We get off to a busy start in the new year with our meeting and fly tying bull session the same week:








For all you FFNWF and PHWFF Members and Participants, I have difficulty finding words to express my appreciation for the accolades given to me at our Christmas Party.

My Favorite fly rod..... By Steve Hofmann

My favorite fly rod 'was' a 2005 SAGE model 'Launch'. It was an entry Level 2 piece, 8 foot, 4 weight, and gold in color. It was a listed as a smooth progressive power curve with very high strength to weight ratio. It was purchased from a Cabalas store in the "Bargain cave" area for \$80. I used the rod when I was just getting started in fly fishing. I used many times in lakes and small streams in Northern Arizona. It also made several trips to Montana, Idaho, Wyoming and Colorado where it caught many native cutthroat trout. It seemed like when-ever I used this rod I always caught a lot of fish! i.e. a lucky rod. I also used the rod to teach my granddaughter "how to cast". (See pic)

I eventually bought more expensive rods, but the Sage rod always seems to be the best and a dream to cast. Unfortunately, I never got to see the "end of life of this rod".... i.e. it ended up by mistake at the bottom of "Railroad Cove of Big Lake" in the White Mountains of AZ. I replaced it with a nice Winston rod, but it was never as lucky as the Sage rod I lost in Big Lake, AZ.

The end of life part of the story: My wife and I were fishing out of my aluminum boat at "Big Lake in Railroad Cove" one autumn day. I was in the bow; she was driving from the stern. She was using my favorite Sage rod with her own reel. I was using a new St. Croix rod and reel. I hooked and was playing a large fish. She set her rod (My Sage) down in the back of the boat to help me net my fish. Then next thing we realized is that her outfit (my Sage rod) was going over the stern and into the water. It floated for a few seconds and then it sunk. Glug! Glug Glug! "Good By" to my favorite Sage



rod!!





Fly of the Month - SPRING GLASS MINNOW

MATERIALS:

HOOK: #4 MUSTAD 3407DT **THREAD**: MONOFILAMENT **GILL:** SHRIMP PINK DIAMOND BRAID or PETITE ESTAZ

OVER BODY: LARGE PEARL MYLAR TINSEL **UNDER WING**: MINNOW BELLY ICE DUB

OVER WING: TAN ICE DUB

TOP WING: OLIVE ICE DUB

EYES: 4MM NEON YELLOW DOME EYES

INSTRUCTION:

1. Debarb hook. Tie in mylar tinsel at bend of hook, move thread 2/3

way forward and tie in and wrap gill

into a ball.

2.In front of gill ball, tie in prepared

minnow belly Ice dub. Fold tag end back over underwing and secure



3. Tie prepared 2nd tan Ice Dub wing over under wing. Fold tag end over back and secure.

4. Tie prepared 3rd top wing of Olive

Ice Dub over mid wing. Again fold tag over back and secure.



5. Install dome eyes each side head just behind thread wrapped nose.

6. Finish fly head with uv resin or favorite head cement.

Note. In preparing Ice Dub wings, select thin bunch of material and pull and layer material to align fibers. Thin clumps will help maintain a tapered body shape. When finishing fly head, pull all fibers back together as you place head cement over nose and eyes. Maintain fibers until cement dry.



FFNWF MEETING MINUTES December 2019

The President welcomed us at 1900 hours. 21 were present including two visitors (Sarah Holm and Tony Moore). The evenings' program of "Fishing in Montana" was postponed.

Financial report: The Treasurer reported we on track with finances and budget. Our club has 71 paid members and 4 honorary members. We sold 63 tickets for the Christmas Party with 38 members and 25 guests attending. Jay reported the party costs and the raffle prizes are within budget and we will enter the year 2020 with a healthy bank balance. Gerry Giles moved and Russ seconded and the Treasurer's report was approved.

Minutes of 5 November Meeting were accepted.
