Hard-Wired Pheasant Tail Heavy Two Wire Nymph.... Jerry Giles

This fly we are tying is very interesting. I found the pattern in "FliegenFischen", a German fly fishing magazine. The author reveals that he got the idea from a guide on the San Juan River, in New Mexico. Most of you know that Art de Tonnancourt brought us one of the most effective flies in use, the "Yongs Special", from his experiences on the San Juan with guide Andy Yong. So, come and tie this two wire nymph with us, and when you fish it, think of the San Juan, Bavaria, and your friends here at the club. This fly will get down quickly where it needs to be. Tie also with different colors of wire.

Materials


Hook: #12, 3/XH, 2/XL **Thread:** Green, 6/0

Wires: 1 Green, 1 Copper, 28ga., or Medium Ultra

Tail: Pheasant tail fibers

Wing Case: Brown Raffia

Tying Instructions



- 1. Crimp barb, place hook in vise.
- 2. Start thread behind hook eye making a jamb knot. Wrap back to the hook bend.
- 3. Strip four pheasant tail fibers from a tail feather and tie them on top of the hook, extending about a hook gap beyond the hook.
- 4. Cut a 3 1/2" piece each of green and copper wires.
- 5. Hold the green wire on your side of the hook with your fingers at the bend and the wire extending along the shank to 1/3 behind the eye. Wrap the thread forward and back securing the wire evenly to the side of the hook. The thread should now hang at the bend of the hook.





- 6. Repeat with the copper wire on the other side of the hook shank.
- 7. Tie in a 2" X 1/8" piece of raffia on top of the shank, about 1/3 back from the hook eye. Wind the thread forward to just behind the hook eye.
- 8. Grasp both wires firmly together and wind in tight, touching turns forward. Go around the raffia and up to just behind the eye. Clip off excess wire and smooth the ends against the shank. Secure ends with thread.





- 9. Apply a small amount of dubbing in front of the raffia to form a thorax.
- 10. Tie three pheasant fibers, hook-gap length to each side to form the legs.
- 11. Pull the raffia forward over the thorax to form a wing case. Clip escess raffia, and form a neat thread head.
- 12. Whip finish, and apply a coat of head cement to the head and raffic wing case. Go catch some fish!

Fishing Report.... Captain Baz Yelverton

We finally had some beautiful days in May for Gulf of Mexico fly-fishing. The cold fronts that blew through knocked the shore break down to nothing, and we were able to sit in our usual favorite spots waiting for pompano. It sure would've been nice to land one, but it never happened. With the lack of rain the water was almost too clear...at least that's my excuse. We had numerous fish after numerous flies, but not a single take. I fished solo one day, and a big pompano followed my little yellow fly for 20' before refusing it. I couldn't believe it. We didn't see as many fish as usual, but we did have 4-5 good shots on a number of days. Oh well. That's pompano fly-fishing for you. On one of the perfect days, my old fishing partner Rocketman from Colorado was anchored a few hundred yards west of us in the inner cut. A pretty good sized "mystery fish" drifted across the inner bar and into casting range of my client who was of course locked and loaded with a yellow pompano rocket. As the fish moved closer I saw it was a juvenile tarpon of about 12-15 pounds. Shocked and in awe my client made a few casts at the fish, but it never acknowledged the fly and continued moving westbound directly toward Rocket. Being a totally high tech guy I immediately grabbed my cell phone to give him a heads up, but he never moved from his perch atop the poling platform. After a couple minutes he climbed down and returned my call. It was interesting from our distant perspective to see his reaction to the idea of an approaching tarpon. As soon as he put the phone down the fish was on him, and he cast his pompano fly in front of the fish and got a follow...then a refusal. Rocket changed to a gray/white Puglisi baitfish pattern, the planets aligned, and the tarpon circled back toward his boat and ate the doggone fly! He missed the hookset, so we never got to see the fish go airborne. At least it took the fly, or at least Rocket said it took the fly... It just goes to show you never know what's going to happen along that stretch of beach.



We did land a very nice jack crevalle on May 7. Matt Neal from Gulf Breeze had never thrown anything bigger than a 4wt, but he somehow taught himself to double haul. His technique worked great with a 9wt as we anchored east of the Coast Guard Station catching Spanish mackerel and ladyfish. Out of nowhere a school of a couple hundred jacks appeared moving fast to the west. There wasn't time to change to the 10wt, so we let them pass, pulled in the anchor, and ran hard to the west to get ahead of them. It took three or four tries, but Matt hooked and landed this fish which weighed about 18 pounds...quite a thrill for his first-ever saltwater fly-fishing experience. The jacks have been sporadic but should get more dependable this month and next. I like to anchor just inside the point on the west side of the pass on outgoing water waiting for eastbound

fish to come across the point. They'll be closer to shore than you expect. Don't be surprised to see some tarpon along that edge, too. We hooked one a few years ago on a 2/0 popper...

