For myself and my heirs, personal representatives, or assigns, from the date of this release and waiver agreement, and forever hereafter, I hold the said owners and ORR FARM RESCUE & SANCTUARY, harmless and blameless for any injury to myself, including death, occasioned by my participation in, or presence at, any activities, whether resulting by or through the negligence of the owners, or ORR FARM RESCUE & SANCTUARY, their agents, officers, volunteers, or employees. Should I, my heirs, personal representatives, and/or my heirs' legal representatives and/or assigns take action, I hereby agree to pay all costs of such action, including attorney's fees and court costs incurred by them. I hereby agree to waive my rights of privacy or publicity with the regard to ORR FARM RESCUE & SANCTUARY, INC (and those acting under their authority), copyrighting, distributing, televising, publishing, and using in any way the audio and visual portions of any film and photographs of me or of interviews, scenes, or other sequences in which I may be included, and any reproduction thereof, anywhere at any time through any media for advertising, promotion, trade, television programming, or other lawful purpose whatsoever, and I shall not be entitled to receive any royalties or other compensation with such use. Rules and Regulations

In order to participate in events, fundraisers, or volunteering, participants must read and initial each rule. By initialing, you agree to follow the rule.

General

- Participants must follow the rules of ORR and the instructions from ORR FARM RESCUE & SANCTUARY, INC. staff before, during, and after the ride, fundraiser, or event and/or during volunteering hours. Initials
- Minors must be accompanied by an adult at all times while participating in any events (special or otherwise), fundraisers, visiting, and volunteering at the Sanctuary. Initials _____
- Participants must act responsibly around all animals at the Sanctuary (see Appendix), with the full understanding that said animals are large, unpredictable, and potentially dangerous. Participants will not ride or act in an unsafe or reckless manner that may cause or contribute to the injury of anyone. Initials
- 4. Participants agree to assume all risks, financial, physical, and otherwise (see Waiver of Liability Agreement: Specifics). Initials
- 5. Participants agree to stay behind any tape, which indicates areas off-limits to visitors. Initials _____
- 6. Littering of any kind is prohibited. Pack it in, pack it out. Do not burn or bury trash. Disperse manure piles away from camp daily. Deposit solid human waste in cat holes by digging them 6-8 inches deep at least 200 feet from water sources, camps, and trails. When breaking camp, visually sweep the entire area for any items left. Retrieve and remove any temporary trail markers you have placed. Initials
- Smoking is prohibited on the trails (vaping is allowed). Smoking is tolerated in other areas of the property, however, smokers must dispose of cigarette butts properly. Littering, including cigarettes butts, is absolutely prohibited. Initials _____

- 8. Alcohol is prohibited unless approved by a director. Glass is always prohibited. Initials _____
- 9. Participants are not allowed in the cabin/resident home on the property, on the trails, or anywhere on the property at ORR FARM RESCUE & SANCTUARY, INC. without permission from the owners. All participants must sign the wavier and rules, pay the membership or event fee, or be subject to removal from the property. Initials
- Close each and every gate at you enter or exit a stall or pasture. This can be a life-or death situation. Participants must have permission to enter an animal's habitat or enclosure. Initials _____
- 11. Only feed animals snacks or treats approved by the director. Initials _____
- Participants must read about the specific behaviors of our animals in the Appendix and follow all precautions suggested. Initials

Personal Animals

- 13. Dogs must be leashed unless on the dog trails, when dogs must respond well to free dog recall/heeling with voice commands, hand signals, and/or electronic collars. Dogs are not allowed at fundraisers or events without permission from a director. Initials _____
- 14. If your horse is prone to kick, tie a red ribbon to its tail. Initials _____
- 15. Know the range of your ability to manage, care for, and control your particular horse. Always act within the limits of your ability to maintain reasonable control of your horse or one borrowed from ORR FARM RESCUE & SANCTUARY, INC. Initials _____
- 16. Stallions are prohibited without express permission from the director. Initials _____
- Drinking areas for horses and dogs are provided. Participants are responsible for keeping their animals hydrated. Initials _____

