Fishing Report.... Captain Baz Yelverton



July was rock solid for redfish sightfishing in Santa Rosa Sound. The water cleared up nicely, and there were more fish around than one would expect in July. There were fish in the usual places, but I had my best luck on the north side of the island. The

key to success has been the new longer and faster strip. It works much better for the trout, too. All the fish shown below were on the EP baitfish using that stripping technique: **Rob Buckwalter** on July 6,



Dale Smith on July 11,



and **Malcolm Goodman** and **David Goodman** on July 16.





It was a big day for the **Goodmans**, as both of them landed their first redfish on fly. **Malcolm's** was a big over-the-slot fish, and he watched it charge and eat the fly in less than 2' of water. Life changing event for a stream fisherman...

We caught a few nice trout in July, but the only photo I got was of **Greg Hawley** on July 4.



We landed a beauty yesterday, and my client's friend (a photographer) took the photo with his million dollar camera. Of course it didn't come out. He forgot to take the underwater lens off. Sorry I didn't take 15 seconds to take a shot with my el-cheapo camera. You guys would've enjoyed it...a 23-24" fish.

Today I ran out to the Tex Edwards with spin anglers, and we found acres of false albacore for the first time in months. There's a lot of bait out there, so the fish should stick around for a while. August is usually excellent for FA as long as you're willing to make the run. The fish are 3-4 miles south of the pink condos at the west end of Pensacola Beach

Fishing Report....

The missing link this summer so far has been the Spanish mackerel. We haven't landed a decent fish since **Bob Willice** landed that nice one last month. If anyone finds them I'd appreciate a phone call.

There continues to be stained water coming down the rivers, and Pensacola Bay looks like iced tea. But the water at Town Point is clear enough to see fish, and the jack crevalle should be coming across that sandbar in August. We sat there for a few minutes the other day, and the only targets we had were black tip sharks in the 3-4' range. Not bad but not the targeted species, so we never made a cast. Any time you're on the water it's always a good bet to spend a half hour or so in that area. Nice place for lunch, but keep your 10wt ready.

Clodhopper Fly (quick grasshopper pattern)



As we move into late summer and early fall grasshoppers are more prevalent and are being blown into lakes and streams where they are easy prey for both warm water and coldwater species. This fly can be tied in a number colors to match the local grasshoppers or crickets. I have found that a tan grasshopper with a yellowish belly is quite common. Fish it near the bank and don't move it along the water surface. Let it drift with the current if there is any and only give it a slight wiggle occasionally. Grasshoppers are not good swimmers.

Materials

Hook size 8 to 16, 3x long


Thread Color to match or blend with foam 2mm foam ¼ inch strip twice as long as hook

Hackle Dry fly hackle brown

Dubbing synthetic yellow/amber/brown Legs Rubber legs of your choice




Step 1 Cut the foam to length and make a blunt point at one end. Crush the barb and place the hook in the vise. Start the thread behind the eye of the hook and make a thread base to the bend of the hook and return to just behind the eye.



Step 2 Place the foam on top of the hook with the point sticking out about a quarter inch beyond the back of the hook. Start tying it down behind the eye and end at the bend of the hook. Don't pull too tight or you might cut the foam.

Step 3 Tie in the hackle feather at the rear of the fly by the tip of the feather. Start your dubbing and the rear and dub forward about 2/3 's of the way to the eye of the hook. Palmer your hackle to the end of the dubbing and tie off.



Clodhopper Fly ... continue


Step 4 Take a pinch of elk hair and tie it on top of the fly. Be sure to tie it on well. I often add a drop of head cement here for insurance.

Step 5 Tie on the rubber legs on each side of the fly. Dub between the legs to help them separate.



Step 6 Fold back the front flap of the foam and tie down. Add a contrasting bit of foam for visibility if desired and trim foam and whip finish. I put some more head cement at the tie off. Trim the legs so that the back legs are longer then the front

Saturday, September 13


- breakfast meeting at the Gulf Coast Research Lab

Cold for freeing seized ferrules -I had the ferrules on my switch rod stuck so tight recently that my hand slipped while trying to separate them and I bent a stripping guide! So I did a little internet research and the better and more believable reports seemed to suggest using cold instead of heat. This is counter intuitive - heat expands - cold contracts, but I gave it a try. I wrapped the seized joint in one of those large gel packs (that I keep in the freezer for my knees,) then in a towel for insulation, and let it chill for about 15 minutes. Well the sections separated like they had been greased! It worked like a charm and has for me since! Give it a try! **Jeff DEUSCHLE**
