BVEF and JCCC Celebrate a Five-Year **Partnership with Career-Ready Programs**

Exploring passions cultivate real world skills in BV students

When BVEF initially partnered with Johnson County Community College (JCCC) in 2019 to create career-ready programs, the Foundation was hoping to provide high school students the opportunity to explore a variety of career paths. Another goal was to sustain and increase their options via annual financial support which would ensure any out-of-pocket expenses would be covered. Since that time, the Foundation has invested \$200,000 into this initiative, and the programs have expanded from four to 11.

One of the most recent additions is the Culinary and Hospitality program. Ella Hibbard, a BV High graduate, turned her passion for baking into an opportunity to explore a career in this field beyond the traditional high school classroom. She applied to JCCC's Culinary and Hospitality program, specifically the pastry and baking certificate program, which only accepts 16

students each academic year. After completing the program, Hibbard says she is grateful for the unique experiences and connections facilitated by the program.

"I helped bake 500 pastries for a JCCC event; I helped serve at a James Beard Beneficiary dinner; and I ran a farmer's market booth last summer at Parkville Coffee," she said. "I have a two-year start on pretty much everyone I've talked to, so I am getting these connections and meeting people in the industry just because of the opportunities in this program."

BVEF is proud to support students like Ella and all those who are exploring post-high-school opportunities as they discover new paths to success and gain real-world skills in a variety of fields.

When the members of Stanley Masonic Lodge #444 made the decision to merge with another area lodge, they also decided to sell the building that had been their meeting space for decades. The building sale provided proceeds and an opportunity to invest in the local community. Giving back to the school district that served the Stanley, Kansas lodge seemed to be a natural place to invest.

At the BVEF Board Meeting on November 14, 2023, Jeff Staten and Andrew Moreau, members of Stanley Masonic Lodge #444, presented a check for \$250,000 to the Foundation, which created a student scholarship, support for the performing arts, and grants for the Center for Advanced Professional Studies (CAPS) in perpetuity. Staten and Moreau are graduates of the Blue Valley School

District, as are many of the organization's members.

Moreau said, "The sale of our lodge was very emotional for our members because we have a great deal of history in Stanley. However, investing the proceeds into supporting the students and educators of the Blue Valley School District seemed like a perfect way to stay tied to the city of Stanley. Our members and our families are products of the Blue Valley Schools and the wonderful educational opportunities here seemed like a good fit for our organization's mission and values. It is exciting to know our gift will continue to support local

public education way past our lifetimes."

BVEF Board President and BV parent Katie Bruels says this gift is going to do a lot of good. "The Mason's gift will annually provide thousands of dollars to support our music, theater, and debate students and the District's CAPS program. It will also annually provide a \$2,000 scholarship for a student in our district



BVEF Partners with BV Schools to Provide a \$131,400 Grant for 10 Special Education Para-to-Teacher Scholarships

Rea Family Foundation Presents First Full Scholarship

When the BV School District committed to finding additional ways to recruit and retain teachers, one of their visits was with the BVEF Board of Directors. Especially difficult to fill are special education positions in high incidence classrooms. To that end, BVEF launched a unique scholarship program to provide 10 full scholarships to fill this need, with the Rea Family Foundation gifting the first at \$13,140.

The Para-to-Teacher initiative is a way to mitigate the cost of tuition for BV paras who have already worked a minimum of one year in special education classrooms but have a college degree in something other than education. Applicants who are accepted to this program complete a 36-hour graduate program that will result in a Limited Apprentice License (LAL) for special education and allow those candidates an opportunity to start teaching in Blue Valley prior to completing a full LAL program.

At the 2023 Community Breakfast, Michael Rea explained, "Ensuring the district has sufficient special education teachers is and continues to be a true challenge. At times, there isn't a large enough pool of qualified special education teachers to fill positions. Working alongside the district's recruitment efforts is the Blue Valley Educational Foundation. It is our

pleasure to announce, with financial support from the Foundation, the district will launch a Special Education Para-to- Teacher tuition program. This tuition program will support Special Education paras interested in pursuing a license to teach. Offering up to \$13,140 per educator, the Foundation approved a total investment of \$131, 400, which means the cost of tuition will no

longer be a deterrent to becoming a special education teacher in Blue Valley."

