**From the Pastor’s Desk**

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I think in many ways it’s tough to say farewell to Christmas until the very end of this year when we come to the celebration once again! We prepare abundantly to celebrate the Lord’s birth. We decorate our churches so meticulously and with precision. It’s sad to remove the adornments once we come, as we do today, to the final day of the liturgical season that acknowledges our savior’s birth, recalling his baptism in the Jordan River by Saint John. I bet we all will feel a bit of emptiness when we enter our churches next time and find the decorations gone! But we do go through this every year.

The Baptism of the Lord is an event of Jesus’ profound identity. He is one with the Father and the Holy Spirit. It is also so intricately connected with his public ministry. It marks a moment in the Gospels when we are about to discover the three years of ministry that were so central to Jesus’ life. Many stories encompass that life, and the Sundays of the year allow us to focus on them and let them be our ongoing discovery of the Lord and also their profound meaning for us as we live the gift of faith, with Jesus’ teaching leading us in our journeys in this world. At the center of our faith is a divine person, and each year opens his biography through the Gospels where we encounter him so intimately.

As we reflect upon our own baptism, we are reminded of what has configured us to all three persons of the Blessed Trinity. We are also united to the event of the Lord’s Paschal Mystery. The beginning of our faith lead us as well into ministry. To live out our baptism is to discover constantly the work we can share in Christ with brothers and sisters in him, united in the Church. Baptism has given us grace and a commission to participate in Jesus’ work and mission. Parents are especially aware of this as they have their children baptized. They become conscious of the work of teaching them in the ways of faith as their children grow older and learn. It’s a special ministry in which we all share, to be teachers of the ways of faith to one another, just as Jesus was the teacher for his first followers.

Ministry is a profound reality that endures and invites us all in as disciples of Jesus Christ. It is teaching, it is prayer and worship. It is service to others, especially those in most need, and it is forming the communion in Christ that we have been invited to do so with the grace granted to us, especially in the sacraments. As we venture into Ordinary Time and rediscover Jesus’ ministry, may it guide us in all we do as his people. Let us give thanks for the ministry we have to share, and in which we can deepen and grow every year. Another great opportunity is before us here in 2026. Let us welcome it together with joy and hope. The world needs Christ so much, and we all do. God’s blessing to us remains the constant gift we can offer one another.
