Today marks the one year anniversary of Jason being let go from Chrysler, something I never thought would happen. I mean, who would fire such an amazing worker?!

The reason I mention this in our newsletter is because this part of our story isn't closed. Since day 1, Jason has been keeping up with the Union, making sure he's being propertly represented.

After six months of getting nowhere with them, he filed an NLRB (National Labor Relations Board) charge. That got the Union moving! But here we are, at the one year mark and they're just now getting to final litigation, trying to decide whether his wrongful termination case is worth taking on.

Back in March, he filed double EEOC (Equal Employment Opportunity Commission) discrimination charges against Chrysler and the Union. He's now waiting on the EEOC investigation to come back so he can file a lawsuit. He's been encouraged to see multiple Covid-related terminations being taken to court and litigated successfully. Ultimatly, he knows it's all in God's hands but we'd appreciate prayers for a favorable outcome.

Things didn't just "flow" after that like I thought they would, but an agreement has finally been worked out. The owner, Brian, (do pray with us for his salvation) really likes his truck and still isn't ready to part with it permanently. However, with no money to fix it, it had sat for two years. We agreed to fix it and he's letting us use it for the next three months.

It's old, a 2004, but hasn't racked up the miles yet. That said, it's an import from the UK and has been driven crazy (that's normal driving here). It did (does?) need more work than Brian initially thought and we almost got stranded our first trip out.



After purchasing a new battery (and wipers) it's started right up every time. This Mitsubishi L200 is a double cab, 4x4, has a roll bar and hitch, all things we wanted in a truck. Also, it's very Dominican looking so we don't stick out (as much). We're thankful! Please pray this truck will continue to be reliable (we think it'll need transmission work soon), with no major needed repairs while in our possession and that the Lord will provide for us once we return it to Brian.

### Friends for Everyone But So Many Girls!

This month, our South African friends introduced us to their expat Dutch friends. We had a wonderful time at their stillunder-construction house even though they've been here a very long time.
