Addiction Checklist

If you love someone who is using drugs or alcohol you may: ☐ Begin to doubt yourself and your own instincts ☐ Try to fix the situation and rescue the addict ☐ Get angry with and resent the addict for using ☐ Start to distrust the addict and feel you can't rely on them ☐ Feel taken for granted, unimportant, unloved and that your needs don't matter ☐ Feel that your loved one's using is causing problems in your marriage or relationship ☐ Hide the problem and keep secrets from family and friends ☐ Deny that your loved one is an addict/alcoholic ☐ Make excuses for the addict ☐ Lose interest in your own activities and isolate yourself ☐ Try to control the addict ☐ Worry about and lose sleep over the addict's using ☐ Blame yourself for the addict's using ☐ Allow the addict to manipulate you ☐ Start to have health issues of your own ☐ Become obsessed with getting the addict to stop using ☐ Tolerate more and more bad behaviour from the addict and possibly from yourself ☐ Do things that the addict should be doing for themselves ☐ Take over their household and financial responsibilities ☐ Become addicted to the addict and find you are unable to separate yourself from them If four or more of these apply to you then your loved one is most likely an addict. There is a solution. ☐ Get help: join a family support group like Al-Anon or Nar-Anon and/or get professional help (counselling) Encourage the addict to get help Educate yourself on addiction ☐ Set boundaries and enforce them ☐ Learn to detach from the addict ☐ Allow the addict to suffer the consequences of using ☐ Contact the police when necessary (violence, theft) ☐ Take care of yourself first, be kind to yourself, love yourself (exercise, eat well, sleep)