On the Trails/Riding and Camping

- Campfires must be confined to a pit provided by participants. Use only downed limbs smaller than one's wrist. Participants should bring their own firewood. Initials _____
- Stay on the trails. Respect wildlife by storing food and trash in secured containers. If your presence affects wildlife behavior, you're too close. Initials _____
- 20. Do not pass the trail master on guided trails. Initials
- Protect the trails. Tie horses with a tree saver if you have one. Fill in areas pawed by horses to help regrowth. Initials

Positivity

- 22. Remain positive and bring good energy to the Sanctuary. Be considerate of others and maintain a calm composure. When encountering other trail riders, greet them and ask to move to the safest side of the trail. Be polite. This rule is strictly enforced, and excessive negativity can result in being asked to leave the property. Initials
- 23. Respect all animals at the Sanctuary. We have a zero-tolerance policy toward chasing, yelling at, teasing, or acting aggressively toward any animal on the farm. Pursuing an animal that is walking away from you is considered chasing. Initials _____
- 24. Destructive drama toward animals, humans, property, or the general ambiance of ORR FARMS RESCUE AND SANCTUARY, INC. will not be tolerated. Initials _____

APPENDIX

Understanding the Behavior of Our Animals,

from our Director, Chanoah Orr

The animals here at the ORR FARM RESCUE & SANCTUARY, INC. are turned over or rescued from various circumstances. They may be afraid of you. They may be curious about you. Below I will outline the best ways for you to approach animals so that you have a safe and enjoyable experience here.

ALL ANIMALS

- Despite domestication and taming, all animals have a wild soul. Even the gentlest animal can hurt a person, intentionally or not.
- Be mindful of anything that might startle an animal, or make it perceive you as a threat.
- Wear sturdy shoes (hiking or cowboy boots if possible) and jeans around the animals.
- Some animal work requires work or garden gloves.
- If you have any questions about the animals at the Sanctuary, PLEASE ASK! We are here to educate.

HORSES

- Horses are very large, weighing between 1000-2000 pounds. Always keep track of where you are in relation to them. It's your responsibility, not the horse's, to be mindful of their size!
- Be aware of your feet! Wear substantial shoes or boots.
- Some horses kick. Stay at least six feet from their hind quarters if possible. If there's not enough room, put your hand on their rump to let them know you are there and walk close to them.
- Never run or jump behind a horse.
- Don't make loud noises around horses, like yelling, screaming, or popping balloons. This could startle them and you could get run over by a flighty horse.
- Don't put your face near or on theirs (no nose kisses, sorry). If they were to raise their head quickly, it could break your nose.
- Keep your hand flat when offering treats.
- Know that horses and other animals have a "flight zone," or a personal space surrounding them where they feel safe and comfortable. If you come within that zone, the animal will move. Respect their flight zone.
- Horses reflect the energy you bring. They appreciate a calm, gentle, loving presence.

COWS

- Cows and bulls can weigh over a ton. While cute, they can be extremely dangerous! Being knocked down or run over by a large animal can result in bruises, broken bones, or death.
- All bulls, beef and dairy, can be territorial and may attack if you disrupt them when they are breeding.
- Bulls can never be trusted. Use extreme caution around bulls. Always know where the bull is when out feeding the herd.
- Cows with newborn calves can be aggressive. Never turn your back on them. A bawling calf can trigger a hostile reaction from a mama cow. If going into the pasture to ear tag or check on baby calves, take someone with you for assistance if possible.
- Do not walk between a mother cow and her calf.
- Cows are unable to see directly behind themselves and are easily startled. To avoid startling, speak gently to them; do not yell or scream.
- Never beat your cattle with sticks, clubs, canes, etc... NEVER EVER run or chase them.
- Do not rub their foreheads. This will trigger them to ram you.
- Always plan an escape route in case you run into trouble.
- Always respect a cow's flight zone.
- Never mistreat cattle! If you see another volunteer beating, hurting, or disrespecting an animal, take remedial action. Alert the director at once.

