Club Trip to Twin Lakes Camp Resort April 9-11 Tuesday afternoon to Thursday morning.



This is a top notch resort that borders two lakes. Fly fishing for bass and pan fish should be at its peak in April. It is a luxury RV campground that also has cabins, houses, glamping tents, and tiny houses to accommodate different size groups. They rent kayaks and an electric pontoon boat. They have a swimming pool and a rec room. Only trolling motors or non-motorized boats are

allowed. They have a web site or their phone number is 850-892-5914 for further information.

The large house is \$960 for two nights which would be divided by the number staying there. I have reserved on my credit card. It sleeps up to ten with a full kitchen, living room and two full bathrooms.

The two bedroom cabins with king beds rent for \$255 a night, and the tiny houses run \$211 a night with a bedroom downstairs, a kitchen and a sleeping loft. The glamping tents were a little less.

I will need to know if you want to stay in the large house or if you prefer your own accommodations (in which case you will need to book directly with the resort). Fishing with Capt. Baz January has been a tough month to be a fishing guide. Wind, rain, freezing temperatures...oh my! I haven't been on the water since January 4 and am getting concerned about my mental health. The only really good day since then was on a Sunday, and my client went to Mass instead of going fishing!



The good news is there are plenty of redfish both inside and out.

Plus, we are seeing surprising numbers of trout on the flats even with

the water temperature in the mid-50's. Here's a nice shot of Kevin Williams with the last redfish of 2023, and another of Stephen Miller with the first redfish of 2024.



Jeff Lampe and I had a couple good days poling the shallows during the first week of the year. All the fish we saw were big, and they were

very interested in the EP minnows. This first redfish was about 12 pounds, and my old Sage Xi2 8wt blew up during the fight. That was quite an experience for Jeff who'd never had a graphite rod







explode in his hands. I handlined the fish to the boat, and off we went. Was glad to have a backup rod on the boat. The trout was sitting in a small sandy hole about 20' from shore. The water was only a foot deep, and I was afraid to spook it by poling too close. So, I stopped well short, and Jeff

laid out a nice, soft cast 4-5' to the side of the fish. It made the mistake of coming over to investigate. We saw 15-20 trout that morning on the sand in singles, doubles, and small groups.

Activity on the flats will accelerate in February as the water warms and more baitfish arrive. The Gulf is forecasted to calm down next week opening up the shoreline for sight-fishing, and I can hardly wait to get out there. Beach anglers

are catching pompano, and you can bet there are schools of redfish both east and west of the pass.



I'll leave you with a photo of a 42" redfish my client Carl Huhnke from Wyoming caught on his 6wt while wading on a cold January 20. The redfish crushed the sz 6 fly and almost spooled him before he stopped it and coaxed the fish back to shore. That's almost 200 yards of backing folks, and he was using a 15' 12# leader. Carl carries a little scale with him, and the redfish weighed 22.8 pounds. He's the guy that a few days earlier chose going to Mass instead of fishing...

Fly of the Month The Thin Mint Bugger by Phil Hartz

This fly is great for trout, large and smallmouth bass, walleye, and brim(sunfish where I come from). It fishes well as a streamer with a slow or fast retrieve. Strip strike works best. The fly is a fairly easy tie and should produce some great results on the water.



Materials

Hook: Streamer hook size 6 or 8 **Thread:** Brown

Bead: Size 3/32 gold or copper tungsten Weight: .025 lead alternative wrap

Ribbing: Small copper wire **Tail:** Rainbow Flashabou **Body:** Peacock hurl **Hackle:** Brown bugger hackle


De-barb the hook using your vice. Add your bead, small hole first and secure it in the vise.

Start the thread behind the bead with a small build up to hold the bead in place, then lay a thin thread base down the hook shank and take a few wraps rearward before snipping the tag end off.



Start by wrapping the .025 lead 1/2 to 1/3 the length of the shank back from the eye, then wrap forward to the bead. Secure the lead with numerous thread wraps to hold the lead in place. Return thread to bend of hook.

Tie in a clump of rainbow Flashabou for a tail. Start the ends behind the lead wraps. This will help build up the body. Tie in an 8" piece of thin copper wire. Start behind the lead wraps. Tie in a clump of peacock hurl, again, starting behind the lead wraps.



Use one or two wraps of the hackle behind the bead, then wrap back to the tail of the fly. Tie off the hackle with one or two wraps of the copper wire and wrap the wire forward to the bead. Wrap the wire the opposite

direction of the hackle to help hold it in place. Tie off wire, fold back, tie in and remove excess. Whip finish or half hitch finish the thread and Voila! You are now ready to fish.


Project Healing Waters


