Blue Valley Food Pantry Provides Student Job Opportunities and Serves Community

The Blue Valley Educational Foundation secured \$342,000 in funding to open the BV Food Pantry in April 2023 with the goal of providing special education students real-world career experience and community members struggling with food insecurity a place to provide food for their families.

It serves as a mini grocery store with fresh produce, canned goods, fresh and frozen dairy, eggs, and meat among other necessities. Community members in need, who live within the district boundaries, shop through the aisles, place their stock into a grocery cart and are greeted and checked out by Blue Valley students in the 18-21 Program. The Pantry is a new addition to the district's offerings and is stocked in partnership with Harvesters Food Network and Cosentino's Market. The BV Ed Foundation was thrilled to be a part of this

project to secure the funding for such a worthwhile endeavor.

"BVEF is eager for our students with special needs to learn and practice a range of vocational skills in a safe environment while giving back to our community and increasing food security," says Susan Tideman, BVEF executive director.

While the idea for the pantry started as a way to expand the district's job opportunities for students, it turned into more by becoming a service point in the community for those who need food. A grand opening and ribbon cutting included Kansas Governor Laura Kelly, district administration and special donors

who were recognized for their generosity.

Wilderness Science Center Bridges a Path for Students and Public to Connect Mindfully with Nature

The Blue Valley Educational Foundation isn't afraid to roll up its sleeves and get to work... even if that means getting a little wet or dirty in the great outdoors.

The Wilderness Science Center, located at 5001 W. 163rd

Terrace, has been an essential piece of teaching BV students about natural plants and animal life for more than 20 years, but over time, several of the footbridges had fallen into disrepair, making it impossible to safely access all areas of the surroundings.

BVEF was quick to step up to help create a Wellness Walk with interactive artwork to encourage better mental health in 2020-21, with generous funding from Keep the Spark Alive Foundation, and they saw the need to secure funding to get the footbridges repaired in 2022-23, as well as update and refresh the original Wilderness Science Center donor wall.

> The newly remodeled and enhanced footbridges were generously funded through BVEF by the Sunderland Foundation. WSC Director Gavin Spake explains, "These enhancements have allowed approximately 7,000 elementary students a year to visit for an outdoor learning experience with their class. This does not include many high school students that utilize the property with their field biology teachers to conduct their own research and studies."

BVEF supports the philosophy that these experiences and opportunities enrich

students from a curricular standpoint, and also help to teach a respect for conservation and preservation.







Performing Arts Takes A Bow

The Blue Valley School District is known for its innovative programs in mental health and wellness, exemplary academic standings, strong sports records and robust extra-curricular activities offerings. One of the pieces that make a well-rounded student is the opportunity to participate in performing arts.

BVEF is proud to support several initiatives in this area:

- \$27,000 was awarded to all nine middle schools to enhance/refresh performing arts technology
- \$74,000 raised at Battle of the Bands to fund Performing Arts Day which gives all district third and fourth graders a chance to experience what performing arts opportunities await them in middle and high school
- \$15,000 raised at Women's Giving Circle for an art gallery to exhibit student pieces at BV North High School

\$683K in One Day! BVEF Gives Away Most Money in Foundation History

On November 10, 2022, BVEF was thrilled to support schools with the most money in Foundation history to be given away for teacher grants and district-wide initiatives. On hand to commemorate this special day was Blue Valley Schools Superintendent Dr. Tonya Merrigan, Deputy Superintendent Dr. Katie Collier, Fox4 News anchor John Holt, Voice of the Kansas City Royals Joel Goldberg, and Nick and Jake's Restaurant owner Kevin Timmons.

The morning kicked off with a Pep Rally which included district office colleagues, a student pep band, high school cheerleaders, and lots of excitement, while educators around the district waited anxiously to see if their dreams would come true with a grant from BVEF.

"We were thrilled to be able to give away more than \$683,000 in grant money to teachers and district-wide programs, which is the largest amount in BVEF history," according to BVEF Executive Director Susan Tideman. "New this year, BVEF funded \$342,000 for the Blue Valley Food Pantry which opened in spring 2023, as well as \$28,000 in special funding from our Women's Giving Circle philanthropy, plus additional grants of \$37,000 to supplement suicide prevention and mental wellness

programs, and \$70,500 to fund our Career Ready education programs."

BVEF empowers teachers to go beyond traditional classroom limits which enables students to innovate, lead, and learn for a successful future. For more than 33 years, the Foundation has supported Blue Valley schools with over \$8.3 million in grants, scholarships, and special programs.

"Most of the Spanish books I have in my class are not tied to the current curriculum or include only one paragraph in Spanish per page, which is too difficult for students to comprehend. They will also learn more about the culture from authentic books, and I would like to integrate student center activities allowing students to use the language learned and create, build, and use tools allowing them to have real-world experiences."
















More Than a Party with a Purpose

BVEF's Women's Giving Circle launched in October of 2021 and since that time has awarded more than \$76,000 in grants!

This participatory philanthropy offers Blue Valley area women of all ages a chance to come together and decide collectively how their donated funds will be spent. New Blue Valley Auto Tech Studio Space Wins \$15K Grant

A new Blue Valley program giving students hands-on work experience in different trades has received a financial boost. On April 20, 2023, members of Blue Valley Educational Foundation's Women's Giving Circle voted to award Blue Valley Academy, the district's high school for at-risk students, \$15,000 in grant funding to help build an interactive space called Studio 151. The studio will serve as a space for students who want to pick up skills in auto mechanics, construction, and other trade fields.

The grant will pay for new equipment

- The project was proposed by Blue Valley Academy Principal Scott Kreshel, counselor Jennifer Freestone and teachers Kalee Brown, Anthony Burdick and Mark Berger.
- The grant will fund special equipment for the new 5,000-square-foot studio including a car lift, construction equipment and some maker spaces.
- Courses in the new Studio 151 space will start up this fall for 10th through 12th graders.
- "We are projected to have over half of our total enrollment participating in this program at our school just next year in three months," Brown said. "We want to get kids in that space, and we want them to have authentic experiences."

The proposal won the foundation's "Women's Giving Circle"

- The foundation's Women's Giving Circle event awards \$15,000 grant to different school programs two times a year.
- Members of the Blue Valley Educational Foundation hear from school faculty wanting to implement something new in a specific school, building level or district wide.
- The money comes from donations pooled by attendees of the Women's Giving Circle.
- "I strongly believe that we as parents, professionals and members of the community, need to get involved to further improve our schools and maximize opportunities for our students, our faculty and staff," said BVEF membership co-chair Fariha Shafi.

The foundation will also fund a new art gallery

- While the Studio 151 proposal garnered the most votes at the WGC event, an anonymous donor also put forward another \$15,000 for a new art gallery at Blue Valley North High School.
- The gallery will display student artwork and will host themed art shows.
- BV North teacher Tom Holland, who proposed the idea alongside Diana Manglos, said the new gallery would provide visibility to student art that's often overlooked.
- "Athletes have stadiums and they have gyms, musicians and thespians have stages
 and auditoriums, but right now our art students just have a hallway," Holland said.
 "We're trying to change that. We want to elevate the arts, to give them a space to be
 recognized."


