2023 Fly Fishing 101 Class





Fishing with Capt. Baz EMERALD COAST GRAND SLAM!

Matt Smith from McKinney, Texas, got *The Emerald Coast Grand Slam* on May 3. We were just coming off the neap tides, and the water around Pensacola Pass was off-color. So, we ran east through patches of light mud until we found some decent water for sight-fishing. The silty water made visibility challenging, but it was greasy-calm, and we had good light. I got us right in tight, and we found plenty of redfish close to shore. Matt and his brother Andrew took turns on the bow casting various flies in their general direction, but the fish were as picky as ever. After an hour or so Matt got one to eat an EP baitfish, and we were on the board. We continued looking for a redfish for



Andrew but got interrupted by a big school of jacks that passed us in the draw.

We ran ahead of the school and waited while Matt made some practice casts with the 10 weight. When the school arrived he kept his act together, made the cast, and strip-set the first fish that crushed the big popper. We landed the fish in 20 minutes, and it was only 11:45. The 10wt was too much for Andrew, so we ate lunch and returned to the redfish area hoping to find a pompano.

The problem was the murky water. There was no way to see a pompano, so I set us up just outside the inner bar and both guys blind-casted weighted spawning-shrimp hoping to get lucky. Over the next hour we landed numerous blue runners and lost a few flies to Spanish mackerel. I could feel the monkey starting to crawl up my back and decided to relocate.

The wind had picked up from the west, and we ran into the chop all the way to the "Palm Tree" area which had always been good for pompano. Once again, we spent a fruitless half hour blind-casting as the wind increased. I could feel the *SLAM* slipping away...again...and decided to throw the "Hail Mary". We battened down the hatches and ran due west into the 2-foot chop through Pensacola

Pass, across the Caucas Shoal, and on down a couple miles to an area known as Crane Cove. It's where we caught the pompano for the first *SLAM* over fifteen years ago, and I've caught many pompano there since. I anchored from the bow in six feet of water, and Matt got set up



to cast from the stern. The boat was rocking, and waves were coming over the bow as he worked out the line and laid his first cast toward the bar. He let the fly sink, started quick



erratic strips, and a pompano nailed it and went airborne. The fish tried all the usual tricks, but I'd left the barb up, and this time it didn't get away. What a feeling when I got that pompano in the net! We were all both shocked and elated. After we took a photo and released the fish, Matt flipped the fly back out there and caught another pompano. Against all odds we'd lucked into the perfect spot, and the 4th *Emerald Coast Grand Slam* was in the books.

May is always the best month for the Grand Slam species. Here's a nice shot of Brian Boutchard with his first-ever pompano.

Fly of the Month **OLIVE FINGER BAITFISH**

MATERIALS:

HOOK: SC15 OR 3407 #1

EYES: 6MM YELLOW DOME HOLOGRAPHIC **BELLY TAIL:** WHITE CRAFT FUR W/ SHARPIE

BLACK BARRED


TOP TAIL: GOLDEN OLIVE CRAFT FUR

THREAD: MONO .006

FLASH: PEARL FLASH A BOU

HEAD: TAN MEDIUM PALMER CHENILLE or ROOT BEER PALMER CHENILLE

INSTRUCTION:



1. Debarb hook, lay smooth thread base to hook barb. Rotate vice, add small clump white craft fur at hook bend, 1-1/2 times hook shank. Mark 3-4 black 0r brown bars along belly tail.

2. Rotate vice to up wright position, secure 3-4strands flash-a-bou over top of white bellytail.

3. Add small clump of olive craft fur, 1-1/2 times hook shank at hook bend. Extend same lengthss bottom tail.



4. For head of fly, add palmer chenille at base of tail and wrap in close wraps to just short of hook eye. Whip finish small tapered thread nose.

5. Finishing fly, trim palmer chenille to a tapered head. Add dome eye to each side of fly.

Overcoat eyes and thread nose with head cement or UV resin.

Option: Substitute root beer med. Palmer chenille for tan.

May 2 Meeting Presentation by Pres. Mick Milo,

Yellowstone Cutthroat Trout by Horseback

The trip was to Slough Creek, MT, Third Meadow. The party of six spent a week in Yellowstone and booked a 3 day fishing trip with Slough Creek Outfitters. The company (more info at https://sloughcreekoutfitters.com/) Slough Creek Outfitter's base camp is located just north of Yellowstone National Park. The camp is in the Absaroka-Beartooth Wilderness Area. Fishing trips are available from July to Labor Day. The horseback ride from the



point of origin to the Third Meadow camp was a



four hour, 13 mile trip. Dan's Hopper was the fly of choice for this particular trip. Fishing included meadow streams and alternating with fast water sections in the canyons. The trip is a very affordable 3 days in the wilderness, well away from the Park crowds.

Board Of Directors Meeting Minutes April 27 by George Norton

Treasurer's Report: Income from dues and beverages less expenses for our Post Office box renewal, clinic food expenses and pastries left a healthy balance in checking.

Gulf Coast FFI May 5-6: Jim W reviewed the May FFI conclave at Gulf Shores State Park. Club representatives who attended were Richard M for fly casting instruction, Gary P for demo fly tying and Jim and Bob M represented PHW. Thank you to our volunteers. The event showcased renowned demo fly tiers, casting instruction, and a variety of classroom seminars on fly fishing in our region.

Conservation Issues: There were meetings and updates on conservation efforts at FFI such as western dam removals and restrictions on mining. In our region the Gulf Coast Council actively supports conservation efforts, especially in Louisiana to reduce redfish and speckled trout harvest led by the Gulf Coast Councils' Director, Glen "Catch" Cormier. Studies by Louisiana biologists say the spawning biomass is not in good shape due to overharvest and habitat loss. In the last forty years the number of salt water fishers doubled along with better equipment, know- how and technology. The other Louisiana push is for a buffer zone on menhaden harvest to one mile from the beach. Further information is available on FFI website.

Education: The 101 class was a big success with great participation by the students. **Web Site Update:** Issues with Pay Pal are on- going but progress is expected soon. **Membership:** YTD we have four honoree members, seven Associates and fifty-nine paid regular members which is short of last year's total of ninety- three paid member. Please pay dues. **Auction:** Terry is back in for the May 20th event. Thanks to Steve and Ellen for countless hours cataloging all the stuff.
