At 9:02 a.m., Chairman Bennett called the meeting to order in the Union County Commissioner's Office, located in the Union County Courthouse. The pledge of allegiance was recited.

Commissioner Vincent moved to approve the agenda and the regular meeting minutes of December 10, 2019. Commissioner Kiesling seconded. There was no further discussion. Vote: All YES. Motion carried. The minutes were signed.

HOSPITAL REPORT

Tammie Stump, CEO, distributed copies of the "County Commissioner Monthly Hospital Report, Union County General Hospital, Tammie Stump, CEO, January 14, 2020", attached as an exhibit (three pages). Stump reported on the following (but not limited to the following): Provider Recruitment Update - Dentist; Des Moines Clinic; Business Office/Revenue Cycle Update; Financial Assistance Update; Radiology Report; Plant Services; Therapy Services; Laboratory Services; Union County Health Center; and IT. Lastly, Stump spoke about pre-filed legislation including HB68 Patient Safe Staffing Act and medical malpractice.

The following request and reports were contained in the meeting packet: Request from the Union County General Hospital for Mill Levy/GRT, dated 01-03-2020; Union County Consolidated, Consolidated Operations Review, for the Period Ending November 30, 2019" (thirteen pages).

Melissa Prante, CFO, reported on the following (but not limited to the following): consolidated Patient Volumes and Utilization Statistics and Operating Performances.

DISCUSSION /POSSIBLE ACTION ITEMS

RESOLUTION #2020-26 CHECKING ACCOUNT DEPOSITORY

A proposed resolution designating the County checking account depository was reviewed. The Farmers and Stockmens Bank and FNB of New Mexico shall be named as the checking account depository banks for Union County for the calendar year 2020.

RESOLUTION #2020-27 SHORT TERM INVESTMENT

A proposed resolution establishing the Union County Investment Policy by the Union County Board of Finance (Board of County Commissioners) together with an attached policy was reviewed.

RESOLUTION #2020-28 BOARD OF FINANCE

A proposed resolution authorizing officers or their successors to order the deposit or withdrawal of monies in the local short-term investment fund was reviewed.

RESOLUTION #2020-29 QUALIFIED DESPOSITORIES INTEREST BEARING DEPOSITS

A proposed resolution listing qualified depositories and rules regarding the distribution of County interest bearing accounts was reviewed.

RESOLUTION #2020-30 FY 2021 DWI APPLICATION

A proposed resolution authorizing the County to submit an application to the Department of Finance and Administration, Local Government Division to participate in the local DWI Grant and Distribution Program was reviewed.

RESOLUTION #2020-31 OPEN MEETINGS ACT

A proposed special resolution to conclude and determine in what manner reasonable notice shall be given to the public relative to the formulation of public policy, discussion of public business, or when formal action is taken by the Board of County Commissioners of Union County, New Mexico, or any of its agencies authorities, commissions, committees, or other policy-making bodies was reviewed.

On January 8th, Notice was published in the Union County Leader, which included the agenda availability as well as meeting dates for the calendar year 2020.

Commissioner Vincent moved to approve and mass adopt Resolution(s) #2020-26 Checking Account Depository, #2020-27 Short Term Investment, #2020-28 Board of Finance, #2020-29 Qualified Depositories Interest Bearing Deposits, #2020-30 FY 2021 DWI Application and #2020-31 Open Meetings Act. Commissioner Kiesling seconded. Discussion: There were a few minor typographical errors (dates) in #2020-26 and #2020-27. Commissioner Vincent moved to amend his motion to include approving the resolution with corrections made to the typographical errors. Commissioner Kiesling seconded. There was no further discussion. Vote: All YES. Motion carried. Resolutions signed.

RESOLUTION #2020-32 REPEAL OF THE STATE TAX ON SOCIAL SECUTIY BENEFITS

A proposed resolution requesting the Honorable Governor Lujan Grisham and the New Mexico State Legislature repeal the State Tax on Social Security Benefits for New Mexico Seniors was reviewed and discussed.

