-Summer of 2025. Internship may require temporary re-Undergraduate location. sophomore and juniors, and seniors heading into their first year of graduate school may apply.

To qualify for a scholarship, you must meet the following criteria:

- · I am a citizen of the United States, Canada or Mexico.
- I am enrolled full-time in a four-year undergraduate or entering year one of a two-year graduate program at an accredited North American University.
- At the time of application in October 2024, I am a university Sophomore, Junior or Senior planning to enter year 1 of graduate school. Applicants must have a minimum of one semester following the internship during the summer of 2025.
- Graduate student applicants must be entering year one for the 2025-2026 academic year.
- · I am majoring in engineering, engineering technology, computer science, data science, environmental/sustainability science, and industrial safety.
- I have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale.
- · I am able and willing to relocate for the required internship, if necessary.
- I have a strong interest in the iron and steel industry.

Award: One-year scholarship between \$7.500 and \$12,000 with a paid Summer internship

All general and specific guidelines for each respective scholarship are outlined at the sponsor website and should be closely read by the applicant to ensure all guidelines have been met prior to submission.

Eligibility: All scholarship applicants must be National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA) members at the time of application deadline and must be pursuing careers in strength and conditioning. Applicants are not eligible to win more than one scholarship in any given year; however, applications can be made in more than one scholarship category in a given year. Applicants are eligible to

receive up to two scholarships from each category for which they qualify.

Award: \$2,000 for each respective scholarship

Northern Michigan University Presidential and Leadership Awards


These require a separate application and have application deadlines different than our merit awards. Once you submit an application for admission, the competitive scholarship applications you qualify for become visible in your applicant portal.

Eligibility:

- · High School Seniors, currently enrolled or who have applied to Central Michigan University.
- Must have a 3.7 GPA or higher when applying.
- Award: Covers 100% of tuition (up to 33 credits per academic year) and \$5,000 to study away OR Covers 100% of tuition and fees (up to 33 credits per academic year), housing and food, \$250/semester book allowance, and \$5,000 to study away.

Deadline: October 31, 2024
