Faux Bucktail

Tapered Tips...... that's what it's all about, as the old song goes. Natural bucktail hairs are stiff enough to hold their shape in the water but the tips taper to a fine point, given the tips a subtle action in the water that sets "real" bucktail apart from the countless artificial fibers available to fly tiers. Of course, not all bucktail is created equal, and if you would like to delve into the complicated 'ins and outs' of "real" bucktail you are encouraged to read that chapter in Bob Clousers book. While you are at it, take a look at "Feather Brain" by Drew Chicone (spoiler alert: he counts the number of hairs in each part of the fly).

There are issues with bucktail. Hairs near the base of the tail flare when you tighten the thread (which may be a good thing, too) You usually get a lot of shorter hairs in any clump cut from the skin (which may give body and profile to the fly).



Every Faux Bucktail fiber is premium 6" length, giving more than twice the amount of usable fibers per tail



Wouldn't it be nice to be able to control the length of the fibers without unnecessary extra short hairs? And be able to keep the slender baitfish profile without dealing with flare. And have the translucence of some artificial fibers. Well....... (drum roll, please):

Enter the Faux Bucktail from Flymen Company, now available from Bob Story at Feather – Craft. Flymen are well known for the Fish Skull, Fish Mask, and other "heads" for flies although some would say they still haven't matched the balance and action of a traditional Clouser with dumbbell eyes.

Faux Bucktail comes on a hank with all fibers the same length as per usual for artificial fibers. You can control the exact length of the wing or tail on your fly, and add shorter fibers in front to build a profile without dealing with flare (you could even try counting the hairs......) There is translucence to the colors, especially the white which is more natural than white bucktail (if an artificial fiber can have a natural color?).

And (drums and trumpets, please)... the **tips are tapered** giving the wing of your fly that unique action of natural bucktail. Just when you thought you had enough Clousers to last forever, it's time to start over.

Double Haul: Powerful but tricky casting technique that makes it possible to snag a fly in two trees at one time or higher up in a tree twice as far away.

Fishing with Capt. Baz

There continue to be schools of big redfish around the pass, but man are they tough! By now all the spinfishing guides and recreational anglers have found them and harass them on a regular basis by either motoring through the schools or pounding them with lead-headed jigs. It's no wonder the fish have

lockjaw... Of course they have to eat, and we had some success in March getting them to eat the fly. First up are Stephen Miller from Chicago who I teamed up with Andy Anderson from Scotland on March 15. We found a nice bunch of fish along the inner bar close to the Observation Tower, and Andy nailed this beauty on my custom chartreuse/white half and half. Stephen






connected using the same fly a couple hours later with this bigger fish out of the same school. We found those fish numerous other times during the month but never got them to eat.

On March 16 we found a nice school of fish inside the pass, and Stephen landed one very late in the day on



a tan/white bucktail clouser. The fish seem to get a little more comfortable just before the sun drops too low to see them. Paul Keith from Arizona hit paydirt in the same area on March 21 with his first-ever redfish landed on Matt Wegener's little sz 4 olive/white EP clouser. Unfortunately, it's the last fish on that fly as the redfish almost





There have been schools of redfish on the Caucas Shoal, too, and these fish are happy to eat the fly. Greg Sharp from Little Rock and I spent a couple frustrating hours on March 20 chasing the fish by the



Observation Tower before giving up and running over to Johnson Beach. We saw numerous reds and pompano close to shore, but Greg had a tough time getting the fly to them. On the way back I caught a glimpse of color on the shoal, and bingo there they were. We had a strong incoming current and southerly breeze, so I motored the boat upwind of the school. Greg put the fly in the school and this fish ate it...just like that even with the motor running! The fish on the shoal are very accommodating, but pick your days and be careful out there. It can be a dangerous place for a small boat.

We've been having a lot of fun the past few days on the sand/grass flats in the ICW east of Gulf Breeze.



Haven't landed any of the larger redfish, but there are lots of little guys who are just learning about flies. Here's an example from March 28...Tim Zakriski from Upstate New York with his first redfish. My client today John Peschke from DC landed two similar sized redfish on his 5wt. Then we happened upon a school of about 30-40 big trout on a sand flat, and John landed

this beauty...his first speckled trout. We caught some smaller trout yesterday, but the fish we saw today were the first big ones I've seen this year. Bodes well for April and May. The pompano are here, but the darn Gulf has been too rough to get out there. All my clients are dying to get after them, but it doesn't look like it's going to happen for a few more days. We landed and released 7 beauties on sand fleas back on March 10. Also, the jack crevalle should be here now, and supposedly the Spanish mackerel are thick out by the Three Barges. All we need is a break on the conditions.



