

Hidden in plain sight

Tust outside Crystal River city lim-**J** its, off Citrus Avenue, lies a Black cemetery rich in history with stories and lessons just waiting to be unearthed. Because of segregation, cemeteries were divided racially, and Blacks were not authorized to be buried within the city limits. Crystal Memorial Gardens is still an active cemetery and continues to serve as a final place of rest.

Many of Citrus County's founding family members, instrumental in its early development as well as those who fought for equal rights, the right to vote and access to education, are

Cemetery. In the late 1800s and early 1900s, Citrus County experienced a significant population increase. This increase was due to the phosphate boom and impacted the lives of Black Americans offering opportunities as well as challenges within a racially segregated society. For nearly 100 years, Citrus County was made up of less than 7,000 people and a quarter to a third of them were Black. Currently, the Black population in Citrus County is just over 3 percent.

Mount Olive Missionary Baptist Church in Crystal River was founded on Oct. 4, 1884, recognized as the oldest Black church in Crystal River

buried in Crystal Memorial Gardens and the second oldest church in Citrus County. The church originally owned Crystal Memorial Gardens, a cemetery serving the community. The church deeded the cemetery to the community in 1976, and a community-based board of directors was established to operate it and is still in place today.

> Mrs. Annie M. McCray was born Jan. 22, 1922, in Crystal River to the late Ella and Reuben Jackson. She graduated high school from Howard Academy in Ocala because there was no Black high school in Citrus County. Her mother washed laundry for \$1

per basket to send her there. After high school, she worked for the Fermans (of Ferman Chevrolet) as a domestic.

McCray had her own home built when she was just 18, which was unheard of at that time. At the age of 22, she was awarded the Amos Lewis Scholarship which enabled her to attend and graduate from Florida A&M University in Tallahassee with a bachelor's degree in sociology, summa cum laude. She later earned a master's degree in education from Stetson University. After graduating, she returned to Crystal River and began teaching at George Washington Carver School, the local school for Blacks

during the times of segregation. She taught there until integration, where she worked at the newly integrated Crystal River Primary School from 1969-95.

McCray was a lifelong member of Mount Olive Missionary Baptist Church and was the clerk of the church for over 50 years. Because there was no written history of Black Americans in Citrus County, she produced and saved many funeral programs of people interred at Crystal Memorial Gardens Cemetery as an official record of their lives. When McCray died Jan. 31, 2010, her granddaughter, Andrea K. McCray took the reins and became the "keeper of the records."

The cemetery consists of two parcels of land which total over five acres. There are over 540 known gravesites and 20 of them are currently sunken. The oldest

Clarence Brooks (1916 – 2002) handcrafted several headstones in his shed for his family members. These headstones have a unique cement and pebble look and are hand-etched with names. At least two Civil War veterans were laid to rest in this cemetery, Wash Dock (1848 – 1928) and Charles Wayes (1836 – 1921).

In April 2023, a nonprofit organization, Friends of Crystal Gardens Inc., was created to preserve and maintain the cemetery. Andrea K. McCray is the president of that organization and is dedicated to educating the community about the people buried there.

"It all starts with the community. This cemetery is filled with peace, hope, grace, and love. I want the legacy to live forever." said McCray. Their mission is "to preserve, beautify, and advocate for the historic Crystal Memorial

terred there who were forgotten and ensure a peaceful resting place that memorializes the departed and honors their families in our community for generations to come."

There are volunteers that come out and clean the cemetery grounds. Mowing, trimming and general weeding are just a small part of the big picture. The cemetery has many challenges, including floodwater mitigation. Less than two years ago, Hurricane Idalia hit the community hard, and a body was lifted from its grave in the floodwaters. Those remains have been buried in another area of the cemetery that is better elevated.



The Friends of Crystal Memorial Gardens Cemetery Inc. is dedicated to restoring dignity and honor to those interred while providing a glimpse into the lives of early residents. They strive to preserve memories of the community and ensure the stories live on for generations. They are currently in the process of obtaining a Florida Historical Marker for the cemetery which will designate it as a historical cometery.

