The weather is changing, fishes are thinking about leaving the Bay or heading to their winter haunts but wait NOT so fast there. Spanish are still on the prowl around "the" grass flats. Just make sure there is plenty of tidal movement. Baz's client landed this nice Spanish and next day I went there, nothing. I was a bit early, there was no flow and there were no Spanish. The next day I got it right, tidal movement made all the difference. Flies of choice are still chartreuse streamers and tan over



Olive and chartreuse over White Clouser's. I guided Rex and Jerry this last week and I afraid to report both areas were off (off tide!) Terry is headed out, so we'll see how the master does.



The storms have made sight fishing a little tough, because of the wind not water clarity. It's hard to push around a 20-foot boat (even a flats boat) in a 15-20 mph wind. The redfish have been holding along the shoreline and even ready to eat a fly. EP pinfish and grey and white minnow flies seem to be the key. If you head to Big Lagoon, watch for manatees. I had 7-8 cruise within 10' of the boat in Fort McRee no motor zone.



The big boys of fall have arrived. With a snap of the fingers the Bay has started loading with big Bull Redfish. We can say the “running of the bulls” Pensacola style has started early. Rex was able to lay out a Big Fish Deceiver in path of this “little” guy and spent about 15 minutes fighting it. I think he enjoyed it. Use big flies, Big Fish Deceivers, XL Clousers, Go-Meaux...

Casting for Recovery Retreat

I arrived at the Running Creek Ranch in Poplarville, Mississippi at 8am on Sunday after a three-hour drive from Pensacola for the orientation of what to expect of the fishing guides for this Retreat. Susan Brooks and her group prepared the 10 guides of the medical condition of the 10 ladies who were invited to learn about fly fishing during a three-day event which was the first retreat being held in the state of Mississippi



George Norton was assigned to Carolyn and I was assigned to Shilo (she was named after a Neil Diamond song!). I was happy to see Tom Dempsey also there, since he has been an instructor in casting at various events held by the Gulf Coast Fly Council (4 guides from Louisiana, 4 from Florida and 2 from Alabama). Introductions and assignments (along with lots of photo taking) were made and the group proceeded to a banked large pond on the property. Susan informed everyone that the pond was stocked with Bluegill, Bass, Bream and a large assortment of Catfish.



The ladies were given either 5 or 6 wt donated Orvis fly rods with Battenkill reels with 4x tippet leader attached. From around 9:30 until 12:30 the ladies casted in the pond and a large percentage were able to successfully cast and catch many fish. The guides tied many different types of flies and were instructed to dehook and release any fish caught, so that no lady's medical condition and treatment would not be endangered by a cut or a barb in the finger!



Shilo and I worked on the static roll cast (since the group only were taught the day before of the various aspects of fly fishing). Shilo was having her difficulties and two other guides (Andre Davis and

Angela Terry) came over to help her in the casting techniques. We all made certain that everyone continued to be hydrated with ice cold water bottles since the temperature increased during the morning hours.

Towards the end of the fishing session, Shilo was happy (with Andre's assistance) in hooking and successfully netting a huge catfish. Shilo was so happy in catching her first fish and each lady was very pleased to have worked with her assigned guide in catching and releasing.

At 1230 the entire group drove over to the "Stables" of the ranch where a delicious catered buffet lunch was served. Each table consisted of three ladies and their assigned guides. After dessert, Susan began a short ceremony in which the donors of the retreat were recognized (Flyfishers of Northwest Florida was included).

Certificates of Accomplishment along with pins were presented to each lady. The guides also received a Certificate for contributing to make the retreat a success. Each lady and their guide gave a short account of their fishing that day! Everyone associated with the retreat was greeted with a round of applause. The three-day event concluded at 2 pm with happy faces and smiles all around as we left the "Stables" dining room for the drive home



As a aside, in speaking with Angela and Andre, I learned that both participate in another charity program that I did not know about. It is called the Mayfly Project/Mentoring <https://themayflyproject.com>. From what Angela and Andre told me that it is a program to promote and to mentor foster children to learn about fly fishing. Apparently, the closest location is in St. Petersburg but it is huge throughout the nation! With everything that I am doing, I am unable to pursue this, however I bring this up since perhaps one of the members may want to reach out to this organization.

Fish Trip Report

FFNWF Club members Ellen and Steve Hofmann Fly fished on Sept 23 on the Davidson River in North Carolina near the town of Brevard. We used *Davidson River Outfitter's* guide, Walker Parrot, for a 1/2 day of wade fishing on their private section of the river near the fly shop. It was a great day of wade fly fishing. The fall weather was perfect and the water was clear and the fish were biting.



