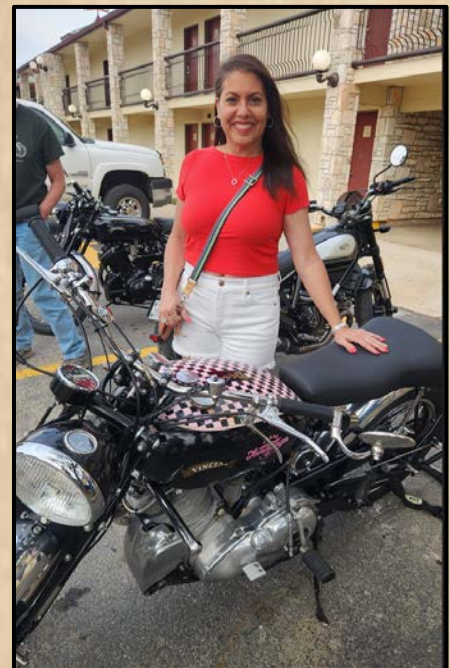

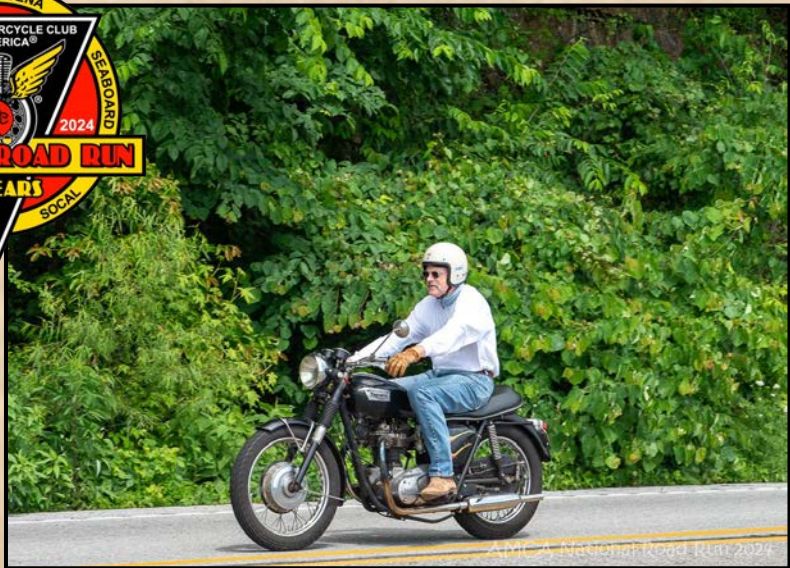

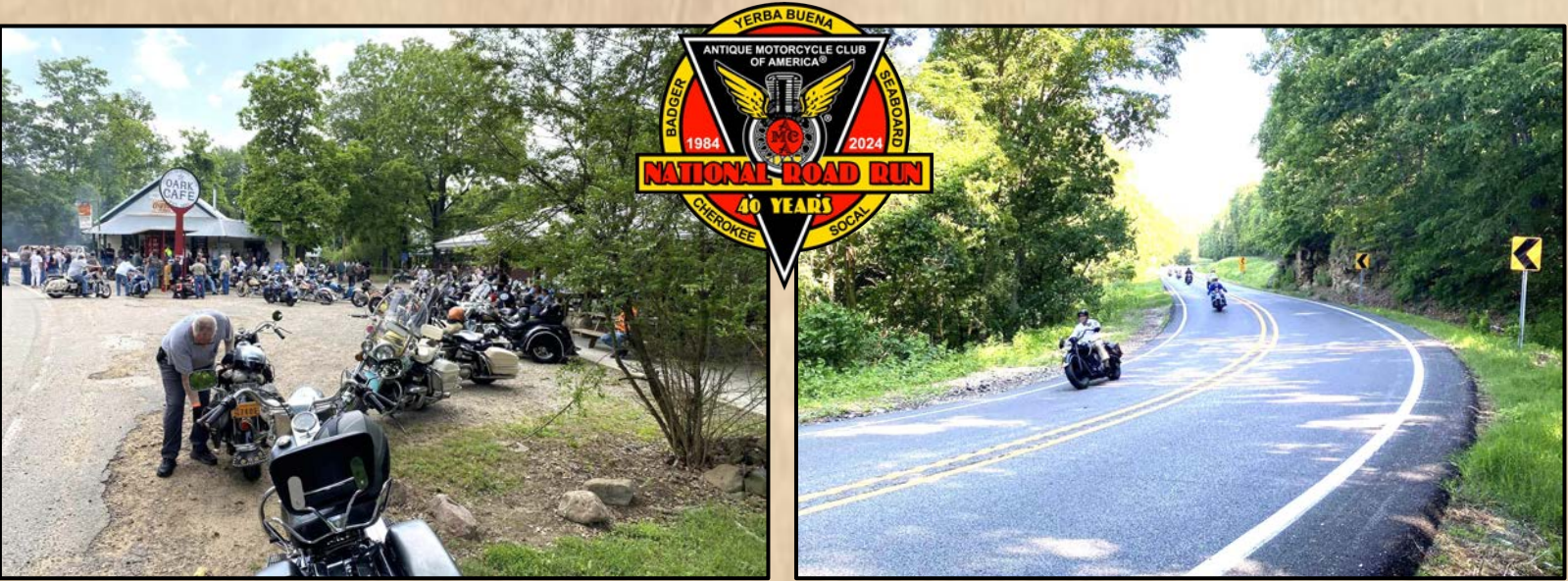

AMCA - Cherokee Chapter - 40th Anniversary Road Run Banquet

The culminating event of the epic AMCA 40th Anniversary Road Run hosted by the Cherokee Chapter was the Awards Banquet. Cherokee Vice-President Steve Klein served as emcee for the evening.

After a heartfelt Thank You to the staff of the Inn of the Ozarks for their outstanding hospitality, and an entertaining event featuring Linda, from the Inn of the Ozarks, Steve Klein, and lots of whipped cream, Steve introduced Keith Kizer, the Executive Director of the AMCA.

Keith announced that, out of 89 U.S. AMCA chapters and 120 chapters Worldwide, 31 chapters of the AMCA participated in the Road Run, including 57 Cherokee Chapter members, 32 members of the neighboring Sunflower Chapter, and 29 members representing the Badger Heritage Chapter. Four AMCA Board Members attended the road run, Jim Graultry, Greg McFarland, Joe Preston, and Don Dzurick. Current and past chapter presidents were also recognized, while everyone else in attendance was encouraged to “step up” as a leader in their chapters.

A very special presentation by Jerry Ottaway, Sunflower Chapter Member, was thoroughly enjoyed by all. Jerry participated in the very first U.S. AMCA Road Run in 1984, named the American DJ Rally, from Denver to Grand Junction, Colorado. What made this accomplishment even more special, was that four bikes that participated in this first Road Run were also ridden in this 40th Anniversary event, a 1945 Indian Super Six, 1929 Cleveland Four, 1930 Henderson, and a 1928 Harley Davidson.