Beneath the soil: A tapestry of lives at Crystal Memorial Gardens Cemetery

Hidden down a narrow limerock road just outside the Crystal River city limits, Crystal Memorial Gardens Cemetery maintains a permanent spot in the community's history. This cemetery, once known as the Crystal River African American Memorial Gardens, is the final resting place of some notable members of the Black community, most of whom lived during a time of segregation - overcoming diversity to achieve the greater good.

EDUCATION:

Anna Copeland Russell

May 1, 1877 - March 4, 1970

Anna Copeland Russell was born to slave parents and began teaching in Marion County at the age of thirteen. She was committed to educating children in her community. She took a 3.5-mile horse and buggy ride to Crystal River and a six-mile walk, one way, almost daily to Rock Crusher to teach children in her care.

Russell's descendants are the deeply rooted Copelands of Crystal River. Her son, Frederick Copeland (deceased) has a public park in Crystal River named in his honor. Copeland's wife, Marjorie, was the first Black city council woman in the City of Crystal River. She was a descendant of the McKinnon family of Crystal River.

Annie M. Jackson McCray Jan. 20. 1922 – Jan. 31. 2010

Annie M. Jackson McCray graduated from Howard Academy in Ocala. Five years after high school, she received an

Amos Lewis Scholarship that paved her way to study at Florida A&M University in Tallahassee. She also earned a master's degree from Stetson University. She returned to Citrus County to teach at George Washington Carver School, the local

school for Black Americans during segregation. She was one of the first teachers to integrate public schools in Citrus County. She taught for 44 consecutive years. By the time she retired, it was said that she had taught a third of the children on the west side of the county.

William Levy Robinson Jr. March 4, 1933 - Jan. 1, 2022

William Levy Robinson, or Junior as he was affectionately called, was born in Webster. He attended All-Black Mills High



culture at Florida A&M University. His education was interrupted by a two-year tour of duty in the US Army from 1954 to 1956. Upon his discharge WILLIAM LEVY ROBINSON the service, he continued his col-

lege education and received his Bachelor of Science Degree from FAMU (Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University). Pursuing graduate studies at both FAMU and the University of Florida, he received his Master of Education Degree in administration and supervision.

Robinson held many administration and teaching positions throughout his career. He was principal of the Florida School for Boys, Okeechobee, 1958 – 1960; county extension agent for Jackson County, Marianna, 1960 - 1964; principal of George Washington Carver Junior High School, Crystal River, 1964 – 1969; county extension agent for Leon County, Tallahassee, 1969 - 1970; teacher of science and vocational agriculture at Citrus High School, Inverness, 1970 – 1971; supervisor of Instruction for Citrus County School Board, Inverness, 1971 – 1985; and director of personnel for the Citrus County School Board, 1985 – 1995.

Hazel Lee Balloon Sanders Dec. 9, 1933 - Aug. 1, 1989

Mrs. Hazel Balloon Sanders was part of

the Balloon family of Balloon Street off in the "Backwoods" community located Turkey Oak in Crystal River. Their homestead was part of "The Backwoods". She had three sons and a daughter. She was a schoolteacher at Inverness Primary School.

Euna Mable McKinnon Robinson

Nov. 16, 1933 - June 29, 2007

Euna Mable McKinnon Robinson received her public-school education in the Citrus County Schol System. After graduat-

ing high school in 1951, she attended Florida Agriculture and Mechanical College in Tallahassee and then transferred to Florida Normal and Industrial Memorial College in St. Augustine. Robinson's pro-

fessional career began in Marianna, where she was an adult education

teacher for the 1963 to 1964 school year. She returned to Crystal River and began a job as an elementary school teacher and primary school specialist. She retired from the Citrus County School System after 31 vears of service.

COMMUNITY:

Mary Gray Bunch

May 5, 1886 - Oct. 5, 1987

Mary Gray Bunch was known by the community as "Grandma Bunch" or "Mamma". She is the original cake lady in Crystal River. She baked and cooked her entire life and even taught her children to cook at the tender young age of three. She lived

behind Crystal River Primary in-the-areaof Turkey Oak Drive and West Balloon Lane. She married James Bunch and they started their family of 11 children. She left a rich legacy of 61 grandchildren, 157 great-grandchildren, 53 great-great-grandchildren, and three great-great-greatgrandchildren.

