
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The HBPOA has had a great year thanks to its membership. On our second year offering educational scholarships, we raised the bar from \$1000 to \$3000 – thank you all who purchased our Hernando Beach Life Calendars and contributed photos. The entire Hernando Beach Communi-

ty demonstrated a giving heart contributing to the Joe Wachs Memorial Christmas Light Fund with \$3907 in donations to refurbish the lights on Shoal Line Blvd. Our expenses were \$4329.92 with the difference of \$499.92 which will be covered by the Association.

The HBPOA working with the Board of County Commissioners and County Roads and Parks has transitioned the legal standing and heavy maintenance of the two iconic Hernando Beach Landmarks – the Dolphin Fountain and Triangle Park to an Adopt-a-Park status. The county will assume all legal responsibilities and the utilities expenses. The Association will support the Adopt-a-Park program offering membership the opportunity to work on the landscaping keeping the parks looking good for the community and a memorable welcome for our visitors and guests.

I attended the Hernando County Board of County Commissioners meeting on December 12th with our outgoing Government Affairs Committee Chair Charles Greenwell. I saw a number of other HBPOA members in attendance also. The agenda item which drew the crowd was a developers attempt to justify changing the Hernando County 2040 Comprehensive Plan. As Commissioner Brian Hawkins said – "this is our constitution when it comes to land management" (sic) We do not change it easily.

Bottom line: the developers attempt to change "agricultural" zoned land to "heavy commercial — C4" to put in an automobile paint and collision repair on Osowaw Blvd. was denied by all five Commissioners. The developer failed to provide a "justification" to make such a radical jump in zoning, changing the "Plan" and the placement of a heavy industrial business in proximity to homes, a school and a church — can you say "incongruent?" There were lots of smart people researching and reviewing the information helping to guide the decision makers in the right direction — the Hernando Beach Community and Forrest Glenn Community rose to the challenge. Thank you, Chuck, for your diligence and service to the community.

This month our guest speaker is Hernando County Commissioner Jerry Campbell. He'll perform the swearing in for our new Board.



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


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
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FL ARBOR DAY TREE WALK

PRESERVING THE FUTURE OF FLORIDA FISHERIES



The Florida Friendly Fishing Guide Certification Program, established by UF/IFAS, Florida Sea Grant and the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, recognizes fishing guides who are committed to

preserving the future of Florida's fisheries through sustainable boating and fishing techniques.

This online certification course covers science-based techniques that ensure minimal environmental footprint of fishing. Participation in the Florida Friendly Fishing Guide program is voluntary, and the program involves no regulatory component. The course can be accessed via computer or smart phone and tablet. The course takes approximately four hours to complete and can be taken at your own pace in 20- to 30-minute chunks.

The certification is valid for three years. The \$130 fee covers gear for the welcome packages for certified guides, program upkeep and evaluation, and administrative expenses such as web hosting. Once you complete the course, you can display your certification on your website and vessel, letting your customers know that you adhere to the highest environmental standards.

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
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
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Appearance:

Also known as convict fish.

- Body has lightly colored background with vertical black bars on sides.
- Prominent teeth, including incisors, molars and rounded grinders
- No barbels on lower jaw
- Dorsal and Anal fins with strong sharp spines

Similar Species: Black Drum, *P.cromis* (has chin barbels and lacks incisor-like teeth); and Atlantic spadefish, *C. faber* (lacks incisor-like teeth)

Size: Up to 36 inches; common to 13 inches

Behavior:

Fractional spawners (they only lay a portion of their eggs at a time) in inshore waters, typically in March and April. They are omnivorous feeding mostly on crustaceans and small fish.

Additional Information:

State Record: 15 lb 2 oz, caught near Homosassa.

Fishing Tips and Facts:

Use live shrimp, sand fleas or fiddler crabs on a small hook fished on the bottom. When cleaning, beware of the sharp gill covers.

Regulations Gulf and Atlantic State Waters

Minimum Size Limit: 12" total length

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

Oysters and barnacles are very, very different For more information visit: MyFWC.com when it comes to regulations.

Oysters have closed seasons, bag limits and can only be legally harvested in specific shellfish harvesting areas that are classified as "approved" or "conditionally approved" and in the "open" status. The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services Division of Aquaculture manages these shellfish harvesting areas.

Barnacles on the other hand do not have size limits or specified bag limits, which mean that you can harvest up to 100 pounds per person per day with a recreational saltwater fishing license and you can use them to chum sheepshead. You Legal Gear: hook and line, cast net, seine, can also simply scrape the off bridge piles and allow them to sink and attract sheepshead. Do not scrape barnacles from private docks or other Illegal Gear: Harvest prohibited by or with private structures with permission of the property

Total Length is measured from the most forward point of the head, with the mouth closed, to Can oysters and barnacles be used as bait or the farthest tip of the tail with the tail compressed or squeezed, while the fish is lying on its side.

BOATING SAFETY EDUCATION IDENTIFICATION CARD

Anyone born on or after Jan. 1, 1988, who will be operating a boat in Florida waters with an engine of ten (10) horsepower or more is required to complete an approved boating safety course and obtain a Florida Boating Safety Education ID Card. This card, which does not expire, certifies the person named on the card has successfully completed the required boating safety education course. Note: This card is not a boating license.