I'll leave you with a poor photo of Stephen Miller with a beautiful redfish he landed on March 17 while wade-fishing in front of the tower. Stephen was almost out to the inner bar when he saw this fish feeding 20' from shore. He had on Orvis' new sand flea pattern and said the fish charged the fly from 15' away. Sounds to me like the big fish we see along the beach both east and west of the pass might be looking for sand fleas. Plus, the Orvis pattern is the first one I know of that has actually worked...at least on redfish. We'll have to see how the pompano like it.

Baz Yelverton: Fly Fishing Guide By George Norton

Baz has been guiding fly fishers for fourteen years, he has fished in our area for over fifty years. Seeking a greater challenge, he started fly fishing in 1990 and is now recognized internationally and domestically as the fly fishing guide to hire in Pensacola. Trout: fish in the Bay's shallow grass flats in 2-4 feet of water. The peak season is May-June. These fish are readily accessible for wade and kayak fisherman. His favorite flies are a tan/white Clouser minnow and a red and white popper fished on a six to nine weight rod.

Redfish: Inshore reds are also found in the grass flats and around docks. Offshore in the Gulf, bigger redfish averaging fifteen to twenty pounds patrol the outside of the inner sandbar. Every year on November 11th, big redfish known as "bull reds" suddenly appear in Pensacola Bay for what has become known as "the annual running of the Bulls."

Pompano: Look for shadows on the bottom inside the inner bar. They also locate where there is a washout and feed on sand fleas. Our best fly is called a Pompanator which is yellow with red. A popular area is the beach near Fort Pickens and Johnson Beach in Perdido.

Spanish mackerel: Like pompano, they show up off the beaches in mid- March and hang around until the fall. Spanish are one of the easiest fish to take on a fly rod and will hit about anything that moves fast and has some flash but require a sixty pound mono tippet or wire.

Ladyfish: are great leapers and make a powerful runs at high speeds. Since they are not edible they are looked upon with disdain by meat fishermen but for the fly fisher ladyfish are great sport. They show up when the water hits 75 degrees in May. They love poppers and Clousers.

False Albacore: Sight fishing in the winter on the fly right off the beach is a hit or miss proposition but these fish are a challenge and a powerhouse to catch on a fly rod. The rest to the year they are located more offshore.

Jack Crevalle requires heavy tackle. You must use a ten to twelve weight rod as these pelagic species frequently run in the twenty pound range and break rods or spool light tackle. 2/0 Poppers and mullet flies are good choices. Look for boing water to locate feeding Jacks. George Norton

Fly of the Month - **Batman Streamer**...by Matt Wegener

Description

There is just something about the color combination of black and yellow that makes fish strike. This is not only a great fly for bluegill, but has fooled hundreds of rainbow trout for me over the years. I learned about it in the "Missouri Trout Flies: How to Tie and Fish Them" book by Ed Story from Feather-Craft that my Dad always carried with us on vacations to the Ozarks. I say book, but it was actually a 3-ring binder, yet it was filled with flies that have caught fish for me all over the country. Because of this, those flies are still in my fly box today, including this simple streamer. But don't be fooled by the simplicity of this fly, the marabou and the color combination are tough to beat.




Boot: A shallow puddle worn on the foot.

Tying Materials

Hook: #10 or 12 Dry Fly Thread: 3/0 black thread

Body: Oval silver tinsel Wing: Yellow and black marabou

Tying Instructions



- 1) Pinch the barb and start the thread an 1/8" behind the eye and tie in the oval tinsel.
- 2) Hold the tinsel straight up and wrap over the tinsel back towards the bend of the hook.



- 3) Wrap the thread back towards the eye of the hook and then wrap the tinsel forward to form the body of the fly.
- 4) Tie in a length of yellow marabou 1 ½ times the length of the hook shank.





- 5) Tie in a length of black marabou the same length on top of the yellow marabou.
- 6) Cover the feather tips with thread, whip finish and you are done.

Dam: Elaborate, expensive, but effective birth control device installed on major rivers frequented by spawning salmon and trout. **March Meeting:** Russ Shields gave a presentation on the art, the craft, and the science of rod building, including demonstration of his craftsmanship not only building a rod but building the tools that make possible the art of rod building. And Russ' rods are masterpieces.





Russ followed up his presentation by making a tool to show the comparison of the deflection of a rod with the spline up as compared to the spline down. (I did say it was science)

Insect repellent: One of a number of 'gag' items available in the novelty sections of tackle shops, along with "waterproof" clothing, "damp proof" matches and "long life" batteries.