Commissioner Vincent moved to approve Resolution #2020-32 Repeal of the State Tax on Social Security Benefits. Commissioner Kiesling seconded. Discussion: Chairman Bennett offered a friendly amendment and suggested that the last paragraph reflect "BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution be delivered and presented to the Honorable Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham and to the New Mexico State Legislators" and

striking the last part of the sentence "representing Union County and the New Mexico Counties". Commissioners Vincent and Kiesling agreed. Vote: All YES. Motion carried. Resolution signed.

RESOLUTION #2020-33 POSTPONEMENT OF PRIVATE PRISON LEGISLATION

A proposed resolution requesting that the Honorable Governor Michelle Lujan Grisham postpone consideration of private prison legislation by refraining from placing any such legislation on the 2020 Legislative Session Call was reviewed and discussed.

Commissioner Kiesling moved to approve Resolution #2020-33 Postponement of Private Prison Legislation. Commissioner Vincent seconded. There was no further discussion. Vote: All YES. Motion carried. Resolution signed.

DWI PREVENTION SPECIALIST WITH COLFAX COUNTY

A copy of the Colfax & Union Counties DWI Prevention Specialist job description was reviewed. Mgr. Gonzales reported on the specifics of the job description and specifically reported that this position would be a Colfax County part time employee (20 hours weekly with the potential for full time employment), and would partially be funded through Union County's DWI grant. Discussion followed. Chairman Bennett signed on behalf of Union County under the document approval.

DISCUSSION OF ECHO CANYON ROAD CLOSURE

Commissioner Vincent asked that this item be on the agenda. Vincent reminded attendees that pursuant to the closure of Echo Canyon Road, Vincent understood the following: Mr. Steinle would honor the ability of his neighbors, who had been crossing the property before Steinle acquired the property. Those neighbors would still have the right of ingress and egress; sometime after that, Steinle changed his mind and the matter was taken care of in the local District Court. A jury found in favor of Steinle, and the Court declared that the Benefields no longer had easement right through Steinle's property.

It was Commissioner Vincent's opinion that the Court set a bad precedent, and that this example should caution future County Commissioners on road closures. Vincent stated that he would have never agreed to close Echo Canyon Road had he known that this would be the end result. Vincent also stated that he felt that he was lied to by Lee Steinle. Discussion followed.

Road Superintendent Kear suggested that for future instances of requested road closures, before the County considers closing a road and has knowledge that individuals who have had egress through a property, that there be a written agreement between the parties and that the agreement be filed and made of record.

JAIL AGREEMENT WITH NEIGHBORING COUNTIES

Sheriff Lobb reported that there were no new jail agreements for presentation. However, Lobb is currently negotiating and working with Taos County on his request as well as agreement. The fee would be \$100 per day for both male and female detainees. The proposed jail agreement will be presented during a future regular meeting. Roosevelt County still remains the best option financially. The distance, however, is a burden. Brief discussion followed.

LOCAL JAIL UPDATE

Sheriff Lobb reported that he maintains communication with the Town of Clayton's Chief of Police, Scott Julian. As of today, there was nothing new to report on except that all options are still being considered with

regards to the local State operated prison facility. As for the temporary holding facility belonging to the Town of Clayton (TOC), Lobb reported that the TOC is waiting on the County to decide if the County will be utilizing the temporary holding facility. Lobb reported that he advised Julian that the County's insurance would not likely be agreeable with this option, but would consult with the Board once again for a determination. County Attorney Stephen Ross indicated that he spoke with Grace Phillips of New Mexico Counties, and advised that insurance would not cover this option. If the Town's insurance is agreeable to covering the temporary holding cells with County detainees, what would be the County's portion of the insurance bill be?

Lobb reported that he and Chief Julian have attempted numerous times to make contact with CoreCivic, a national correctional facility operation, with no luck.

At 10:00 a.m., the meeting recessed for a short break. At 10:20 a.m., the meeting resumed.

CITIZEN'S FORUM

There were no visitors present during the forum.

APPROVAL OF BILLS

The Board reviewed and discussed bills in the amount of \$123,653.38 together with the Union County General Hospital Mill Levy Request signed by Judith Cooper, President of the Union County General Hospital Board signed on 01-03-2020 in the amount of \$199,898.70 for a total amount considered of \$323,552.08.

