

During those years I worked for a CPA firm and then the Wichita Area Community Action Program. In August 1970 I has hired as an assistant to the Dean of Students at WSU and, in fact, became the director of their Vietnam Veterans Outreach Program. I did that until August of 1973. By this time I was deeply engrossed in human and civil rights, and fought for fellow Vietnam Veterans, and those who dropped out to Canada. I made a commitment to some veterans at Wounded Knee, SD and went there to help. The love of my life and my best friend ever, tired of "cityness" and we uprooted our five year old daughter to the sacred land of New Mexico. I worked various jobs and eventually transferred my CPA from Kansas to NM. I provided accounting and tax services to a rural community. With a Presidential scholarship, my daughter graduated from UNM. Later she earned her masters degree and became the principal at a rural Elementary/Middle school. Mi esposa passed on to greener pastures and I finally retired. I have a top notch union leader granddaughter (President of the NM Federation of Labor, AFL-CIO), and a caring daughter, to cherish.

At any rate, I do want Israelis not to suffer as well, and I think that those who dominate others suffer as well, but in a different way.


At any rate, I think I have said enough here. I look forward to meeting people and listening to some interesting people.

I moved to Anchorage and got into a fouryear Alaska Carpenters Apprenticeship Program. Most of that time I worked on the Trans-Alaska Pipeline. I worked for 10 years out of Local 1281 then got a job with the Municipality of Anchorage in Facility Maintenance where I worked as a carpenter. I met Judy online and we exchanged emails and phone calls until I flew down to visit her for a week. We vacationed in Cabo that winter, then spent a wonderful month in Buenos Aires, Argentina, with visits to Uruguay, Iguazu Falls, Salta, a road trip over the Andes at 13,000 feet, a gaucho ranch, and Mae de Plata on the Atlantic Ocean. Since I was still working, Judy rented out her house and drove up the Alcan Hwy – just her and her dog, Maggie. I could not fly down to help drive as a volcano had spewed ash and there were no flights out of Anchorage.
