




The 1900's were not kind to Sloan's Lake and the surrounding park. Rapid development, lack of water quality regulations, watershed misuse, shotgun lead and unfiltered runoff from the surrounding communities has led to shallow waters and stagnation. From its original healthy depth of around 10', Sloan's Lake has filled in; the average dept of the lake today is 3.3'. Further, much of the silt and sediment in the bottom of the lake contains dangerous lead. While the City of Denver and the Parks & Recreation Department has put in hard work to slow the issues, there is still work to do. Today, 23 storm drains and a ditch on the southwest corner remain unfiltered.

The hope is for the community to be able to swim and fish in Sloan's Lake.
