Fishing Report

And summer begins! Okay it is officially a month away, but it sure feels like it in the great outdoors. Just about the only place out there to stay cool is one the water, so let's hit it.

As most know these reports have been coming to you from Capt Basil and Capt Dan, through one armed Capt Richard, who is on the mend as we speak. Both captains have reported good sight fishing along the correct shorelines and grass beds. Reds, specks and black drum have been cruising in search of a quick meal. Looks like the tradition continues with the EP bait fish (Peanut Butter) pattern being the top fly of choice for all three species. As always slow and steady is the key to finding these fish. Reds and blacks can be found cruising the shallows on both the Bay and Gulf shorelines. As always, be sure to carry a big stick with a popper for the marauding Jack Creville.



Baz reported ladyfish and bluefish have entered the Pass and can be found scattered around Pickens Point. Club members have reported they not here in great quantities but as we know it won't be long before you can't keep them off your fly. Clouser minnows, Flash Fly and Clouser's Flash Belly work well.

The Spanish and specks have been touch-and-go as of late on the right grass flats. The Bay is still tea colored which has a tendency to put these fish off. But fish the moving water time periods with flashy flies and Terry Mc's tan and olive Clouser with either heavy mono or wire tippet and hold on tight. Bob K reported the long shank Flash Variant worked well on his last outing.



Thanks for bearing with me as I have been reporting others' catches. I hope next month to filling in with my own experiences now that the shoulder is "FIXED" and on the repair.

Fishing Trip – Brevard, North Carolina

FFNWF Club members Ellen and Steve Hofmann fly-fished the French Broad River near Brevard NC on May 6. We used Headwater Outfitters guide service for a full day float trip. We started on the French Broad River adjacent to their shop and fished another 4 miles downstream. It was a great day of fly fishing with a dry dropper rig.

We each caught about 15 fish each. Mostly smaller trout. We used a “Hopper dropper” set up for flies. i.e. point fly was a ‘Daves Hopper’ second fly a ‘Squirmy wormy type fly’ as the trailing fly. Fishing method was the usual river method, i.e. cast upstream of a riffle, and mend accordingly to produce a drag free drift.



We caught Rainbow, Brown, Brook trout and an occasional sucker fish. Our guide was Brett Meany. He was an excellent guide. (I have fished with dozens of guides all over the US over the last 20 years of fly fishing and he was one of the top 3 guides I have ever used)

Fly of the Month: The Micro Minnow

The Micro Minnow is a fly that was developed to catch picky fish that only wanted to eat tiny bait fish. It was first developed for brown trout in Argentina but later used successfully in many other places and situations. In the Pensacola area it should be effective when the false albacore (bonito) are feeding on schools of bay anchovies and are refusing larger flies. Also, target specks, reds and ladyfish feeding under dock lights on glass minnows. For fun on the grass flats use it with a 3 weight to catch pinfish, ladyfish and others and maybe even get a speck. In freshwater it should be effective for bream, crappies, yellow perch, white bass and anything else feeding on small fry.

Ingredients:

Hooks:	Mustad 3407 Sizes 6-8 or Gamakatsu SL11-3 H sizes 6-8	Tail/Wing:	White bucktail or FTD Baitfish Hair white.
Eyes:	FTD Fisch Eyes: color: silver, glow, red or yellow	Body:	FTD Starburst Dubbing: Pearl colors
Thread:	White flat waxed nylon 3/0.	Gut Sack:	Polarflash Micro #2033 or FTD Micro Flash color: hot white.
		Glue/UV	Superglue gel . Solarez UV Medium

Steps:

		
<p>1. Start behind the hook eye and put on a thread base. Tie on the gut sack at the hook bend.</p>	<p>2. Tie on the tail/wing forward of the gut sack.</p>	<p>3. Tie on the body dubbing forward of the tail/wing. Two ties around the fly. Build a head and whip finish.</p>
		
<p>4. Flatten the head to prepare for eyes. Then use the gel on both sides and put on the eyes.</p>	<p>5. Cover the eyes and head with UV resin and rotate the vice as you hit it with the UV light.</p>