We each caught ~ 12 fish each ~16 to 18 inches. We used a “Hopper dropper” set up for flies. i.e. a “Dave’s Hopper” and a “Squirmy wormy” as the trailing fly. Fishing method was the usual stream style, i.e. cast upstream of a riffle and mend accordingly to produce a drag free drift. Ellen did it perfectly. She had a case where she caught 2 fish on one cast. We were supposed to fish another 1/2 day on Sept. 25, but because of the incoming hurricane, we cancelled and headed home. Safety First! This was a duplicate fly fish trip from the Fall of 2023. Davidson River Outfitters are highly recommended if you are in and around the Brevard area of North Carolina. Note, I was using my “home-made” Bamboo fly rod all morning and it performed beautifully.

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Fly of the Month: Glass Minnow

I was taught this fly by Carl Hansen of St Petersburg, FL. in 1991. He created the glass minnow fly by snelling mono on the hook to create the body and then using bucktail for the wings. By the time he taught me the fly he had added bead chain eyes and was using "poly duster" fibers instead of bucktail and he also added krystal flash. He used size 2-8 Mustad 3407 hooks to match the size of the bait fish. I later tied some on 34011 size 2 hooks to give it a longer profile and I bent it back so it would fish with the hook point up to make it semi-weedless over grass flats. Since I started using the glass minnow flies, I have caught over 40 different species of saltwater fish on them, from pinfish to tarpon. Depending on its size, color, and how it is retrieved, this fly can imitate small baitfish (glass minnows) or shrimp or just be an attractor fly.



Materials:

Hooks: S74SAP-TX (34011) size 2 or S71SAP-TX (3407) sizes 2, 4, 6 or 8

Eyes: Hour-glass or bead chain eyes or no eyes

Body: Aluminum foil, covered by 20# mono

Threads: Clear 6/0 Mono thread for tying on the body material. Flat waxed nylon: Fluorescent Fire Orange or Red for the head, eyes and wing.

Flash: Krystal flash

Wing: Poly duster fibers or FTD Water silk or any other synthetic fibers in any color combination, as desired.

Tying Instructions:



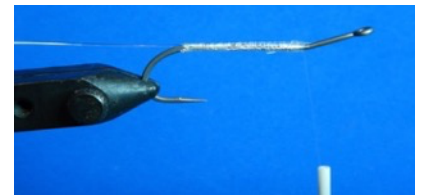
1 Bend back the hook then debarb and place it in the vice with the hook point down.

2 Wrap the hook with aluminum foil (shiny side out) from the bend to above the hook barb.

3 Start the mono thread at the bend. Tie on the 20# mono and wind the thread over it back to above the barb and tie down. Return the thread to the bend.



Wind the 20# mono forward to the bend with touching wraps. Tie it off and double whip finish at the bend. Cut off the excess mono and the thread.

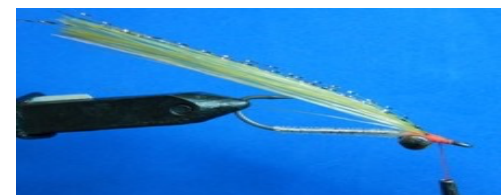


4 Start the red thread behind the hook eye and wrap back to the bend. Tie on the eyes in the bend with figure 8 wraps. (Super glue, if desired). Take the hook out of the vice and turn it upside down with the hook point up in the vice.



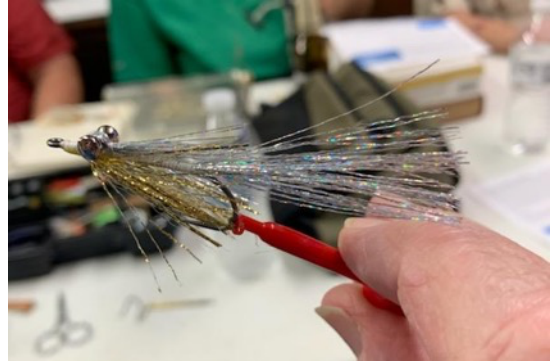
5 Take a sparse amount of lighter colored fibers and tie them in first. Then tie on a few strands of Krystal flash.

6 Finally, tie on a sparse amount of the darker colored fibers. Form



a nice head and whip finish. Cover the head with clear nail polish, head cement or UV (as desired).

Our Vice President, Rex had a great time fly fishing for king salmon and smallmouth bass. Eight PHW participants were guided on the Pere Marquette and the Muskegon Rivers. Rex hooked some monster king salmon and he landed some beautiful smallmouth bass on poppers. Rex enjoyed Oak Heart lodge which kept everyone together with their large warm living room. The accommodations, guides and food were excellent. They were located 40 miles upstream from Lake Michigan. The fly rods were nine foot eight weight TFO's with twelve pond tippet. A brown damsel fly worked best on the salmon.

Rex fished two days for salmon and one day for bass with a different guide each time. When I asked which trip he favored he didn't hesitate to say, "King salmon of 25 pounds!" The Kings weren't feeding but they either took the fly in their mouth unaware or out of irritation.
