### Gulf Coast Classic



# Fishing Report

Like I said earlier, unless you are seeking fish in the shallows, the Bay has been very hit or miss this past month and will probably continue to be so. Maybe with the more consistent colder temps, the fish will again be in the bayous, deeper channels and river mouths. I'm afraid it has been a little too cold for me but a few intrepid anglers, Terry M, Bob C, and George N, to name a few -- ventured out only to be handed the Zero. I will be happy to send an amended email when the fish show. When they do, use various colors of Clousers or weighted streamers and retrieve very slowly. Remember the water is cold and so are the fish.

I heard via the grapevine Captain Dan Storey found some False Albacore near the Pass, but they didn't linger for too long. Like Captain Baz always says, wintertime wading for fish in the Gulf of Mexico can be very productive. You never know what you will run into.

Captain Baz and Captain Dan have accounted for some mind-boggling big redfish and black drum in the usual spots. These fish are very educated and very touchy so a gentle approach is needed -- no trolling motors here folks! Shown below are just a few of them. Oh, Baz's Feb/Mar client, Carl, is in town so watch for Baz's social media account to light up. The photos are all of Carl with Baby, Mama, and Daddy redfish with a black drum thrown in for fun.

# Fly of the Month: The Gravity Minnow

The Gravity Minnow earned its name because—you guessed it—gravity pulls it straight to the target. (And yes, gravity still works underwater!) So, what's the target? Any foraging fish that eats minnows.

Seriously the lead eyes gets the fly down into the path of fish and the broader profile gives a true minnow shape. Use this fly in slightly deeper water where the plop on the surface gets their attention and drop gives them a chance to grab it. Be ready with that stripping hand quick!



**Materials:**




- 1/0 Gamakatsu SL12s hook
- Craft fur
- 210 denier thread







- EP 3" craft fur brush
- EP 1.5" minnow head brush
- Medium lead dumbbell eyes




**Tools:**

- Flush cutters or wire cutters (old scissors will work too)
- Sharp scissors for trimming
- UV resin and UV light
- Bobbin
- Whip finisher tool

**Steps:**

1		Create a thread base stopping just passed the hook point
2		Tie in about a 3" section of craft fur using 3-4 securing wraps right where the hook begins to bend the end of the hook. Once secured we'll cut off our excess and cover any stray fibers with thread
3		Tie in the 3" EP craft fur brush and secure it in front of where we tied in the craft fur

4		Once secured, wrap the 3" inch craft fur brush 3-4 times around the shank of the hook ensuring to pull back the fibers after each wrap. Wrap back on the fibers and use flush cutters or old scissors to clip off the remaining brush. Using a brush tool (here I'm using an EP finger brush) brush the fibers forward from the tail section then brush them back over themselves
5		Now that the tail section is complete, we will attach the medium dumbbell eyes to the shank of the hook just in front of the hook point making sure to leave room to tie in our minnow head brush.
6		Next, we will work on the head section of the fly by securing the 1.5" EP minnow head brush behind the eyes. We will wrap this brush 3 times behind the eyes again ensuring to pull the fibers back with each wrap
7		Advance the thread to the eye of the hook and wrap the brush once over the dumbbell on the side that's facing away from you pulling the fibers back and then wrap the brush over the side of the eye that's closest to you.
8		Now that we have wrapped the brush over the eyes we will wrap the brush 3 times around the shank in front of the eyes. Secure the brush with a few wraps and pull all the fibers back and trim off the excess brush.
9		At this point I like to whip finish the fly and secure the wraps with UV resin. You could fish this as is but we are going to trim the head to get a more uniform shape

10		<p>Now we will use our brush and brush the head section completely out freeing up any fibers that may have been trapped. This step is essential for getting a clean trim</p>
11		<p>Next, we will trim the fibers to create a more uniform head. Angle your scissors at 45 degrees and make your first cut. It helps to use the eye of the hook as a guide for your scissors.</p>
12		<p>Invert your fly using your vice's rotary function and trim the belly of the fly the same way we trimmed the top.</p>

# The Minutes

## January 7, 2026 FFNWF General Meeting Minutes

1830: The President called the meeting to order with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Treasure's Report: The club's finances are in excellent shape going into the new year.

The FF 101 Class begins on March 2 and runs to the end of April. Please encourage anyone who might be interested in signing up and joining the club.

May 16th is the Club Fund raiser on the third Saturday. Please consider a donation.

George proposed a Club Fishing Tournament for the largest largemouth bass, redbass, Spanish mackerel and speckled trout. The tournament will run to the end of November and is open to paid club members for fish caught in Florida on a fly rod. A \$100 cash prize or gift certificate will be awarded at the Christmas Party for each winning species. Take a photo of the fish and measure it from the mouth to the fork of the tail along with where and when it was caught and on what fly. Any further information will be discussed at the February meeting.

Gary proposed adding \$1,000 to petty cash for minor expenses to speed up the use of club money for minor items to avoid long board approvals.

Gary presented club logos for our newsletter, banners at club events, the website newsletter banner, stickers and tee shirts. A vote passed to select his best logo. Thank you, Gary!! A great marketing idea.

Christmas Party: Russ presented an extensive critique of the food and service based on a number of complaints by club members. In a nutshell, the service and food were not what the club and the committee expected despite all the communication with the Holiday Inn. The club was given a \$600 refund in acknowledgement of their failure to render contracted services with a promise they will meet or exceed our expectations this year.

At this time, we have made no down payment for the December party. It was noted we need to start selling tickets earlier than last year since only forty attended the party. The party produced a surplus helped by the refund and larger than normal number of ticket sales for the raffle items. The Party normally runs a deficit and has to be subsidized.

Tarpon Bob did a bang-up job with selecting the party prizes of fly rods and reels, gift certificates etc. Thanks Bob!

Fishing Reports: The bull red run is over and didn't attract much interest. The bulls stayed out of the bay but the local guides caught shallow water reds on the flats. No reports on trout showing up in the canals yet as an extended cold front is needed to move them inside.

## 4. Technical Format

Please send text in an editable format (like a Word doc or a plain email). To save us from re-typing your hard work, please do not send text as a PDF, JPG, or screenshot.

## 5. High-Quality Visuals

A great photo makes the story! When submitting images, please keep these three things in mind:

**Send the Original:** Attach the original photo file (JPG or PNG) to your email. Please don't "embed" the photo inside a Word document, as it ruins the resolution.

**High Resolution:** Use the largest file size possible so the image looks sharp in print and on screens.

**Captions & Credits:** Include a brief note telling us who is in the photo, where it was taken, and who took the shot.

All that said, I can work with anything you send me. This just sets the initial expectations for each of us.
