

Charting the course

A day-long conversation by Heritage Hall Museum & Archives board members and staff affirmed what's been happening at the museum in recent years and helped set the agenda for the months and years to come.

Led by Joshua Hofer, a community vitality field specialist with the South Dakota State University Extension, the April 22 strategic planning exercise explored strengths and weaknesses to identify opportunities and help set goals. The four-member staff and nine of the 11 board members gathered both in person and remotely at the Prairie Arboretum Interpretive Center for a structured discussion. It began at 8:30 a.m. and continued to 4 p.m.

The exercise explored four themes:

Discovery – What is the best of what we are doing at HHM&A?

Dream – Think big; reach for the stars. What could be?

Design – Think a bit more "reasonably" – what should HHM&A focus on?

Destiny – What will be? How do we put that into action?

The process, which included large and small group discussions, noted the improvements in exhibits, community engagement and positive spirit at the museum in recent years. But the primary objective was to narrow more than a dozen goals to three priorities:

• Establish an endowment fund to strengthen long-term financial viability.

• Strengthen security to protect the artifacts and documents that have been entrusted to our care.

• Expand technology infrastructure to enhance storytelling and education as well as enable upgraded security.

"Visioning and strategic planning are essential for any organization that wishes to survive, thrive and grow into the best it can be," said HHM&A Board Chair Marlan Kaufman.

He noted a similar exercise six years

ago helped set goals that have been met and helped the museum move in a positive direction.

"Having staff and board members working together at various tables resulted in a feeling that we are in this boat together," he said.

The HHM&A Board of Directors will be pursuing these goals using recently established committees to help research and develop strategies for implementation.

In addition, the entire day-long conversation will become a working document to aid both short-term and long-term planning.

Last month's strategic planning session is part of a broader refocus on governance by the HHM&A Board that includes restructuring and estabcontinued on page 3

The Director's Perspective

Step by step, we continue our efforts to fulfill our mission and propel this organization forward. I want to give a special shout-out to HHM&A board members and their endeavors to explore their roles in this effort. I appreciate the leadership of board chair Marlan Kaufman and I'm using this space to share some of his reflections on our strategic planning session held last month.

"Visioning and strategic planning are essential for any organization that wishes to survive, thrive and grow into the best it can be. Having staff and board members working together at various tables resulted in a feeling that we are in this boat together. Dreams and visions were shared with a sense of mutual acceptance and a desire to accomplish what is best for HHM&A.

"The gift of this process is that it creates a mutually developed focus and direction to the mission, goals and activities of the museum staff and board members for the near and long term. I was somewhat surprised at how unified the participants were as they wrestled with diverse issues throughout the day. The process showed this during the 'voting' exercise.

"As a former educator who has experienced similar sessions, I knew the potential a planning day could have for an organization if done well. We were led by an expert who helped guide us forward, sensed when it was time to shift or move on, and created an attitude of how important this process was in leading our organization forward. That possibility kept me and everyone else energized throughout the day.

"Having served on this board in the past, it is incredibly satisfying to have watched HHM&A grow into the museum/archives it is today. My personal concern *is for the stability and overall health of the financial structures supporting the staff,* maintenance, exhibit development and operating expenses of HHM&A. Setting a goal to establish and finance an endowment fund will be a focus of two board committees and key staff stakeholders. A well-funded endowment will provide *basic support for annual budget development and long-range maintenance needs. Implementing this goal will be foundational to moving part-time staff positions* towards full-time and/or adding staff in areas of greatest need.

"It's my intention as chair of the board to keep the goals front and center and to ask staff and committees to implement specific plans and procedures to meet them, so five years from now, or sooner, we can say 'well done' and even better than we envisioned."

A team including several members of the board and the museum staff has begun meeting as part of the project.

The Museum Assessment Program (MAP) has helped more than 5,000 small and midsized museums to strengthen operations, plan for the future, and meet industry standards.

"MAP adds to our credibility as a museum," says HHM&A Board Member Charles Schrag, who has played a key role in pursuing the project. "Being selected for MAP by AAM shows that the largest accrediting body for museums in the U.S. believes that a little museum in South Dakota is worth supporting and has the potential to do even greater things."

"AAM's willingness to send an unbiased museum professional to assess the museum will help us evaluate how we are doing as a museum," he said. "The museum has had a tone of positive growth over the past five years. The MAP process will give us the opportunity to step back, reflect on that growth and chart a sustainable path forward."

Schrag also noted that completing MAP positions HHM&A well for new grant opportunities and potentially pursuing AAM accreditation.

The one-year process includes self-assessment, institutional activities, and a consultative peer review – including an on-site visit and recommendations. It is designed to address "big picture" issues, including policies, budget, governance and other circumstances unique to the museum.

Themes include:

- Public Trust & Accountability
- Mission and Planning
- Collections Stewardship
- Education and Interpretation
- Financial Stability
- Facilities and Risk Management

Museum welcomes Schmeckfest guests