Commissioner Vincent moved to approve the payment of bills and Mill Levy request in the amount of \$323,552.08. Commissioner Kiesling seconded. There was no further discussion. Vote: All YES. Motion carried.

ROAD CROSSING PERMITS

Permit No. 359 with an attached map submitted by Permittee, NMSU, allows Permittee to lay pipe or cable for the purpose of replacing a 2" gas line to the NMSU Livestock Research Center, was reviewed and discussed.

Commissioner Vincent moved to approve road crossing Permit No. 359. Commissioner Kiesling seconded. There was no further discussion. Vote: All YES. Motion carried. The permit was signed.

INVENTORY ITEMS DISPOSITION - ROAD DEPARTMENT INTERNATIONAL WATER TRUCK Sheriff Lobb reminded the Board that Ronan, the drug detection K9, will be sold to Dumas Police Department. Lobb reported that the police truck that is outfitted with all K9 accessories will also be sold to the Dumas PD for \$30,000.00.

Commissioner Vincent moved to approve the sale of the K9 (Ronan) and the K9 vehicle (2017 Dodge Ram/Pickup VIN #1C6RR7XT3HS818884) to the Dumas Police Department. Commissioner Kiesling seconded. Discussion: Chairman Bennett asked Mgr. Gonzales how the transaction/bid was to be handled. Gonzales advised that the transaction was from one government to another government and that the vehicle had fully depreciated (the Department of Finance Administration's vehicle thresh hold was \$5,000.00). There was no further discussion. Vote: All YES. Motion carried. The Equipment Auction List was signed by the Board.

HEALTH CARE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM - Approval of Claims

There were no claims presented for consideration.

COUNTY TRAVEL REQUESTS

The following employees reported/requested travel approval: Chairman Bennett, Commissioner Vincent, and Commissioner Kiesling, Clerk Harkins, Chief Deputy Clerk Brenda Green, Assessor Louis Trujillo, Deputy Assessor Hollie Cruz, Administrative Assistant Cheryl Garcia, Treasurer Brandy Thompson, and Sheriff Lobb will be attending the New Mexico Counties Legislative Conference in Santa Fe during the week of January 19th. Kiesling, Cruz and Green will also be attending NMSU Edge Classes throughout the week; Clerk Harkins and Deputy Clerk Brenda Green will have an extended stay during the conference week so that they can attend a SERVIS Change Control Meeting on the 23rd and 24th; Chairman Bennett and Commissioner Vincent and Commissioner Kiesling will also be traveling to Sedan and Clayton on January 29th to attend the Comprehensive Plan meetings 3:00 pm - 8:00 p.m.; Chairman Bennett, Commissioner Vincent and Commissioner Kiesling, Clerk Harkins, Chief Deputy Clerk Brenda Green, Deputy Assessor Hollie Cruz, Administrative Assistant Cheryl Garcia, Treasurer Brandy Thompson and Deputy Treasurer Shea Arnett will attend the County's Legislative Luncheon on February 3rd. Commissioner Kiesling may stay and attend the Legislative Reception during the evening of February 3rd. Clerk Harkins and Chief Deputy Clerk Green will be traveling to Albuquerque to attend the 2020 Probate Court Conference February 5th thru the 7th. The County Manager will advertise Notice that the Board will be in attendance of the New Mexico Counties Legislative Conference, the Comprehensive Plan Meetings and the Clayton/Union County Legislative Luncheon. All travel approved.

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN UPDATE

The "Draft" Comprehensive Plan has been uploaded to the County's web-site. Commissioner Kiesling reported that he has begun reviewing the draft plan. Pursuant to communications between Jackie Fishman of Consensus Planning and Kiesling, Kiesling reported that any suggestions or comments regarding the draft can be made, and will be received by during the upcoming Comprehensive Plan public meetings in Sedan at the Fire Station on January 29th from 3:00 to 4:30 p.m. and in Clayton at the Civic Center from 6:30 to 8:00 p.m.

