5 Tips for Raising an Anti-Racist Child

As parents, you aim to raise our children to be good humans. That usually means ensuring your children follow the golden rule: "treat others how you want to be treated." Parents work to reinforce this message and believe this message will teach our children to be non-racist.



The recent events and civil unrest regarding racial injustices illustrate the approach most parents have taken is just not enough. Thus, there has been a call for parents to raise anti-racist children.

Why should I teach my child to be antiracist?

Historically, being not racist is like being "colorblind." This approach focuses on treating individuals as equally as possible to end discrimination. In theory, this seems to be an acceptable approach.

However, the "colorblind" approach is NOT helpful.

- Being colorblind creates a society that denies negative racial experiences, rejects cultural heritage, and invalidates perspectives of people of color that are unique.
- When race-related problems arise, colorblindness tends to blame individuals for conflicts and shortcomings while ignoring the larger picture, the context.
 Cultural differences, stereotypes, and values are important in understanding these conflicts or challenges.



 The colorblind approach teaches children that race shouldn't be talked about and makes it harder for them to talk to parents about their questions.
 Silence about race reinforces racism.

The anti-racist approach recognizes that racist beliefs have contributed to systemic barriers in our culture and aims to teach children to actively work against discrimination.

- 1.Model the behavior you want to see in your child.
- 2. Have conversations about racism often.
- 3. Seek environments where your child can experience diversity.
- 4. Use media including books and movies.
- 5. Teach your child to be an ally.

I want to start this newsletter by describing a little about what we have been doing during the first month at school. The children are settling into the class routines, new class environment, and schedules in addition to learning to be part of a peer group, make new friends, share toys, and



take turns. It's a lot! I am very proud of all their accomplishments so far. Drop off is also going much better!

We would like to welcome the month of September. This month we will explore our family and what makes it special. The children will be learning about family members and their roles (mom, dad, brother, sister, grandparents, cousins, aunt, uncle). We would like to ask you to provide a family picture during the first week of September. Please label with family names on back of the picture. We will be using our pictures for many activities, including developing new language, learning to identify our family members, and creating a family tree. In addition, we will also be learning about apples (shapes, seed, colors, flavor, and care of an apple tree). Dear ISP Families,

Welcome to our first newsletter of our preschool year!



I hope you are as excited as I am to work together during this exciting time for your child. Each week our class lessons and plans will be displayed on our window for all to view.

The first theme for this month is Family. Your child will learn the importance of families by talking about our family members, pets, and traditions. Children will do art activities such as a family tree, creating a family house with shapes etc. and will read books related to this theme.

The second theme of this month is Apples to celebrate Rosh Hashanah (Jewish New Year). Children will work on art projects, sing songs, read books, and participate in an Apple science experiment.

The third theme of this month is Independence Day, celebrating Mexico and Chile's Independence. Children will learn about Mexico and Chile's flags, traditions, food, and celebrations. We will read books and work on art projects related to this subject.

The last theme of this month is further developing self-help skills. This is very important because children gain confidence in their ability to try new things, which helps to build their self-esteem. They experience pride in their independence to do such tasks as self-feeding, self-dressing, washing hands and toileting, and helping with simple classroom tasks such as cleanup. Other tasks may include identifying their name in print, self-guiding from one activity to the next, and identifying their personal items such as lunch sack or water bottle.

Thank you, parents, for encouraging your children to wear their face mask to school. Please make sure your child has an extra mask available.

Please provide eating utensils for snack/lunch, if needed. Please remember to check outdoor cubbies for daily communication as well your child's art creations. If you receive a pink slip, please check the soiled clothing container found on the top shelf of outdoor cubbies.

Please continue to work on potty training at home, kids are doing great at school!

I appreciate you providing at least two sets of clothing for school. It really helps in the potty-training process.

3's Full Spanish Immersion

Dear parents,

I'm so excited to start a new school year with your amazing children! We will have lots of fun learning during our activities this year. Our first month was a great success! The group has done a great job of adjusting to our daily routine.

This upcoming month of September, our theme will be FAMILIA (FAMILY). We will focus on the different structures of families, how much we love our families and how special they are, read family-based books, and create a family tree with pictures of each family. We will exhibit our family trees inside our classroom, with the intention of sharing our family history and structure with one another. Don't forget to bring a family photo for show and tell!

3's/4's Partial Spanish Immersion

Hello Dear Families,

Queridos Padres y Familia

I hope you had a safe summer!

I am very happy to have the opportunity to be your child's teacher this year. We are going to have a lot of fun along with lots of learning!

During September, we will continue to practice daily class routines, get to know each other, and improve our self-help skills. We expand our theme to families and discover what makes our families unique and special. Our themes will be: Families- Familias, Apples- Manzanas and Mexican and Chilean Independence Day.

We are going to learn the Spanish names for body parts, for example, "boca" for mouth. We will also be celebrating



Mexican and Chilean Independence Days and learn about the traditions that go along with those celebrations.