GOATS

- Goats can be incredibly affectionate, curious, and playful beings, but there are times when they prefer to be left alone. Even the most docile goat in our sanctuary might decide they need some alone time. It's critical to recognize the signs before caution turns to agitation, or worse.
- Even on a peaceful sanctuary pasture, frightened or upset goats can easily cause injuries to well-meaning caregivers and visitors.
- A goat will use many different tactics, typically in combination, to let you know they don't want you around. These signs include:
 - Walking away as you approach
 - Loud vocalizations as you approach
 - Lightly to moderately pawing at the ground or stomping
 - Arching their body and raising their hackles
 - Full body trembling or shaking
- If a goat tells you their discomfort through these signals, you should immediately demonstrate that you mean no harm by backing away slowly from them.
- If the goat does not feel you've alleviated its discomfort, it will escalate its body language. Signs include:
 - Stomping aggressively at the ground
 - Holding their head up high, tipped slightly toward you

- Getting into your personal space while maintaining a confrontational attitude
- Blocking your path by cutting you off and turning sideways
- Rearing up at you
- "Hooking" you into a corner or wall with their horns
- Attempting to bite, headbutt, or horn you
- While most goats are not in the position of causing serious injury to humans, larger breed goats and those with horns may do some harm if they feel like they have to avoid danger.
- Just like horses and cows, goats have a flight zone. Different goats have different flight zones. This depends on many factors, especially the level of trauma in their backgrounds. Recognize and respect their flight zone.
- If you breach a goat's flight zone, they might bolt, or display signs of fear or agitation.
- Do not get cornered! If you are cornered or in a tight space with a large or horned goat who is frightened, they might become confrontational with behavior such as chasing, cornering, biting, kicking, problematic mounting, or other actions that may cause mental or physical discomfort or injury to another individual.
- They may try to block another individual's access to food, water, shelter, or other resident.
- Goats may panic and try to get away by any means necessary. Always have an escape route for you and the goat. Take your time approaching the goat to gauge how they react as you draw near.
- Loud noises can spook, agitate, and trigger flight and charge responses in wary goats. Try to be cautious with your volume around goats, and keep talkative dogs away from them. Do not yell at goats.

ROOSTERS

- By understanding rooster behavior and implementing protective measures, it is possible to enjoy the company of these beautiful birds.
- Roosters are territorial creatures and often perceive humans as a threat.
- Rooster attacks can be prevented by avoiding their territory, establishing dominance, building physical barriers, and making loud noises to scare them away.
- Preventing rooster attacks is vital for your safety and for those around you.
- Following are tips to prevent rooster attacks:
 - Avoid entering the rooster's territory; roosters perceive humans as a threat when they enter their space. This is especially important during breeding season and at night when they are more active.
 - If you can't avoid entering the rooster's space, consider installing physical barriers such as fencing or screens to separate yourself from the rooster, especially if you have children or visitors. Consider carrying a broom or stick.
 - Establish dominance over the rooster. They respond well to confident behavior and clear boundaries. Use a strong yet gentle approach when interacting with them.

- Roosters are intimidated by loud noises. If threatened by a rooster, clap your hands and make loud noises to scare it away from you.
- In the event of a rooster attack, it's crucial to remain calm; do not show fear. Roosters are incredibly perceptive of your emotions.
- During an attack, slowly move away from the rooster, using a broom, stick, or other object to keep them at bay.
- Protect your eyes, face, and other sensitive areas of the body, and seek medical attention if necessary, afterward.
- Roosters can cause significant injury with their sharp claws and beaks. It is essential to follow these precautions around them.

DOGS

- Most of our dogs are nice.
- Beware of the little dogs; they may nip if startled.
- Dogs may bark and jump on you. Do not encourage this.
- If they jump on you, say, "OFF!" and bring your knee to your chest to block them. Then have them sit and pet them on their chest.
- Children should be supervised, and never put little fingers or hands near dogs' mouths.
- DO NOT ALLOW DOGS TO ESCAPE FROM ANY ENCLOSURES! Use cation to ensure they do not run past you through gates.
- Some of the rescue dogs can be aggressive due to being timid, or from being in previous abuse situations. Always use precautions around rescue dogs.
- If you have any questions about the dogs, ask the director.
