
know the name of were everywhere.



Fly of the Month - Sand Crab...by Sam Main

A simple crab pattern, fast and easy to tie, with a lot of movement. A crab fly can be moved slowly for imitating a mud or fiddler crab, or a bit faster for a swimming crab. Eliminate the dumbbell eyes and you have a floating crab...

Tying Materials

Hook: Mustad 34007, #2 Flash: optional

Sand Crab Dubbing, Sand Crab (tan) Thread: Flymaster plus 210, Tan Body: Tail: Medium Bug Legs, Tan & Brown Eyes: Medium Dumbbell Eyes, Plated

Instructions

Crush the barb and attach thread. Lay down thread base to the bend. Tie in Eyes behind hook eye, and cement.

Bring thread back to the point of the hook and tie in a small bunch of dubbing. Trim and tie in making a bump.

Tie in 6 legs (3 tan 3 brown) on each side of the tail splitter, trim to desired length.

> Move the thread forward and tie in a small bunch of dubbing on the near side of the hook. Repeat on the opposite side.

> Brush the dubbing back with your fingers and tie in front.

> > Continue until you reach the

Whip finish in front of the eyes.

Trim top and bottom flat, and to desired shape.

Slough Creek and One Heck of a Hike

Slough Creek consists of a series of three meadows. To reach the second meadow requires a six mile hike from the trailhead up a gradual incline at 8000 feet. It takes about two and quarter hours each way to access the second meadow. On top of it all, you have to carry in all you need for the day: Waders, boots, a lunch, water, vest, fly tackle and a rod. Slough Creek is in the northwest quadrant of Yellowstone Park and drains into the Lamar River, a tributary of the larger Yellowstone River.

The hike will punish you if you are getting up in years or out of shape. The rewards of hiking in far off the beaten path are many. There is the snowcapped Anadarko mountain range with a twisting meadow stream full of cutthroat trout averaging 16-18 inches. These trout are natives and take large dry flies especially terrestrials like Stimulator and Hoppers readily during the summer.

Terri, Jim's wife knew the drill and cooked a lumberjack's breakfast of oatmeal, pancakes, bacon and eggs. The three of us arrived at the trailhead at about nine. Jim and his wife are Denver residents and are used to the high altitude. Jim gave me a concerned look. He said, "Norton, are you sure you can handle this hike? We can fish the first meadow for you. Ha ha. The first meadow is only a three mile hike. You're a flatlander!" "Nah," I replied without thinking. "I can handle whatever you can." I knew full well it had been about thirty-five - years since we had fished and hiked into the second meadow.

For a flatlander, not accustomed to the thinner air, I was curious how I would handle it. After all, I had been loafing in the heat down south and riding a golf cart was about all the exercise I had gotten lately.

Bears are always a possibility in this area. Jim had warning bells. Lots of luck I thought. Bells don't give me a lot of confidence versus a female grizzly protecting her cub. Nevertheless the only animals we saw were pack horses with outfitters and fishermen loaded with food and camping equipment headed twelve miles in to the third meadow. We took a break about every thirty minutes. The bugs weren't too bad and the sun shone. Finally with a sigh of relief that I had survived the six mile hike, I tossed off my pack and waders, and lay sprawled out totally spent under a tree. I lay back overjoyed to have the pack off my back. Jim said, "Norton are you going to fish or take a nap?" "I'm taking five," I replied.

Thirty five years ago we sprinted to get our rods in the water. One year we caught so many cutthroats we tried different flies to see if there was one they wouldn't take.

This time the fishing was slow and steady. I caught six quality fish on big dry flies in a beautiful area. We fished until four in the afternoon and hiked out back to the car. I slept well that night. The next day we fished the Lamar River which only required a minimal amount of walking. Mountain Men would find our hike a piece of cake.

Rex Straughn, President, called an impromptu board meeting to order at 1835 hours since members of the board were present. Rex apologized for not announcing a board meeting in the previous newsletter distributed at the beginning of the month. Rex brought to the board that two members were needed to represent the club to building management for maintenance. He nominated Oleta Webb and Russ Shields to hold said positions. Kevin Gorby seconded the motion and motion passed.