After completing the LAL, these teachers commit to a four-year teaching contract within the district. BVEF, with the Reas and the district, is proud to curate and fund innovative programs like the Para-to-Teacher scholarships, which create opportunities for those continuing along the path of special education and lead our students to their full potential.




In Four Short Years, Women's Giving Circle Grants Total More Than \$100,000

Women's Giving Circle is a participatory philanthropy that offers Blue Valley area women of all ages a chance to come together and decide collectively how their individual \$100 donation funds will be spent. It's an evening of networking in a happy hour environment where three grant proposals from educators, or a team of educators are presented, and up to a \$15,000 grant is awarded to one of them before the evening is over.

These large grants support special academic programing, author and artist visits, and guest lecturers. They can be used to double the impact of an existing program or to support new initiatives across an entire grade level district wide, across district departments, or used for collaboration with other schools.

Women's Giving Circle evenings are held twice a year in October and April, and all women in the community are welcome to come make a difference in the lives of our BV educators and students.

BVEF Funds \$26,500 for "English for Speakers of Other Languages" Endorsement Program

With an astounding 110 languages spoken by BV students, the district has seen a growth in the number of students benefiting from English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) instruction. To meet this demand, the ESOL team submitted a grant requesting funds to increase the number of licensed educators with an ESOL endorsement.

Following the successful pilot program in 2023, funding was expanded to pay for training for nearly 50 non-ESOL educators in 2024 who teach in BV middle and high schools with the highest need. This program, which includes PRAXIS and licensure credentials, provides strategies for general education classroom teachers to teach students who speak various languages. The benefits are that these additionally trained educators can support ESOL teachers within their buildings and enhance learning opportunities for an increasingly diverse student population.

Performing Arts Takes a Bow

BVEF was thrilled to award a grant totaling \$27,000 to support all nine middle schools across the district. These funds are being used to enhance performing arts technology and productions, and they were happy to put these funds to good use!



Sensory Path

Amount: \$1,370 School: Aspen Grove Elementary Author: Carol Schneeberger and Korey O'Roarke

"The objective of our grant was to foster optimal learning, promote self-regulation and coping, and to help students refocus their energy as needed. Every student in the school was introduced to the sensory path and given an opportunity to try it during a counselor lesson. On a regular basis, we have students requesting to take a break and use the path. We believe the sensory path is definitely fulfilling these objectives."


BVEF Empowers Educators with Mental Health Training with a \$100,000 Grant

In a powerful initiative to support BV students' mental health, the Foundation funded an opportunity for hundreds of educators across the district to gain life-saving tools for students in mental health crisis situations. Like CPR training, where someone who is

not a medical professional can perform the first steps to save someone's life, Youth Mental Health First Aid training empowers educators to address and navigate conversations about mental health with students and notice the signs of a student in crisis.

Coaches and club sponsors, who spend a significant time building rapport with students, were the first to receive training. Katie Lesando, Blue Valley Southwest chemistry teacher and color guard coach said, "We're teachers, not trained psychologists, so we don't necessarily have all the tools and tricks in our tool bag. When you're in that life-or-death situation s ometimes it's scary, and you don't know what to do. This training really builds your confidence and equips you with essential steps to getting a student professional help."

Training events of this magnitude have required trainers to be brought in from all over the state- until now. Kelly Wessel, Blue Valley's Director of Retention and Recruitment, explains that BV has become a

nationwide pioneer as one of the first districts to increase its internal capacity of trainers. She said, "With 17 Youth Mental Health First Aid instructors, the district- thanks to the \$53,000 funding from the Blue Valley Educational Foundation- can now use these

individuals to offer the courses in September and April for the next three years, resulting in approximately 300 trained staff members per year. Even if you just train one more person or 10 more people, it's worth it because you have no idea who that person is going to help."