We sing songs daily, which include "The ABC's" (in English and in Spanish), "Buenos Días," "La Arana Pequenita," "La Lechuza," and "Los Colores". During such activities, at circle time, kids sit on carpet squares spaced apart for physical distancing.

For our friends that are showing readiness and interest in more challenging activities, we will be introducing a letter of the week starting with the first letter of the alphabet, A, and every two weeks we will be learning about the next letter at the alphabet. Children will have the opportunity to engage in several activities as it relates to that letter.

We will be working on recognizing our name in print, spelling the letters aloud, and some of us will be writing our first letter or our complete first name.

In math, we count and count and count...everything! Especially the days in our calendar, at circle time. We will learn to count in English and Spanish (Number 1 to 10).

In September, we will be introducing our enrichments classes, Hebrew with Ms. Jodi, Art with Ms. Ana Maria once a month, and Farsi with Ms. Farzana.

We will introduce gardening with classroom activities and once the weather cools down a bit, we will take it outside.

It is essential to send a labeled, filled water bottle with a cover with your child every day. Also, don't forget to send back mask containers if kids take them home by accident. In addition, please send a healthy snack for the morning and another snack if your child stays for aftercare, and lunch for full day students, and lastly, 2 full sets of clothes to keep in our cubbies. The temperature in our class tends to fluctuate so consider sending in a long sleeve shirt to have on hand. It is great to label everything with your child's name! Remember our school has several allergies so please see the list on our classroom door. Please provide your child with needed utensils.

For more information about weekly happenings, please see the class Daily Schedule & Lesson Plan that are posted on the class window.

4's/5's Full Spanish Immersion

Dear Parents and Families,

I am so excited to start this new school year and make memorable moments with your child. I will provide a safe and fun environment for my class where everyone will feel welcome, understood, and encouraged to explore. During this month we will continue to work on Self-Help Skills. Having a steady routine and schedule provides the children with a sense of independence. Transitions are smoother because they know what's coming next. Children are working on making their own choices, cleaning up the Shapes in Spanish. area for others to use, and moving on to other activities/centers when they feel like it. Every day we talk about the importance of good hand washing (following guidelines) and the use of the mask.

We will start this month sharing about our families. Children will make a poster at home called "All About My Family". Each child will present the poster in front of the class and share information about their families. After each presentation, the posters will be displayed on our classroom walls. We will also talk about families around the world and discuss what the similarities and differences are between our families and other families.

It is Manzana Time! Each child will be asked to bring their favorite apple. I will ask parents to send me a note with the type of apple so children can see there are other kinds of apples besides red and green or



Gala and Granny Smith. Before eating our apples, we will predict/ guess how many seeds we will find inside the apples! All of this information will be recorded on a chart for you to see. I am hoping to have an apple peeler that day so the children can experience and witness how this machine works. Children who want to plant their seeds will be able to do so in small

plastic containers, and of course we will taste our apples and talk about their flavors and textures. All of these activities will allow us to have many conversations and discussions that will help increase our Spanish vocabulary! We will also read "10 Apples Up On Top" by Dr. Seuss.

Mexico and Chile celebrate their Independence Day this month. Mexico is 9/16 and Chile is 9/18-19. We will locate these countries on a map and compare their flags. We will also explore other flags and describe their designs. We will discuss other places and/or

activities where you see flags, for instance race tracks,

stores, sport teams, etc. Children are going to create their own flags. We will explore the culture and traditions of these two countries by listening, watching, and dancing their traditional music.

Pre-Math Skills: One to One Correspondence, Patterns, and

Pre-Writing/Reading Skills:



Children will still be exposed to a variety of fine motor skills activities (lacing, playdough, Legos, manipulatives, tearing paper with their fingers, stickers) in order to develop and improve the muscle tone necessary for pencil grasp and handwriting. They will also continue working on recognizing, tracing and writing their names. These activities will be presented in different ways such us tracing letters on sand, shaving cream, using magnet, stamps and foam letters, stencils, etc.

Besides all the activities mentioned above, I will read books about the themes and we'll learn fingerplays and songs in Spanish. I will also respect and listen to my students' interests, needs, and learning styles. My goal, as always, is to provide my students with the necessary tools to have a successful transition to kindergarten. I want them to enjoy school and grow the love of learning through the most organic way possible for a child, through play.

I'd like to thank all the support that I've already received from the families in my class. I really appreciate you making an effort to get to school on time. Children have enough time to do their morning routines and then have time to play and socialize with friends before we sit for our short but very productive group time.

Big thanks to Ms. Lulu for all her help!

PIMA COUNTY, June 20, 2022 – COVID-19 vaccines for children as young as 6 months old will be available at Pima County vaccination sites beginning Tuesday, June 21.The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) approved the vaccine on June 18, 2022. More than 259 million people ages 5 and up in the United States have already received at least one COVID-19 vaccination.

