Saturday - GCRL Breakfast, Programs, Tying, Casting, Auctions and Raffles.



Fishing with Capt. Baz

The flats fishing got tough in July as always, so we spent most of our calm days in the Gulf. There weren't as many false albacore as there were in June, but we found them a couple times to the delight of my anglers. Local orthopedic surgeon Roger Ostrander was on the boat July 3 with his fishing buddy Brent Scott, and we ran east to the Liberty Ship before finding the fish. It was interesting. The FA were feeding on "snot bait" and wouldn't take the clear



gummy minnows, so we switched to Henry Cowen's "albie anchovy" and did pretty well.





Here's a nice shot of Roger with his second albie and then there's Brent with his first. All the fish that day were "small" in the 4# range. A week or so later Greg Hawley, Birmingham, and I found the big fish in the neighborhood of the Oops Barge.

Check out this 7-8 pounder! Once again the fish ate Cowen's fly...size 6. The FA will be with us off and on for the rest of the summer. If you plan on going out looking for them give me a call, and I'll provide the most recent intelligence...

We had some major league hot action this month with amberjacks on poppers. For a couple weeks there were good numbers of AJ's on the

Oops Barge. I went out there on a whim July 2, and we had a couple good explosions but no hookups. The following week Jonas and I gave them a try, and the fish were crushing the fly! We blind-casted big poppers and each landed two fish after missing a number of strikes and losing





others. I was using my Sage Xi2 12wt and a Tibor Gulfstream with the drag so tight you could hardly pull line off the reel. My biggest fish shown here was 31" to the fork...Jonas' was a little smaller. He landed his on a 10wt and one of his cool tube poppers. We left after an

hour, because I was taking a client Duke Goeddel there the next day.



The fish weren't as active for Duke, but he did land his first AJ on fly. He took a break and asked me to take a few casts, which I did and hooked but lost a huge fish. Duke took this photo which shows the incredible bend in my 12wt. Exciting times with the AJ's, but you'd best be on top of your game to prevent losing a fly line... They'll be on most of the nearshore wrecks until winter.





Duke and I ran in to the beach after AJ fishing and cruised just outside the inner bar looking for redfish. I had seen a small school a few days before east of the pass and hoped to find them again. Instead we found a school of a couple hundred fish in water as shallow as 3', and most of them appeared to be the over 20 pound variety. I ran well past the fish, armed Duke with a 9wt and tan/white clouser, and poled quietly back to them. Duke started casting to the edge of the school and worked his way all around them. The fish

never spooked but weren't at all interested in the fly, so we tried everything else in the box with no luck. Finally Duke went back to the tan/white and coaxed this fish to eat using a long, fast strip. We kept after them hoping for another hookup, but never got a follow. Oh well, they shouldn't have been

there in July anyway. That's Duke's wife Alena in the photo with him.

I mentioned the flats fishing being tough, and it is...extremely tough. We're seeing some redfish, but it's hard to get them to eat in the 90 degree water! Of course miracles happen, and on July 13 Greg Hawley cast an EP baitfish to this fish which charged it and ate the fly. I couldn't believe my eyes. That was almost two weeks ago...the last take we've had.



I took Greg tarpon fishing that morning, and we had light winds and perfect tides. The missing piece was sunshine. For two hours one cloud sat right on top of us while a dozen hundred pound tarpon rolled within casting distance. Each time Greg fired the fly in the general direction, but of course nothing happened. You really have to see the fish to get the fly in the strike zone. The wind picked up and blew us off the shoal just about the time the lights came on. That's tarpon fishing for you.

One closing comment. There are acres of nice Spanish mackerel about a half mile south of the Ranger Station. There are a few fish around Town Point, but your best bet is to run to the Gulf. Be careful out there, as it's dangerously hot. Drink lots of water and Gatorade or Powerade...

Tackle Report - The Ribbed Tungsten Body

Why are Clousers the best flies ever? They don't look all that realistic compared to Bob Popovics or Drew Chicone's flies. They don't "push water" like all the new flies with big fancy heads. The "eyes" are in the wrong spot (at least most bait fish don't have their eyes in their bellies). But the Clouser swims with hook up. After experimenting with a variety of flies on local bass (I am in Michigan) and only catching them on Clousers, I decided the upright hook has a LOT to do with it. Consider that all effective single hook spinning lures have upright hooks including, of course, the jig.

Enter the RTB – ribbed tungsten body – from Feather Craft (F-C # TL043). Wrap it on the outside of the shank, turn the fly over and tie a streamer that will ride with the hook up. The large RTB weighs 1/40 oz, just a little lighter than the regular Clouser medium lead dumbbell eyes (1/30 oz). I did find out right away that there can be NO hair below the RTB (which, I believe, is why Bob Clouser wraps the white hairs tight to the shank). To get rid of that lump, I wrap the RTB with body braid, and put a layer of white hair above that, then the color... tan, of course, or maybe chartreuse. And eyes – nice big shiny eyes. Will try them out when I get back to saltwater. (But will have Clousers ready just in Paul Wargo

A SAD SIGHT AT LAKE STONE

July 19 I took my grandson fly fishing to Lake Stone. The day was great - a few clouds and very little breeze; it was quite hot I will tell you, but it was still perfect for doing what we wanted to do.

I have fished a number of times at Lake Stone just so I could wet a line. There was always an ample supply of Bluegill and Bass to make the trip worthwhile. The lake always had a bit of weed along the bank, usually a grass and some Lilly Pad, but nothing out of the ordinary. Just a nice little pond for a bit of quiet fishing with at least 2 monsters that could send the blood pumping in any angler.

Anyway, when we saw the lake it became evident that fishing was impossible from the shore. Fish were rising and jumping, but there wasn't a single person on the water. All I could see was a Waterweed that extended from shore to 12 - 16 feet into open water. It was thick, so thick a person would not beable to wade through it to get to a point where they could fish, and it followed the entire shoreline around the lake. I picked a bit of the weed from the water and immediately saw that it was an aquarium weed that I had seen quite often.

Well, to say the least. my grandson and I didn't get to go fishing, the 'Check Engine' light on my truck came on and the sites on the Predido River (the Pipes and Fillingum's Landing) were so crowded with swimmers that there wouldn't have been any fish for a mile in either direction, but we did have a nice conversation and pleasant drive through the countryside.

My only conclusion is that some unthinking person had dumped their aquarium into Lake Stone instead of disposing of their fish and plants properly. This is just another example of invasive species in our water. Why don't people put something in the water that would do some good instead of destroying our fisheries???