KISER BUILDING UPDATE

Treasurer Thompson gave a project/building update which included (but was not limited to the following): moving the ramp from the East side to the Northside of the building, office/exterior lighting, ceiling fans, Clerk's Office needs an additional emergency exit with either an additional door or window. Lastly, a discussion was had about funding the project.

Executive Session:

i. County Manager

At 10:50 a.m., Commissioner Vincent moved to go into closed session pursuant to NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 (H) (2) pertaining to limited personnel matters. Commissioner Kiesling seconded. There was no further discussion. Vote: Vincent - YES, Kiesling - YES and Bennett - YES. Motion carried.

At 11:19 a.m., Commissioner Vincent moved to come out of the closed session pursuant to NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 (H) (2) pertaining to limited personnel matters and affirmed that the matters discussed in the closed meeting were limited only to those specified in the motion for closure. No action was taken during the closed session. Commissioner Kiesling seconded. Vote: Vincent - YES, Kiesling - YES and Bennett - YES. Motion carried.

Possible action items following the Executive Session:

- i: County Manager Appointment
- ii: Approval of Manger's Contract

Chairman Bennett reported that the County Manager position was offered to Brandy Thompson. Thompson accepted the offer.

Commissioner Vincent moved to approve the appointment as well as the Employment Agreement with Brandy Thompson. Commissioner Kiesling seconded. There was no further discussion. Vote: All YES. Motion carried. The Employment Agreement was signed. The agreement will be recorded in the Clerks' Office.

Angie Gonzales, the outgoing manager, thanked the Board for the opportunity to serve Union County.

Pursuant to the resignation of Angie Gonzales, the outgoing County Manager, Commissioner Vincent, on behalf of Board of County Commissioners, thanked Angie Gonzales her for her many years of service and for making Union County a better place. Commissioner Vincent suggested proposing a resolution during next month's meeting that stated something to that affect. Gonzales stated that her resignation will be effective January 31st. Chairman Bennett suggested designating January 31, 2020 as "Angie Gonzales Day". Commissioner Vincent asked that the proposed resolution be on next month's agenda.

iii: Resignation of County Treasurer

Treasurer Brandy Thompson read aloud her letter of resignation. The resignation was effective January 14, 2020. Thompson was appreciative of the opportunity to serve as Treasurer for the past seven (7) years.

Commissioner Kiesling moved to accept Brandy Thompson's resignation. Commissioner Vincent seconded. There was no further discussion. Vote: All YES. Motion carried: The letter of resignation will be filed in the Clerk's Office.

iv: Appointment of Union County Treasurer

Chairman Bennett suggested pursuant to the recommendation of Brandy Thompson, the outgoing Treasurer, that the Board offer the appointment of Treasurer to Shea Arnett who is currently the Deputy Treasurer.

Commissioner Vincent moved to nominate Shea Arnett as the Union County Treasurer. Commissioner Kiesling seconded. Discussion: Shea Arnett's appointment is to fulfill the remaining term of the Treasurer. Vote: All YES. Motion carried.

v. Settlement of County Treasurer Financial Records

Pursuant to NMSA 1978, §4-43-4, Brandy Thompson, the outgoing Treasurer, delivered to Shea Arnett, the incoming Treasurer, in the presence of the Board and other attendees all books, money and all other property belonging to the Office of the Union County Treasurer. Thompson reported that everything in the office was in order and balanced, and that Treasurer Shea Arnett is now in full custody of the Treasurer's Office. This letter will be filed in the Clerk's Office.

A letter signed by Chairman Justin Bennett together with an attached Treasurer's Financial Report dated January 15, 2020, will be delivered to the Honorable Brian Colón, New Mexico State Auditor. Pursuant to the appointment and to NMSA 1978, §4-43-4, the County's statutory obligations should be satisfied and fulfilled. This letter and attached financial report will be filed in the Clerk's Office.

vi: Signature Cards

Manager Brandy Thompson asked that the Commissioner's remove her name from the banks signature cards. A copy of the minutes may be supplied to the banks, which will show the authorization for signature removal. Upon Treasurer Arnett's Deputy's appointment, the signature cards can then be updated. Arnett can then notify the bank in writing of her appointment. Once this is done, new signature cards can then be processed.

