Greetings!

So much new, and good news to relate to you. As you can see from these top three photos, work on the main house body, has begun! Many kudos to Jacob and Bob from Architectural Preservation Group, for braving those chill winds off the water, to do the physical work that was needed to get the Homestead back together.

There's a ton of work that has been done in the attic. Steel brackets now tie the summer beams into the east, west, and south plates, and overhang. All floor joists in the attic have been married to the summer beams with steel ties. The roof body is being raised up so that roof rafters can lock into place, once again, with the north plate. The attic is a forest of helping timber, and come-a-longs, that will be taken down once this is done. It boggles the mind.

At the same time, a dedicated band of volunteers showed on September 29th, to start taking the roof, rafters, and attic floor up. We worked successive weekends-despite weather, to prepare the cheese room to be ready for restoration.

We wish to thank the following people- hardy souls all, for dedicating their time and labor- Kent and Sharon Fawcett (who drove up from East Stamford!), Helen and Sandy Peterle, Jim

We moved , wrapped, and stored items against the weather, and then proceeded to derubberize, de-roof, and de-nail the roof itself. The three remaining walls stand alone, with support. Two sections of new sill have been installed. Coffee, snacks, and lunch helped alleviate the cold.

Stone Wall Building with Thaler Hefel -Saturday October 7- 9am-12pm As a safety measure we will put back a stone wall. Learn the technique of making a round bone wall. Bring leather work gloves, and a crow bar. Snack and water provided.

Funding Update

We are waiting to hear back from the Board of Finance (Stonington) about our share of the Capital Improvements grant (CIP). We may be fortunate in receiving \$10,000 for our ongoing restoration efforts. Many thanks to the BF, and Stonington Selectwomen for recognizing our Homestead as an integral piece of the town's history.

We also are in the running for the Historic Restoration Fund grant (HRF) from the State of CT. This past week, the members of State Historical Preservation Organization (SHPO), Erin Fink, Julie Carmelich and Michael Forino of Preservation CT, met with board member Gil Bliss, (President) to ask more questions about about our restoration plans. We are keeping our fingers, and toes crossed, 'til we hear back from them in early May.



Shazam!/ Eversource Update

Suddenly, we heard back from Eversource in February. Art Hayward has redrawn the property survey, and sent a copy to them, and we are in dockett to receive our dig date. Our attorney Maggie Steele, and the town has a copy. The excavator, Tim Coon, of William Coon and Son, along with Jason Zelek, owner/ electrician of Connected Systems,

and John Kindelan, of Viking Supply are all onboard to either donate their time, or materials. It looks like our hook-up will be a reality.
