Fishing Report from Capt. Baz

As expected the bulls have been running all November, and *Redfish Fever* is high!



We first found them on top inside the bay on October 31. Mike Youkee was in town for 6 days, and we were



poling the flats east of Portofino when we saw the water boiling out in the ICW. These were beautiful brightly-colored fish but smaller than the usual

"bulls". Over half of them were just inside the slot. Mike landed five and released them all.

Nothing happened for a few days and then on November 3 there was a major eruption between the EPA and Bob Sikes Bridge. Russ Shields had booked Capt Eddie Woodall and me for three days, and after combing the whole bay (including the EPA) we headed east to the Portofino area. We had not been there long when Tom Finkle called to tell me he had just landed a fish by the Bob Sikes Bridge. By the time Eddie and I got there it was absolutely on fire with hundreds of big redfish crashing menhaden and mullet on the surface.

Eddie had the fly-casters (Russ and Cooper Adams) on his boat, and I had Russ' son Mike and son-in-law TJ Carnes who are spin-fishermen. When the smoke finally settled Mike and TJ had landed 50 redfish in the 20-25 pound range! If you don't believe me ask





Russ. I'm including photos of Mike Shields and TJ with their best fish of the day.

Again, nothing happened for a week. I'd resorted to drifting live bait through Pensacola Pass and could see big schools of redfish on my fathometer, but they seemed content sitting near the bottom in 60' of water. Then on November 10 something triggered them to all come into the bay at once. Could have been the new







moon...new tide sequence...drop in water temperature...who knows? But for Dave Walters and Scott Aitken it was a taste of heaven as they experienced my all-time best day of fly-fishing for redfish in Pensacola Bay. We boated twelve "doubles", and they figured each landed in the neighborhood of 20 bull redfish. I posted a short YouTube video which you might enjoy. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=6Uuht73XHVQ

Then a cold front came through with a week of small craft warnings. My fly clients Edd Hill and Dwayne Mays were here for five days and landed a few fish around the bay on sinking lines. Nothing spectacular until their final day when we found hundreds of fish on the surface





west of Pensacola Pass. The menhaden were thick all the way to the Perdido Key condos, and the redfish were under them. Of course by the next day they were gone...

Bob Jenkins and I last found them a couple days ago on November 20 in the middle of the bay. We had finished a frustrating day in the Gulf with just a single fish landed and were drifting a mile out from Bayou



Chico in the glassy water and sunshine enjoying a cold beer. Way in the distance I saw a couple boats motoring and stopping by the 3MB, and we decided to cruise over there and check it out. We were between the Port of Pensacola and Deadman's Island when the fish all came to the surface at once covering a half mile of water. Incredible numbers of fish! I think it was the same school we'd videoed ten days earlier. Bob landed 6 monsters in the next

hour or so before it abruptly stopped.

And that's how it's been. If you're in the right place at the right time it's fabulous. Otherwise it can be pretty darn boring running around the bay burning gasoline hoping something will happen. I've had reports from the last couple days that the fish have been dependably on top in the middle of the bay close to the Deadman's Island range markers. With the cold weather maybe they'll stay active for a while. There's a ton of bait; why shouldn't they!





Mike Youkee and I had some outstanding fishing for jack crevalle on October 30. The bay slicked off, and we were hunting redfish over by the port. In the distance I could see nervous water a hundred yards long and 30 yards wide. We idled over, killed the motor, and drifted into

range. To our delight it was a giant school of jack crevalle swimming on top with their tails and dorsal fins breaking the surface! You talk about getting excited! Mike was rigged with a big popper and heaved it out there on the edge of the school. He started stripping, and the fish came up under the fly but wouldn't eat it. Fish after fish rose up and refused it. So we let them move away and quietly changed to a big streamer. I repositioned the boat, and this time the fish crushed it. Mike landed two jacks...26 and 24 pounds. Earlier in the day he had landed his first ever pompano on fly, so we immediately clicked into redfish mode hoping for the Emerald Coast Grand Slam. But it was too late in the day for the flats, and we were never able to find any fish on the surface. Close but no cigar. Of course the next morning we found the redfish at Portofino, and Mike landed 5!



Kent Gilliland and I were drifting out from Joe Patti's November 24 hoping for some magic, and a school of a couple hundred fish popped up 200 yards from us. We beat the other boats there, and Kent landed this beauty on an all white go-meaux. One cast...one fish. Nice job, Kent.

