September starts with a "S" and so does Spanish! You guessed it, it is that time of the year that the Spanish hit the various grass flats in the Bay and they have not failed us again this year. Large Spanish are marauding the Pickens and Town Point flats. This guy is an example of what awaits. It grabbed a chartreuse and white minnow pattern. But as Terry says his tan and olive will out fish anything on the fly rod and based his latest Instagram post there are multiple species to be had, specks, bluefish, grouper...






New to Pensacola Beach this year are the big, I mean big bluefish. They can be found cruising the shoreline on both sides of the Pass. I talked about them last month and they are still here. They are not like any bluefish I have encountered in that they are very persicity about what they will eat. Charatreuse EP flies are a good place to start, but remember tippet size matters as well, you gotta go small. You're going to get cutoff and lose a few so make sure the barbs are bent down. Conservation always come first! Baz's client caught this bruiser east of the old "Coast Guard" station or the Park

registation building for you newbies. The snapper/choppers/babies are still around as well. You probably will find the small blues on the grass flats as well.



Both Capt. Baz and Capt. Dan have success with redfish and specks up close to the shoreline. The sight fishing is there but it takes patience. The warm water temps are making them more

difficult and also makes hard for the fish to recover so land them fast, be sure your phone/camera is ready to go before you lift them, and take your time reviving them. There a ton small baitfish (scaled

Fly of the Month: Kreelex by Bob Korose

The Kreelex fly was designed by Chuck Kraft and has literally caught almost every kind of fish in both freshwater and saltwater. Several years ago I read about the Kreelex for trout and tied up a few to try on the White River in Arkansas. I asked my favorite guide there if he had used them before and he told me that Chuck Kraft was a client of his once, and yes that new fly worked great for the trout on the White River too. So, I tried one of mine on that day and the trout loved it.



Since recently learning that the Kreelex catches many other kinds of fish besides freshwater trout I've tied up some larger ones to try around Pensacola and expect they will work well on the Spanish, ladyfish, bluefish, specks and others.

Materials:

Hooks: size 2-10 long shank Mustad S74SAP (formerly 34011)

Thread: White waxed 140 or 210 Denier

Eyes: Dumbell eyes (medium)

Materials: MFC Kreelex or Fly Tyers Dungeon (FTD) Northern Flash

Silver and Gold (or any other colors as desired)

Tying Instructions:

1. Start thread wraps 1 eye width behind the eye and wrap back several turns then forward to 2 eye widths behind the hook eye.

2. Take a clump of the silver flash, measure a little more than 1 hook length and tie it down with the short end to the front. Continue wrapping

with touching wraps to the bend of the hook making a tail. Then return the thread forward to $\frac{1}{4}$ hook length from front of the hook.

3. Tie in the eyes and bring the thread directly in front of the eyes.

4. Trim the tail to 1 hook length behind the hook. Then take ¼ of the front flash and pull it back over the eyes and take 3 wraps in the front of the flash. Then do that procedure 3 more times to have it all going back. Grab the flash and hold it back while tying it down behind the eyes. Bring the thread forward of the eyes and wrap forward to the front.



5. Invert the fly. Take a clump of the gold flash half the size of the silver flash and align one end with the shorter silver flash and tie it down in front of the eye. Fold the part going forward back over the eyes and tie it down then wrap back and forth toward eyes making a nice head.

6. Whip finish the head. If desired, color the head with a marker. Use head cement or UV resin to seal the head.

Treasurer's report: The club finances are in excellent shape.

Old Business: PHW's rod building class started in September with eight participants. PHW's trip to Fort Pickens needs two volunteers on October 5. Trip includes lunch.

Casting for Recovery for breast cancer survivors has two upcoming events in late September and October. Contact Wolfgang if you are interested in a volunteer opportunity to help teach fly casting to novice casters. See previous newsletters for information about the organization.

Fly of the Month September 12th **is** a fly called the Neon Icon designed specifically for pompano. Terry McCormick will lead it. The pompano migration past our beaches peaks in October.

Newsletter Our Club needs an editor to replace Paul Wargo, whose outstanding club newsletter promoting the club on the internet as well as keeping members informed. Paul will assist you tp get started.

Fishing reports: **Tarpon Bob Korose** caught eleven species of fish on his August 8-17th trip to Alaska at the Aniak River Lodge. He and a buddy caught five salmon species, arctic char, dolly vardon, rainbow trout, pike, grayling and a new species for Bob called a sheefish, which is in the whitefish family. The best fly was a top water "wog fly" which imitates an Alaskan mouse and is similar to a gurgler or popper. Tarpon Bob will present on his Alaskan trip at the November meeting. There were no other fishing reports. Cooler weather and better fishing is around the corner.

Presentation by Terry McCormick on "How to Fish the Beaches and Bay on Foot" Terry graciously shared a lifetime of experience fly fishing our local waters from Navarre to the Alabama line. He has caught about every fish on the fly that swims in our local waters from reds, jacks, ladyfish, false albacore, bonito, pompano, trout, catfish, blue runners, bluefish, Spanish, flounder,

sharks, whiting, and black drum. I probably missed a few species.

He said he doesn't stress over catching one species, but simply enjoys the fight of whatever fish he can fool on a fly that day.

Terry uses both an eight and or ten weight depending on the species or conditions he encounter that day. For big Jacks and bull reds he will go with the ten weight. For shallow water he likes an eight weight and either a floating line or an intermediate sink tip line for deeper water or in a choppy surf. He adapts to the wind direction by choosing either the Bay or the Surf. Terry said 'he makes his own leaders with a butt section of 40-pound mono, then two sections of 30 and 20-pound mono with a tippet of fluorocarbon tied on with a loop to loop connection so he can change out his tippet section quickly." He'll change to a 20-pound wire tippet if he gets cut off by a blue or Spanish,

He showed us his salt water flies. A big foam popper for jacks and bull reds, along with pompano rockets, crab and shrimp patterns, gurglers, and closuer minnows in different colors. Colors for the clouser minnow depends on whether he is fishing the surf or the grass flats in the Bay, He doesn't overcomplicate his fly box with too many patterns.



All his flies were on a one piece of foam he can readily access. For specks he stresses the importance of yellow eyes on Clouser minnows and has years of experience to back it up. On the Bay he uses colors that match the submerged grass; while in the surf he favors tan and white clousers.

He prefers an incoming tide early in the morning which bring baitfish in closer. On the Bay side he looks for sandy spots in the middle of the grass where the trout ambush hiding in the grass. "Cast beyond the sandy spot and retrieve over it.. Go early morning and early evening for your best opportunity. That's when the fish are most active."

He wears neoprene booties for protection from sting rays and Neoprene waders in winter. Terry always uses eye protection and said," you can dig out a fly stuck in your ear but not in your eye!" He showed us his beach bucket equipped with a rod holder and a chest pack with pliers, nippers, tippet material and a foldable ruler.

Thanks, Terry, for all the good information. The fish don't have a chance We need to put the information into action on the water.