Ottaway, a youthful 87 year old from Kansas, entertained the crowd with tales from the first run 40 years ago, beginning with the hotel sprinklers going off the first night. There were 32 motorcycles on the run, with the biggest mechanical issues credited to magneto trouble.

Jerry Ottaway, contd...

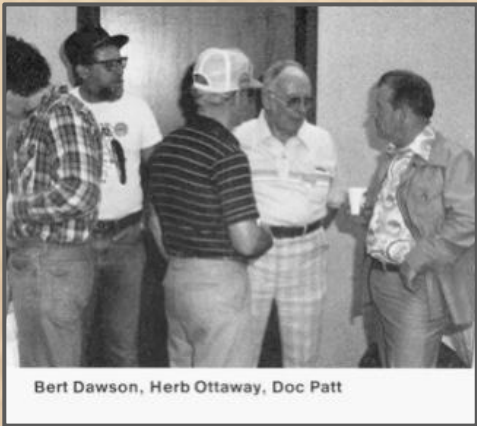
The first day of the ride was a chilly 42°F with rain on the 75 mile trek from Denver to Copper Mountain, via Loveland Pass. About 10 bikes broke down along the way, and there was a flat tire on a clincher rim that had many giving advice on how to fix it - finally Herb Ottaway, Jerry's dad, changed the tire while everyone else "supervised".

Day two was a 175 mile ride under clear skies to Grand Junction, Colorado. Jerry pointed out that there were no tow vehicles following the riders. A special memory from the first Road Run was custom pewter belt buckles created by jeweler Charles Lamoreaux, that featured an engraved map of the ride.

Following a tremendous round of applause for Jerry, Keith Kizer mentioned that there were 3 generations of the Ottaway family on the inaugural ride, Jerry's father Herb, Jerry, and Jerry's son Scott. The next lunch will be June 15th at 11:00. -Larry Martin

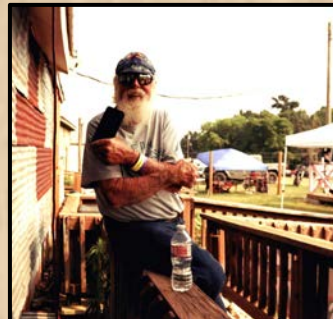


SAVE THE DATE FOR FANDANGO 2025 - APRIL 4 - 6TH