Pima County offers free COVID-19 shots for all age groups at the following static locations:

- Abrams Public Health Center, 3950 S. County Club Rd.
- Theresa Lee Health Center, 1493 W. Commerce Court, 520-724-7900
- North Clinic, 3550 N. 1st Ave., 520-724-2880
- East Clinic, 6920 E. Broadway Blvd., 520-724-9650

Check pima.gov/covid19vaccine for hours of operation and more information on COVID vaccines. The new pediatric vaccines will be available by appointment -- which is recommended to avoid waits -- or by walk-in at the Theresa Lee, North and East clinics. No appointment is needed at Abrams.

The vaccines will also be available at some pharmacies, pediatrician offices and other health care providers. The Arizona Department of Health Service's Vaccine Finder at azhealth.gov/findvaccine will be updated to include sites with vaccinations for children as young as 6 months.

Parents can choose between two COVID-19 vaccines, by Moderna or Pfizer, for their young children.

The Pfizer series is available for children age 6 months through 4 years old. Moderna's series is approved for children age 6 months through 5 years old. The Moderna series consists of two shots given four weeks apart. Pfizer's series consists of two shots given three weeks apart, followed by a third shot eight weeks later.

The Pfizer vaccine isn't expected to be available at Pima County clinics until Tuesday afternoon, although Moderna will on hand at the start of the day.

"Vaccination is an important step to protect our smallest children from serious illness, long-term effects from COVID, and to help them from spreading the virus to adults and others in the family who are more vulnerable," said Pima County Health Department Director Dr. Theresa Cullen.

Pfizer's other pediatric vaccine previously was approved for children ages 5 through 11 years old. The CDC has approved only Pfizer for 6- to 17-year-olds.

COVID-19 Action Plan

At International School for Peace, we understand that families are entrusting us with not only the education and socialization of their children, but also with their health, safety, and well-being. Our administration, teachers, staff, and families are doing our part to ensure the safety of everyone who enters our campus. Below is a list of what we are doing in the best interest of the community as a whole. ISP will continue make updates to our policies as deemed appropriate or mandated.

 Employ Jani King, a professional cleaning service, who will clean our campus each evening M-F. When directed they may utilize a hospital grade method of disinfectant needs to be used, families will be notified. The same team will clean our classrooms each evening. Follow current CDC and PCHD guidelines and recommendations in regard to a response when close contact or confirmed case occurs, which will include extending mask wearing or isolation. Ensure that anyone entering the office will be masked. Establish separate entry and exit points to the school and encourage directional traffic at high traffic times. Apply ground markers to aid in distancing. Set up hand sanitizer stations around the ISP campus for use by students, families, and staff. Ensure only staff and essential persons have access to classrooms at this time. Ensure sufficient supplies of disinfectant, tissues, masks, hand sanitizer, working thermometers, and gloves are available at all times. Decrease the times in which a student may mix with another class or program. Establish an emergency plan if a staff member or student display COVID-like symptoms during school hours. Those determined to be ill will isolate from others. Ensure regular changing of air filters in all ISP buildings. Maintain and respect the confidentiality of those who have reported their confirmed case of COVID-19. Director will notify the ISP community of confirmed cases of covid-19. Director will notify the ISP community of confirmed cases contact. 	 Wash hands upon arrival and frequently throughout the day. Promote, demonstrate, and reinforce healthy hygiene habits. Model and reinforce effective handwashing with soap and water for each child upon entry to the classroom, before/after eating, after using the bathroom, and at other times throughout the school day. Educate, support, and reinforce all children on wearing a mask indoors, including teaching children to remove and replace masks following eating and nap times. Keep separate all outer clothing, water bottles, and lunches. Ensure children are 6 feet apart at meal times with their masks stored in individual containers. Classroom windows will be open. Eating will take place outdoors when weather permits. Design activities in the classroom environment that support physical distancing in respect to a play-based philosophy. Allow for families to participate in activities outside. Wear a mask while indoors. Post lesson plans and class happenings in the windows for family viewing. Clean and disinfect classroom toys frequently. Present curriculum utilizing outdoor space as much as possible. 	 Disclose to ISP director should your child test positive for COVID-19. Children will stay home for a minimum of 5 full days and wear a well fitted mask for 10 days . Disclose to the director should your child have close contact with a confirmed case of COVID-19. Your child will wear a high-quality mask for 10 days and get tested on day 5. Notify director of your domestic and international travel plans. Current CDC travel guidelines will be followed which may include testing and extended mask wearing. Practice physical distancing outside classrooms and adhere to ground markers. Limit your time on the campus during pick up and drop off. Adhere to established entry and exit points. Ensure that your child has two spare sets of clothing (appropriate for the season) in their cubby at all times. Support our commitment to having your child wear a mask while indoors. Provide the most current copy of your child's emergency information and immunization / exemption forms. This will include your child's complete COVID-19 vaccine record. Monitor your child for the safe use of hand sanitizer. Commit to staying abreast of school communication. Use resources available to you on the preschool campus; we are here to support you in helping your child adjust to new norms.