Otherwise, the Gulf fishing is good for Spanish, ladyfish, and giant blue runners (hard tails) at the USS Massachusetts. There are schools of ladyfish along the beach in front of the observation tower, and the eddy that forms on outgoing water just west of the pass is loaded with ladyfish, Spanish, and small bluefish. Just this past week the false albacore showed up for the first time this year. There were numerous schools in the pass, and yesterday we found some small schools by the Three Barges. We haven't gotten a fish to eat yet. They're feeding on something very tiny, and nothing in my fly box has worked. Where are you, Travis, when I need you?! I ordered some Puglisi "micro minnows" yesterday from Feather-craft...maybe they'll do the trick. We'll know by my report next month.

The flats in Santa Rosa Sound are as pretty and clear as they get. We've been spending a lot of time poling around them and have found quite a few redfish, but as usual this time of year they are extremely wary. It takes a perfect cast to not spook the fish but get the fly close enough to be seen. In addition to the usual Clouser minnows we've had some luck on a gray/white Puglisi baitfish which lands softly and undulates its way to the bottom. The scenario is very cool. We tend to be anchored with redfish milling around in 2-3' of crystal-clear water just out of casting range. Every now and then one ventures into range, and we attempt to drop the fly in its path. It's like fishing for rainbows in a clear mountain lake. Here are a few shots of anglers who "made it happen" in May: Les Litzinger on May 2, Jonas Magnusson on May 5, and Jim Little on May 9.







Fishing Report.... Captain Baz Yelverton

We haven't been seeing as many big trout on the flats probably because the water's warmed up so much...87 degrees yesterday. Maybe they've moved into water that's a little deeper. Troutmaster Jerry Aldridge will be the man to ask about that. But we have been having a lot of fun sight-fishing for catfish. I know it sounds lame, but don't knock it until you try it. For one thing the catfish are easy for anybody to see, and they'll eagerly rush over to the fly but won't eat it unless you strip it *just* right. It's redneck bonefishing at its finest, and you might get lucky and add a lizardfish and blowfish for the Redneck Slam!



One final word on the big redfish. We are seeing a few fish along the inner bar in the Gulf but most of them have moved into the deep waters of Pensacola Pass. They like it when the tide is moving fast, and there's no way to get a fly down to them. So we've resorted to catching them on spinning tackle. On most of my fly charters we end the trip with a few drifts through the pass just so my clients can feel the power of the big fish and imagine what it will be like next fall, winter, and spring to land them on fly. At the end of the trip a couple days ago I stopped on a grass flat and caught 9 pinfish in my baitnet. We landed redfish on the first 7 drops. And these fish are HUGE. I'll attach a photo so you can see what I'm talking about....Capt Baz


Fishing Report: The Further Adventures of Tom, Terry & Jerry.... Tom Finkle

A beautiful morning, 05:45 at Shoreline Park Jerry Aldridge, Tom Finkle, and Terry McCormick meet and load gear on Jerry's boat in preparation for a perfect day on the water. He watches intently trying to learn from the Professionals! Jerry hooks a big Lady Fish, it is jumping and throws the hook. He casts again, suddenly there is a tremendous jerk on the line! The rod tip goes down, Jerry was between strips and drops the line, he finally grabs it and regains composure only to discover that he has missed a tremendous strike! As he shows a look of disappointment he looks down and behind him to discover the real "Jerk" who pulled on his line was sitting behind him laughing uncontrollably. He immediately delivers a swift kick to Tom's butt! (How could he miss?)

We continue to drift the flats and Terry hooks up and lands a beautiful Speck! Things are really looking up! We catch a couple more nice ones and Jerry decides we should motor to a new spot. On the way we look at the gas gauge and notice it is most firmly seated upon the letter "E". Weenie Tom says "lets pull in" but Jerry who knows his vessel assures all aboard it is Ok. We catch more fish and move one last time before calling it a day. Halfway to the new spot Jerry suddenly halts his vessel abruptly! He looks us in the eye sternly and we ask what is wrong? He bluntly remarks" we are outta gas". Jerry with great knowledge of the sea says the wind is right and in a few hours we should drift across directly into shoreline. However Tom is out of food! 
