conference in 2023 that first brought the girls to Moscow Idaho, New Saint Andrews College, and Christ Church. Little did we know what that would



lead to. Gracia also started spending a bit of time with a troublesome goat, Apa, before he got rehomed.

Eliyah has been plodding a steady course through two years' worth of math (Geometry and Algebra 2) so she can join her peers in Pre-Calculus this year.

Nathan's summer has consisted of yard work, cleaning out a barn that had a couple decades of hay and manure built up in it, volunteering on the Washington, Idaho, and Montana railroad where he has helped with the rails, farmer crossings (below pic) and

As for me, I did apply for two jobs but didn't get either. Since I'm helping fund the kids' tuition by subbing at Logos, my free-time for a job is somewhat limited. Speaking of subbing, in June I attended Logos' Annual Teacher Training. That was a three-day conference with many helpful



workshops and was attended by teachers from all over the nation. During the Music Festival Palouse, Meet the Instruments, sponsored by

Christ Church, I introduced a lot of very interested kids to the clarinet. When I was first asked to do this, I refused, thinking it was out of my league. However, the Lord wouldn't let me and I finally agreed. It was a great time sharing the love of music with so many musicians and kids.

A couple things we did together was the Defund Planned



protest over in Washington. It was

a nation-wide protest, organized by Live Action and implemented locally by Kirker* Sidewalk Ministries (of Christ Church). And even though we were here in Moscow last July, we were prepping for a wedding and too busy to attend the July 4th Parade. This year, we went and was it amazing! The parade was started

popsicles and more! Finally, to help more around the Hakimian house over the summer, each of us Grogg gals has taken one day each week to prepare supper. I have Friday and we do pizza, Eliyah makes chicken alfredo on Thursday and Gracia takes Wednesday, sometimes making chicken nuggets, sometimes spaghetti.

Jason small claims against American Airlines for denying his flight to Dominica for his trial, has had several interesting turns.

They are refusing to settle and refusing to give any legitimate paperwork, so it's going to trial early in September.

As for the lawsuit against the Dominica government for our kids, our lawyer got all the hundreds of papers (400 pages) filed in high court for when this goes to trial, at a still unknown date. We do know the pre-trial date is sometime in November.