Commissioner Kiesling moved to allow for the update of signature cards by removing Brandy Thompson's name and adding a newly appointed deputy treasurer. Commissioner Vincent seconded. There was no further discussion. Vote: All YES. Motion carried.

At 11:35 a.m., County Attorney Stephen Ross excused himself from the meeting.

ROAD SUPERINTENDANT'S REPORT

Superintendent Kear reported on the following (but not limited to the following): the project on Sloan Canyon Road, Harris and Wagner Roads are complete; the first initial blading of the parking lot at the Jr. High School has been done. This is to be done twice a year for five years; routine county wide blading and shaping; culvert and cattle guard repair; maintenance at the shop; 3 of 4 motor graders leases have expired and have been updated with new equipment. The 4th motor grader will be here sometime in February; a roller is being rebuilt; and, the department will be down another employee effective January 23rd. Next month, Kear will advertise for vacant positions.

Commissioner Vincent asked about Red Miller's road issues. Superintendent Kear reported that this road can be a project this summer depending on the availability of water.

Chairman Bennett suggested to Kear that documentation together with a dated photo be made with regards to the school work. Kiesling and Vincent agreed. Kear reported that the school's maintenance man is aware of the recent work.

FIRE COORDINATOR REPORT

Fire Coordinator O'Bryant was not present.

EMERGENCY MANAGER REPORT

Emergency Manager Wingo was not present.

ELECTED OFFICIALS REPORTS

Sheriff Lobb reported on the following (but not limited to the following): The Department is still down one employee. Lobb reported on the recruitment difficulties; making arrangements to get the new Deputy, Casey Coats, into the academy; prisoner transports; civil services; traffic control; lease agreement for the National Guard Building is up in October. Lobb plans on traveling to Las Cruces for a meeting with Guard officials on March 13th to negotiate another a lease for three (3) years. The Board asked the Lobb keep them informed.

Lastly, Lobb asked the Board if it was possible to offer some sort of financial incentive for the recruitment of certified law enforcement officers. Discussion followed. Lobb's request was acknowledged and will be looked into.

Treasurer Arnett reported that a Deputy Treasurer appointment is forthcoming.

Clerk Harkins reported that the Clerk's Office has been reimbursed in the amount of \$9,125.54 for the recent Regular Local Election. Said reimbursement will go back into the General Fund; and, the Secretary of State will be issuing the Proclamation calling for the Primary on January 27, 2020.

Commissioner Vincent reported that he is closely watching various legislative issues.

Commissioner Kiesling reported that there will be a Ports-to-Plains meeting while at the Legislative Luncheon. hopefully discussion will be had regarding a proposed joint resolution designating highways 64/87 as a future interstate highway. Chairman Bennett reported that the next recommendation would be is to get a Senate and House Joint Memorial passed in support of the designation. Lastly, Kiesling reminded attendees that the next NERTPO (Northeast Regional Transportation Planning Organization) will be in Clayton in February. Discussion followed.

Chairman Bennett spoke briefly about the Gallegos Wind Farm. Lastly, Bennett reminded attendees that the State Auditor is holding an open house this afternoon from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the City Office.

Meeting Announcements: The next regular meeting will be held on Tuesday, February 11, 2020, at 9:00 a.m. The next Joint Communications meeting is set for Tuesday, March 10, 2020, at 9:30 a.m.

Final adoption of the 2020 Union County Comprehensive Plan is expected to be during the Regular Board Meeting in March. The work sessions were informational only. No action concerning County business was taken.