BVEF is proud to support our students and educators with an influential initiative like Youth Mental Health First Aid training, and the district hopes to serve as a beacon of light across Kansas, encouraging other districts to replicate this kind of training for their staff.

Surprise Squad Gives Away \$427,500 to Make Teachers' Dreams Come True

Surprise Squad was in full swing on Thursday, November 7, 2023, as BVEF was thrilled to support teachers and students with classroom grants and district-wide initiatives that turned dreams into reality. The day began with a pep rally with staff and administrators at the District Office as excitement built across the district as teachers waited to see whether their grants would be funded.

On this special day each year, Board of Education members, BVEF Board members and staff, and generous volunteers, board school buses and fan out across the district visiting almost all 40 buildings to present checks and Surprise Squad banner decals and give special presentations to grant-winning educators. On hand to spread the cheer were special emcees John Holt, FOX 4 News anchor; Joel Goldberg, Voice of the Royals; BOE member Tom Mitchell; Andy DiOrio, Amazon and BVEF Board member; and Kevin Timmons, owner of Nick and Jake's restaurant.

"We are thrilled to be able to give away more than \$427,500 in grant money to teachers and district-wide programs, which is the largest give-away we do in one day," according to BVEF Executive Director Susan Tideman.

"New this year, BVEF presented checks of \$59,800 to Sources of Strength's suicide prevention program plus \$5,000 for Counselor Appreciation; \$58,400 for Mental Health First Aid Training for Blue Valley educators, sponsors, and athletic coaches; special funding for Entrepreneurial Board Games and Simulation for all five high schools; and a grant to support Performing Arts.

BVEF empowers teachers to go beyond traditional classroom limits which enables students to innovate, lead, and learn for a successful future. For more than 33 years, the Foundation has supported Blue Valley schools with over \$8.8 million in grants, scholarships, and special programs.

Year Two Yields Big Results for Raffle for a Reason

BVEF invests in Mental Health and Wellness initiatives for BV students, educators and families

Blue Valley Schools are committed to supporting mental health and wellness at every stage in school and life. From a comprehensive and effective K-12 mental health and wellness curriculum, to Youth Mental Health First Aid Training for staff, to BV Well programing for parents and adult caregivers, BVEF is proud to invest in this vital work.

Student Wellness and Suicide Prevention Programs: Sources of Strength and #GiveMe20

Thanks to generous financial support from the Keep the Spark Alive and SPEAK UP Foundations, the Sources of Strength program is offered in all BV middle and high schools. Sources of Strength strives to connect teens with trusted adults and trained peers to break codes of silence with at-risk students.

Keep the Spark Alive also funds #GiveMe20 workshops developed to provide teens with tools and resources to get them through dark moments. The LifeBoxes students make through #GiveMe20 are filled with activities and mementos to remind them that they are loved, and that life is worth living.

In 2023-24, Keep the Spark Alive and SPEAK UP invested \$59,800 in social and emotional wellness and suicide prevention programs that truly make a difference in the lives of our most precious resource - our students.

BV Well Programs for Parents

BVEF works with parents and community members to provide BV Well programs and resources to support and educate parents as they navigate mental health and wellness with their families. In 2023-24, BV Well supported 20 programs for parents and adult caregivers across the district in which more than 1,000 community members participated.

A highlight of the year included the launch of the Starting Strong series, sponsored by AdventHealth, that provides programs to address needs of parents at key transition points for students and families, such as beginning Kindergarten and moving up from elementary to middle school. Based on feedback from both parents and educators about the challenges and impacts of screentime, BVEF and BV Well partnered with Screen Sanity and Children's Mercy to deliver Starting Strong programs on managing our digital lives – as parents and with our families – in a manner that supports mental health and wellness.

In Spring 2024, BV Well began offering the Youth Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) course to parents and adult caregivers in the BV community. To date, more than 40 BV parents and adult caregivers have completed the Youth MHFA course, further extending mental health awareness and support for youth across our community.