Angler's Night and Blast for the Brave events will both take place on the 2nd of April, 2016. Representation needs to be available at both events. Jay Brykczynski volunteered to spearhead the Angler's Night event. FFNWF will be represented at this event, but Healing Waters would not. Healing Waters will be represented at Blasting for the Brave. Jay Brykczynski made a motion for a \$35.00 donation for Angler's Night and Oleta Webb seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Paul Wargo stated that Gary Pheabus requested a copy of the newsletter to be placed in the packets given to participants of the spring fly fishing course. Russ Shields stated that he would email participants a copy due to printing costs already exceeding \$47.00 for the syllabus. Eleven individuals are currently enrolled in the course and six have paid as of the time of the meeting.

Kent Reagan motioned for adjournment of the board meeting and Matt Wegener seconded the motion. Motion passed and meeting was adjourned at 1850 hours. Post adjournment Jay Brykczynski gave a treasury report. Paul Wargo also requested that a copy of the newsletter be printed out and pinned to the bulletin board in the building each month. Kevin Gorby seconded the motion and motion passed. Business then concluded for the meeting at 1852 hours.

At 1907 hours Rex Straughn called the general membership meeting to order. Jay Brykczynski presented the treasury report for the month. Gerry Giles moved that \$100.00 be disbursed for his birthday. Motion was laughed at and ignored. Sorry Gerry. Rex Straughn announced that Oleta Webb and Russ Shields would represent the club on the building maintenance management committee.

Fishing reports were given although there was not much to report.

Russ Shields spoke about the spring fly fishing course. He stated that Gary Pheabus would be running the course and Russ would be providing him support. According to Russ fifteen syllabus/new membership packets were made up for fifteen individuals. At the time of the meeting eleven had currently signed up while six or seven had paid. Jay Brykczynski approached the Pensacola News Journal and Channel 3 about advertising for the event. Posts were also made on Pensacola Fishing Forum. Gerry Giles suggested that the course have a couple occasions where they practiced casting on the water instead of just grass casting. Russ Shields suggested that the first Wednesday in April and the first Wednesday in May they meet at the Bayview Senior Citizen Center because the bream fishing club would be meeting at the clubhouse on those dates. Other than a few minor changes the syllabus is about the same as last year.

Terry McCormick made a motion that the previous month's minutes be accepted as printed and Oleta Webb seconded the motion. Motion passed. Tom Gordon was a new member present at the meeting who is from Massachusetts. He stated that he was an avid fisherman, but new to fly fishing. He is enlisted in the Navy and will be in our area for a year. Don Johnson also announced himself as a new member present at the meeting. Don stated that he was enrolled in the course, but was only going to be able to attend four of the classes. Dave Johnson announces himself has Don's guest that is visiting for a few weeks.

Russ Shields announced that Paul Wargo placed an article in the newsletter about making a regular fly rod into a switch rod. Russ stated that he was currently working on the conversion for a few of the club members. His price for doing this has gone up slightly because of the rise in cost for the cork. Russ stated he would be happy to do this for anyone in the club who asked and he would do all he could to keep the cost down. Paul Wargo asked Russ to arrange a demo at the clinic.

Rex Straughn made a general statement about the website and the availability of soft drink for free and beer for a dollar at the meetings to inform the new members. Rex apologized for not having the opportunity to submit a president's letter for the newsletter last month. He encouraged anyone who wishes to do a program to coordinate with Oleta Webb. A ten to fifteen minute presentation is preferred. Paul Wargo then announced that if you catch any fish to get the pictures into him and he could put them and details of your catch in the newsletter.

Jay Brykczynski then presented the new budget to the general membership. Member dues and the auction are our major revenue generators. Jay stated we also have income from the Christmas party with the tickets and raffle. Russ Shields moved to approved the budget as presented and Oleta seconded the motion. Motion passed. Matt Wegener spoke briefly about the fly of the month. Normal Bull Session will be held Thursday at 1830 hours. All materials and supplies needed to tie the fly will be provided. Matt encouraged members to submit flies to him to be the fly of the month. Matt stated he would miss the Saturday clinic and suggested they do a demo on the switch rod unless someone else is available to instruct the fly. Concerning fly tying, Kent Reagan announced that all the new audio video equipment for the club has arrived. Kent hopes to be able to do a program next month on how to best utilize the equipment.

Oleta Webb asked that the time for events be placed on the calendar for all events. Kent Reagan said that he requested this in the future as well since he is posting the calendar to the website each month. Kevin Gorby then gave a presentation on reel maintenance. Door prizes were given. Kent Reagan motioned to adjourn the meeting and Russ Shields seconded the motion. Motion passed and meeting adjourned at 2008 hours.