STATE OF NEW MEXICO COUNTY OF UNION RESOLUTION NO. 2020-36

A RESOLUTION DECLARING OPPOSITION TO THE EXTREME RISK PROTECTION ORDER ACT

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Union County and its chief law enforcement official, the Union County Sheriff, have long recognized the necessity of the right to bear arms for citizens to protect themselves and their property; and

WHEREAS, at its regular meeting on February 12, 2019, the Board of County Commissioners of Union County, with the support of the Union County Sheriff, declared Union County to be a Second Amendment Sanctuary County and recognized the Union County Sheriff's right, in the exercise of his sound discretion, to prioritize the law enforcement duties of the deputies assigned to his office and not to enforce any unconstitutional firearms law against any citizen; and

WHEREAS, the New Mexico Legislature is currently considering an Act titled *Extreme Risk Protection Order Act* that allows a District Court to issue an order for a person not to have "custody or control of, purchase, possess or receive or attempt to purchase or receive a firearm or ammunition" and to issue a search warrant to law enforcement for firearms and ammunition in the person's custody or control; and

WHEREAS, Union County is a vast area of 3,831 square miles and has a population of more than 4,187 people; and

WHEREAS, the right to bear arms is essential to a citizen's ability to protect their personal safety, their family's safety, and their property; and

WHEREAS, the proposed law does not provide sufficient due process, creates an additional burden on the already overworked District Courts, and creates a new responsibility that exposes law enforcement to additional dangers.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Union County that it declare its opposition to the Extreme Risk Protection Order Act.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the County Manager communicate the Board's position to Union County's legislators.

DECLARING UNION COUNTY TO BE A SECOND AMENDMENT SANCTUARY COUNTY

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners met in a Regular Meeting on February 12, 2019 at 9:00 am at the Union County Courthouse 100 Court St. Clayton, New Mexico; and,

WHEREAS, NMSA 1978, Section 4-37-1 (1995) provides that Counties have the power to, "provide for the safety, preserve the health, promote the prosperity and improve the morals, order, comfort and convenience of any county or its inhabitants"; and,

WHEREAS, NMSA, 1978, Section 4-38-18 (1976) provides that a Board of County Commissioner has the duty and authority "[t]o represent the county and have the care of the county property and the management of the interest of the county in all cases where no other provision is made by law; and,

WHEREAS, the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution, adopted in 1791 as part of the Bill of Rights, protects the inalienable and individual right of the people to keep and bear arms; and

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court in the <u>District of Columbia v. Heller</u> 554 U.S. 570 (2008), decision affirmed pan individual's right to possess firearms, unconnected with service in a militia, for traditionally lawful purposes, such as self-defense within the home; and,

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court in McDonald v. Chicago, 561 U.S. 742 (2010), affirmed that the right of an individual to "keep and bear arms," as protected under the Second Amendment, is incorporated by the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment against the states; and,

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court, in <u>United States v. Miller</u>, 307 U.S. 174 (1939), opined that firearms that are part of ordinary military equipment, or with use that could contribute to the common defense are protected by the Second Amendment; and,

WHEREAS, Article II, Section 6 of the Constitution of New Mexico provides that "[n]olaw shall abridge the right of the citizen to keep and bear arms for security and defense, for elawful hunting and recreational use and for other lawful purposes, but nothing herein shall be held to permit the carrying of concealed weapons. No municipality or county shall regulate, in any way, an incident of the right to keep and bear arms;" and,

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Board to declare its support of the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution and the New Mexico Constitution protecting citizens' inalienable and individual right to keep and bear arms; and,

WHEREAS, the members of this Board took an oath to support and defend the United States Constitution, the Constitution of the State of New Mexico and the laws of the State of New Mexico (insofar as they are constitutional); and,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Union by the authority granted the Board by the laws of the State of New Mexico and people of Union County, New Mexico to stand and defend their rights and liberties, which are guaranteed by the United States and New Mexico Constitutions, we hereby declare this Resolution as follows:

Second Amendment Preservation Resolution Designating Union County a

Second Amendment "Sanctuary County"

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Board affirms its support for the duly elected Sheriff of Union County, New Mexico in the exercise of his/her sound discretion and affirms its resolve to support decisions by our Sheriff to not enforce any unconstitutional firearms law against any citizen.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Board will not authorize or appropriate government funds, resources, employees, agencies, contractors, buildings, detention centers or offices for the purpose of enforcing law that unconstitutionally infringes on the right of the people to keep and bear arms.