Beulah Brock Lockley March 17, 1895 - March 19, 1991

Beulah Brock Lockley was born in Valdosta, GA, to John and Mary Brock. She was married to Will Lockley in 1912 and out of this union sixteen children were born. She became the neighborhood babysitter for all the working mothers and was affectionately known as "Ma Chank".

Ten children, as well as her husband all preceded her in death. Later she went on to marry Handy Jackson. She left the legacy of one son, five daughters, 39 grandchildren, 56 great-grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren.

Mary and Jack Wims

Mary and Jack Wims came to Crystal River from Red Level in 1943. Jack worked many jobs including gathering

oysters, turpentine worker and a cedar mill worker, while Mary cleaned houses and shucked oysters. Jack learned the construction trade and in 1950 he built their first home, which still sits on the corner of NE Sixth Terrace and NE Eighth Avenue. Jack began

working for Florida Rock in Brooksville. He would haul rock to Crystal River to build Eighth Avenue, which was just a dirt path at the time. After leaving Florida Rock, he went back to construction, building more homes near his homestead. After building around 10 units, he suddenly died June 26, 1986, and Mary continued

Sylvester Wooden

April 25, 1891 - Dec. 20, 1975

Sylvester Wooden was born, one of five children, in Georgia to Wash and Alice Watson Wooden. When he was young. the family moved to Florida and took up residence in the Fairmount settlement (the area of Meadowcrest in Crystal River). He married Josephine Floyd and they had six children. After the passing of Josephine, he married Jessie Lee Ruth Wooden and they had one daughter, Wil-

He was a loyal husband and father and a pioneer citizen of Crystal River who loved and honored God by living at peace with his fellowman.

Jessie Lee Ruth Wooden June 24, 1905 - Dec. 24, 1991

Jessie Lee Ruth Wooden was married to



Sylvester Wooden and had one daughter. Willie Bea. She was the lunchroom cook at the George Washington Carver School for 16 years and drove a powder blue 1940s Studebaker. Every time she left, she would say

Oscar "O.H." Hopkins March 11, 1921 - April 23, 2004

Annie L. Sellers Smith

Aug. 4, 1889 - March 5, 1973

Annie L. Sellers Smith was born in Jasper and was the only child of Mr. And Mrs. Mose Sellers. In 1903 she married Chamble

Smith at Six Mile Still, near Dunnellon. They had 13 children and moved to Crystal River. For sixty years, she served as a midwife. and for the last 10 years of that, she was registered with the Florida State Board of Health. She left a rich legacy with grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and 12

cl great-great-grandchildren.

Gladys Henry Nixon April 6, 1913 – April 1, 1988

Gladys Henry Nixon, one of four children born to George F. Henry and Agnes Taylor Henry in Tampa. She attended Hillsborough Public School and Bethune Cookman College in Daytona Beach. She later established her residence in Crystal River. She worked several years as a domestic before training in practical nursing and receiving her nursing assistant certificate in Dade City. She was hired at the Citrus County Health Department and continued there until her retirement in 1984.

GOVERNMENT:

Claude Brooks Sr.

April 15, 1917 - Nov. 25, 1987

Claude Brooks Sr. was born in Citronelle, one of several children born to the union of John Marshall Brooks and Isabella Joyner

Brooks. He enlisted in the Army during World War II and shortly after he was dispatched overseas and promoted to corporal. After his tour, he returned to Crystal River and married Eva Mae Floyd in December 1945. They established a home and added 10 children to their family. He was employed by

the Citrus County School Board as a maintenance engineer. Brooks was the first Black elected to the City Council of Crystal River, where he gave 16 years of credible service.

