Dear Parish Family of St. Richard of Chichester,

The Church began the new liturgical year with the celebration of Advent and now we have few days left before we celebrate Christmas, The Nativity of the Lord. I have been praying for you all daily and will continue to do so especially during the Church's celebration of Christmas.

Often times in our culture, the world often leaves out Jesus Christ in Christmas and substitutes a generic mish-mash of a "holiday season." Christmas literally means, "Christ coming" into the world, his Incarnation. Jesus is the reason for the season towards whom the whole world is drawn, not the tinsel and shopping. As Catholics, we of course are celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ.

In all of the hustle and bustle and worldly challenges of daily life, I encourage you to avail yourselves of God's grace during this grace-filled Christmas celebration of our Lord Jesus Christ's incarnation and birth, in whom we hope and find real joy for all of mankind since the Fall of Adam and Eve. "Our hope is in the name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth."

The following is an excerpt from the Catechism of the Catholic Church regarding the Church's celebration of Christmas (#525-256):

"525 Jesus was born in a humble stable, into a poor family. Simple shepherds were the first witnesses to this event. In this poverty heaven's glory was made manifest. The Church never tires of singing the glory of this night:

*The Virgin today brings into the world the Eternal
And the earth offers a cave to the Inaccessible.
The angels and shepherds praise him
And the magi advance with the star,
For you are born for us,
Little Child, God eternal!*

526 To become a child in relation to God is the condition for entering the kingdom. For this, we must humble ourselves and become little. Even more: to become "children of God" we must be "born from above" or "born of God." Only when Christ is formed in us will the mystery of Christmas be fulfilled in us.²⁰⁷ Christmas is the mystery of this "marvelous exchange":


O marvelous exchange! Man's Creator has become man, born of the Virgin. We have been made sharers in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share our humanity."

At the celebration of Christmas Masses for the Nativity of the Lord, we will once again be praying the Gloria at Mass after a brief pause during Advent, and we will join in the singing of the angels who gave glory to God at the time of Jesus' being born of the most Blessed Virgin Mary in Bethlehem:

*"Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to people of good will." (Lk 2:14)

I hope and pray that you and your families have a blessed, merry and happy Christmas! Please be safe and holy out there.