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Chapter 10: Implementation

10.1 INTRODUCTION

Implementation is a critical component in long range planning. Without a strong commitment to implementation, the process to develop the Comprehensive Plan will have been a fruitless effort. To ensure the success and implementation of the Comprehensive Plan, it is recommended that the County Commission create a rigorous system of checks and balances that includes:

- Appointing a subcommittee of the County Commission, along with County staff, to oversee the progress made towards implementation of the Comprehensive Plan and tasks that include:
 - ✓ Tracking the completion of the implementation strategies by Plan element and preparing progress reports to the County Commission;
 - Preparing recommendations for amendments to the Comprehensive Plan as needed:
 - Monitoring changed conditions in the community that may have an impact on the Comprehensive Plan;
 - Staying abreast of funding sources and programs that could be utilized for implementation of capital improvements;
 - Monitoring state legislation and plans in order to ensure consistency with state policy and programs; and
 - Representing Union County in regional water planning, transportation planning, and economic development initiatives.
- Developing and maintaining partnerships with other public and private sector entities to accomplish the implementation strategies.
- Linking Union County's ICIP to the implementation strategies and priorities identified in the Comprehensive plan.
- Basing future grant applications on implementation strategies and priorities identified in the Comprehensive Plan

10.2 IMPLEMENTATION PROGRAM

Each of the elements in this Comprehensive Plan contain a series of goals, objectives, and strategies. The implementation tables starting on the next page provide the complete list of strategies contained in the Comprehensive Plan. The strategies are organized by Plan element and are supplemented by projected time frames for completion and responsible party or partnership. For more detail on each of the strategies or the goals and objectives, refer back to the specific Plan element.

- 2020-2023 (short);
- 2024-2027 (medium);
- 2028-2035 (long);
- On-going (no end date).

The implementation program acknowledges Union County's fiscal and staff limitations. As such, the time frames presented in the implementation tables are dependent on available funding, staff resources, and the ability of Union County to engage in meaningful partnerships with other local and regional entities. It should be understood that the time frames may require adjustment over time.

COST OF CARE AGREEMENT

	This Cost of Care Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into this	day
of	, 2020, by and between the County of Bernalillo, New Mexico, a political	
subdiv	vision of the State of New Mexico (hereinafter "County"), and the County of Union, a p	olitical
subdiv	vision of the State of New Mexico (hereinafter "Contractor").	

WHEREAS, the County owns and operates the Bernalillo County Youth Services Center (hereinafter "Facility") to house juvenile offenders; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor has a need to secure a confinement area for juveniles arrested and/or detained pursuant to lawful process (hereinafter "Detainees"); and

WHEREAS, state law provides that a local, state, federal or tribal entity may contribute a reasonable amount to a county to defray the cost of maintaining said detainees;

NOW THEREFORE, be it mutually resolved and agreed to by and between the County and Contractor that:

- 1. Upon request from the Contractor to house its Detainees, the County may provide bed space in its Facility, space permitting and as determined in the sole discretion of the Facility Director.
- 2. A "Detainee" for purposes of this Agreement is defined as a person under the age of eighteen under the purview of the children's court who is arrested or detained under process of law to secure detention by a court or official of competent jurisdiction.
- 3. In consideration for housing said Detainees, Contractor shall pay the County the sum of Two Hundred and Twenty-Five (\$225.00) dollars per Detainee housed at the Facility per day or any fraction thereof. A day is defined as any time from 12:01 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. Detainees that require enhanced supervision (one staff for one detainee) based on high suicide risk, mental health acuity, or other high-risk behavior, to include hospital details requiring one-on-one staffing, will be charged a daily rate of \$300.00 per day. This enhanced rate will only apply to the number of days requiring the one-on-one staffing. Contractor shall have the right to inspect supporting documentation from the County that indicates the need for one-on-one staffing. This Agreement shall take effect on July 1, 2020. Any prior Cost of Care Agreement in effect between the parties shall remain in effect until June 30, 2020, and shall terminate upon the term of this Agreement becoming effective July 1, 2020.
- 4. Contractor authorizes the County or its designee to submit billings to all applicable third party payors, including but not limited to Medicaid, and to collect and retain all payments resulting from such billings for any and all medical, mental health, dental care, and pharmaceuticals provided to each Detainee while housed at the Facility. In addition to the amount set forth in paragraph 3 above, Contractor shall also reimburse the County for all necessary medical, mental health, dental and/or pharmaceutical expenses incurred by, or on behalf of, each Detainee, arising out of injuries, illnesses or other medical, mental health or dental conditions of, or to, each Detainee that is not covered or reimbursed by any third party payor.