William Wesley Skylark June 10, 1912 – July 13, 1999

William Wesley Skylark was one of four children born to the union of Mr. And Mrs. William Reston Skylark in Wilcox. He was

thirteen when his mother. Delia Adams established residence, along with her other children, in an area in Crystal River known as Old Mill Quarters. After serving in World War II, he returned home to Crystal River. Skylark went to a law enforcement training school in New York City. He decided to return

to Crystal River for police work, thinking it would be safer in the smaller city. He was the first black police officer on the Crystal River Police Department when he joined the force in 1965. On March 27, 1968, Deacon Skylark married Ms. Irene McKinnon.

Crystal Memorial Gardens Cemetery serves as a final resting place for momentous citizens who shaped the history of Crystal River and Citrus County. Their stories, some untold, offer insights into our history and inspire us to celebrate the impact they had on our community.




















Reviving sacred ground: Community efforts underway to restore Crystal Memorial Gardens Cemetery

At the heart of a people-powered movement lies the historic Crystal Memorial Gardens Cemetery, a sacred resting place, a living storybook of generations past, and now, the focus of a growing movement to preserve, protect, and honor its legacy.

Thanks to the leadership of Andrea Mc-Cray, President & CEO of Crystal Memorial Gardens Cemetery, and the nonprofit Friends of Crystal Memorial Gardens Cemetery, revitalization is well underway. The multi-phase project seeks not only to clean and care for the grounds but to restore dignity to those interred–especially the many whose graves have sunken or gone undocumented.

Phase I: Restoration with purpose

"Right now, we're focused on the basics: documentation, preservation, and planning," McCray explains. "There are no official records, so one of our first goals is to document all existing burials and create a detailed map." To date, over 540 gravesites have been identified across the two parcels of land totaling more than five acres, including 20 sunken graves. Probing and scanning official headstone cleaning project, using

work to determine the full scope of the site 2024. and the availability of usable space.

The cemetery faces serious environmental challenges. Flooding has caused crypts to shift, graves to sink, and, in some extreme cases, remains to rise from the ground.

McCray says the organization has not yet secured an engineer, but hopes to use potential state funding to hire one who can develop a plan to address the cemetery's ongoing flood issues. A \$350,000 appropriation request is currently under consideration in the 2025-2026 budget.

In addition, Phase I plans to install a Florida Historical Marker, seek National Historic Place designation, and launch an online directory housing names, dates, obituaries, and other archival information.

Young hands, lasting impact

Much of the progress has been made possible through community engagement, including the passion and energy of local youth. Crystal River High School's Interact and Key Clubs, along with Boy Scout Troop #457, have played a vital role in cleanups, documentation, and even the cemetery's first

"The students are instrumental," McCray says. "They've helped lead the way in how we honor those buried here-not just by cleaning and documenting, but by showing up, learning, and caring."

A legacy to uphold

Anyone interested in helping is encouraged to volunteer-no club membership or affiliation required. Community Clean Ups are held three to four times a year, and proceeds from the annual Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Leadership Gala, launched in January 2024, directly supports the cemetery's ongoing restoration. The first gala raised nearly \$10,000.

"People can donate their time, their energy, or their resources," McCray says. "This cemetery doesn't have a designated groundskeeper. It's cared for by the community, and that care is what keeps it sacred."

In recent years, Friends of Crystal River Memorial Gardens Cemetery has made significant strides: completing boundary and topographic surveys, developing a strategic maintenance plan, hosting visioning meetings, and offering Memorial Day Veterans'

of the burial grounds continues as volunteers an approved biological solution in October Remembrance Ceremonies in partnership with the Beverly Hills VFW.

The group also collaborated with the Citrus County Historical Society to help expand and preserve African American history within the region.

More than a cemetery

Defined by its age, unique architecture, and the notable individuals buried within, Crystal Memorial Gardens qualifies as a historic cemetery under state guidelines. But to McCray and the many volunteers by her side, it's much more than just a label.

"I am blessed and humble to share their stories of love, life, and the lessons that they can no longer share," McCray begins. "I am one of many that they left behind to carry the legacy forward, and that is an honor in its own right."

Through community effort, careful planning, and a deep sense of reverence, the revitalization of Crystal Memorial Gardens Cemetery is not just restoring a burial ground, it's ensuring that the lives buried beneath its soil are remembered, respected, and never erased.


