HHM&A: The View From Above

The view from above is different now. Our 1879 Deckert House sits alone just east of our main buildings, waiting for a barn to be placed directly north of it. Our hope is that these two structures will become the cornerstone of a farmstead setting that will pay homage to the many small farms that were scattered across the Great Plains in the early 20th century.

There is now an empty space where the pioneer home sat for the past four decades, awaiting new plans and a new purpose.

You will note that a section of our sidewalk was destroyed during the house move. A temporary walk will be put in place, as we do not know what damage will yet happen once the barn arrives! Over the next year, we will work towards including our historical buildings in an overall security plan, building a sidewalk to connect to the farmstead site, landscaping with historically-accurate plantings, and the usual painting and maintenance tasks.

We welcome your input & ideas, as well as your gifts of time and money toward these projects!




Local History Published