- 5. Contractor shall be responsible for any and all required transportation of each Detainee with the exception of emergency medical transports.
- 6. All amounts due from Contractor shall be paid by the Contractor to the County within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of billing. Any amount(s) not paid within forty-five (45) calendar days of the date of billing shall be subject to interest at the rate of one and one-half percent (1 & 1/2%) per month for all unpaid balance(s). Any bill remaining unpaid for two (2) months may result, as determined in the sole discretion of the Facility Director, in the County returning Detainee(s) to the Contractor.
- 7. It is mutually agreed that the Facility Director or the Director's designee retains the right to refuse to accept or to continue to house any Detainee(s) for any reason(s) as determined in the sole discretion of the Facility Director or designee.
- 8. It is also mutually agreed that except for Bernalillo County Detainee(s), the Facility shall not give preference to any particular arresting agency or County, subject to a Cost of Care Agreement, in booking and housing any Detainee if space at the Facility becomes limited. All Detainee(s) shall be accepted on a first-booked, first-incarcerated basis so long as the needs of Bernalillo County are first anticipated and met.
- 9. In the event that either party is in violation of any term of this Agreement, that party shall be served notice and have thirty (30) days in which to cure or remedy the defect. Failure to cure or remedy the defect shall give the non-offending party the right to terminate this Agreement immediately on notice. Notice is hereby deemed to have been given (a) if written notice is hand-delivered to the other party at their respective office, then termination is effective immediately upon receipt at said office; or (b) if the written notice is mailed by certified mail, return receipt requested, then termination is effective three (3) working days after the post office mark of mailing.
- 10. This Agreement may be terminated by either party, with or without cause, by providing written notice to the other party at least (30) calendar days prior to the effective date of termination. Termination pursuant to this paragraph by either party shall be considered final with no remedy or appeal.
- 11. Any termination pursuant to paragraphs 9 or 10 shall not affect or abrogate any responsibility of either party up to the effective date of termination.
- 12. It is agreed that Bernalillo County shall have complete and total authority over the administration, security, health safety and well-being of all residents housed at the Facility.
- 13. The Contractor agrees to instruct its law enforcement officers and Juvenile Probation Officers to continue to assist with the booking and lock-up processing of Contractor's detainees, including but not limited to fingerprinting, mug shots, and necessary reports, if requested by the Facility Director or his designee.

- 14. The Facility agrees that the release of Detainee(s) shall be made only pursuant to an order of a court of competent jurisdiction, or by appropriate order of an authorized Juvenile Probation Officer.
- 15. The Contractor and County agree that in the event of any incident at the Facility involving a Detainee(s) of Contractor, which incident requires an outside investigation, such incident shall be referred to the appropriate Law Enforcement Authority for investigation and a report made to both the Contractor and County.
- 16. Each party shall be solely responsible for fiscal or other sanctions occasioned as a result of its own violation or alleged violation or requirements applicable to the performance of this Agreement. Each party shall be liable for its actions according to this Agreement subject to the immunities and limitations of the New Mexico Tort Claims Act, NMSA 1978, Sections 41-4-1 et seq., as amended.
- 17. This Agreement shall not be altered, changed or amended except by written instrument executed and approved by both parties.
- 18. The Contractor agrees to pay to the County all costs and expenses including reasonable attorney's fees incurred by the County in exercising any of its rights or remedies in connection with the enforcement of this Agreement.
- 19. This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties and supersedes any and all other agreements or understandings, oral or written, whether previous to the execution hereof or contemporaneous herewith.
- 20. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed and enforced in accordance with the Laws of the State of New Mexico.
- 21. This Agreement shall not become effective or binding until executed by both parties.