In closing, here are some nice

shots of Mike with a big Spanish on October 30, his first pompano, and a big moonfish landed by the Massachusetts. There were hundreds of them feeding on the surface after the remnants of Hurricane Patricia





passed by, and from a distance I thought they were false albacore. Mike put the gummy minnow in the school, and this is what ate it. I've never seen them before. At the time we thought they were lookdowns, but after more research settled on moonfish. You never know what might eat your fly out there...




Capt Baz

Meeting minutes for 03 November 2015 General Membership Meeting

For a list of participants please refer to the attendance record dated 03 November 2015 Cliff Newton, President, called the meeting to order at 1900 hours.

Jay Brykczynski gave the treasury report. Terry McCormick motioned to accept the previous month's minutes as printed in the newsletter. Robin Armstrong seconded the motion and the motion passed.

Fishing reports were given. Robin Armstrong took a trip to the White River in Arkansas. New member Kent Gillian caught a Pompano. Water temperature in the bay at this time last year was 66 degrees Fahrenheit. This year the temperature is a 75 degrees Fahrenheit in the bay. Terry McCormick caught a bunch of Spanish mackerel by Fort Pickens. He also caught his first Bull Red of the season measuring in at 38" after a 35 minute fight by himself. He showed pictures so we believe it actually happened. Gilmore has been slow. He caught his Red east of Gilmore on a tan & white #2 Clouser. Overall fishing has been slow but did find some Bull Reds on the east side of the EPA.

Project Healing Waters reported than their planned trip to Atlanta to drift boat fish the Chattahoochee River has been postponed due to weather.

Elections Rex Straughn, Vice President, presented the results of the Nomination Committee. The following people have agreed to serve if elected. Rex Straughn has agreed to run for president. Vice president Nominees include Oleta Webb and Kevin Gorby. Kent Reagan and Jay Brykczynski have agreed to stay on another year in their positions of Secretary and Treasurer respectively. Robin Armstrong and Kevin Gorby have agreed to run for the two members at large positions.

Voting for the officer positions for the 2016 calendar year commenced. Cliff Newton asked individually for nominations from the floor for the positions of President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. There were no nominations from the floor for these positions. Paul Wargo motioned for a vote of acclimation for the uncontested positions of President, Secretary and Treasurer. Terry McCormick seconded the motion and the motion passed, electing Rex Straughn to President, Kent Reagan to Secretary and Jay Brykczynski to Treasurer for the 2016 calendar year. Ballots for Vice President were passed out to vote for either Oleta Webb or Kevin Gorby to the position. Cliff Newton tallied the votes and Oleta Webb was elected to the position of Vice President for the 2016 calendar year. Next the Members at Large positions were voted on. These are great positions for new members to the club allowing them the opportunity to learn how the board and club work. Cliff Newton asked if there were any nominations from the floor and there were none. Paul Wargo motioned for a vote of acclimation to elect Kevin Gorby and Robin Armstrong to the uncontested positions of Member at Large. Oleta Webb seconded the motion and the motion passed electing Kevin Gorby and Robin Armstrong as the Members at Large for the 2016 calendar year.

Angler of the Year Secret ballots were passed out to vote for the Angler of the Year. Angler of the Year is not necessarily the best fisherman, but has done the most to serve the club and fly fishing in Pensacola. Terry McCormick nominated Paul Wargo as Angler of the Year and Oleta Webb seconded the motion. Paul has contributed a great deal to the club this past year by constructing the newsletter, history of the club and taking new members fishing. For the record he did neglect to take Kent Reagan fishing but Kent is willing to overlook that infraction. The secretary took a moment to laugh at this point in the writing of these minutes. Paul also still performed all his duties and maintained contact with the club even during the time he was in Michigan. Kent Reagan nominated Cliff Newton for Angler of the Year and Ralph Newton seconded the motion. Kent nominated Cliff because of all the work he did as President this year and his continued contributions to Project Healing Waters. The secret ballots were collected and turned into Rex Straughn for counting. Other than the elected officers there are many ways to get involved and serve the club like the committees, cooking, volunteering for the sprung course, helping with the library or giving programs to name a few. Cliff encourages people to get more involved in the club and club activities.
